Games have been an important part of culture for as long as human civilization has existed. Throughout time, types of games have included tiles, dice, cards, and checkers, in addition to board, role playing, video, and tabletop games. Today, the game industry is booming and the variety of games available has never been larger.

The importance of play in the development of children is well documented, but it is becoming increasingly clear that it remains important in adulthood. Games promote learning in a fun and interactive way for all ages. Game stores and game cafes sustain tabletop gaming communities. Games can be expensive for individuals to purchase, so patrons may be looking for a place to borrow or play them before spending their money. This is where public libraries come in. Libraries offer an inclusive, nonjudgmental space for people to spend time together.

If you want to invite your patrons to a gaming program at the library, here are some factors to consider. **Age**—the age group you want to attract will play a major part in your choice of games. **Complexity**—Simpler games, such as traditional and "gateway" games such as <u>Ticket to Ride</u> and <u>Carcassonne</u> are better choices than complex strategy games. **Time**—Connected to the complexity of games is the time it takes to play. Look for games lasting 30 minutes or less with one or two games that take up to an hour.

Central Plains Library System has a collection of games for you to borrow. A library may request up to five games and they are due back in 6 weeks. (Be sure to put a selection of titles in your request, in case some that you want are already checked out.) Click on this link for the list of games the System has available for loan and their descriptions. Let us know if there are games that your patrons are requesting that we don't have.



CENTRAL PLAINS PRESENTS: JONIS AGEE



We are pleased to announce that the CPLS Board recently decided to use ARPA funding to pay the speaker costs for those bringing Jonis Agee, the author of this year's One Book One Nebraska choice, Bones of Paradise, to their library through Humanities Nebraska! The **first 50 eligible libraries which apply** will see CPLS pay the Humanities Nebraska fee of \$50 directly, instead of needing to pay it themselves. If your library has already booked Jonis Agee for 2022, please let us know and CPLS can reimburse you. This is a great opportunity to offer programming to your patrons at no additional cost to your library! And what a great presentation to have, a One Book One Nebraska author!

Jonis Agee is a Nebraska author whose presentation is entitled "Bones of Paradise: A Novel Examined." Her novel "offers readers a multi-generational saga set in the Nebraska Sand Hills. Agee discusses how she came to

write this story in this setting, and shares her approaches to research, character development and more." (From the Humanities Nebraska website: https://humanitiesnebraska.org/catalog/age-range/adults/bones-of-paradise-a-novel-examined/

Just a reminder that if this is a library's first presentation by a Humanities Nebraska speaker this year, \$50 will cover the entire portion of the library's cost. If Jonis Agee is the second Humanities speaker you have booked this year, the total cost for a second speaker is \$100, so our \$50 will only cover half.

All school and public libraries within the CPLS service area are eligible. We do encourage partnerships between school & public libraries in this endeavor. School librarians may want to coordinate with their school administrators so that the entire student body can participate, or the school may even choose to host an open house for the community.

The steps which you need to take:

- Contact Jonis Agee at <u>jagee2@unl.edu</u> to set a date and time for the presentation.
- Fill out the Humanities Nebraska paperwork. For schools the form is <u>here</u> and for public libraries the form is <u>here</u>.
- At the bottom of the second page, write "Please Invoice Central Plains Library System."
- After you have read the rules on the form carefully, please send one copy to Humanities Nebraska and another copy to Central Plains Library System (via our email address at <u>cplsasst@gmail.com</u> or our physical address at: 2727 W. 2nd Street, Suite #233, Hastings, NE 68901). Keep a copy for yourself!
- Make sure Humanities Nebraska receives your application paperwork at least 1 month in advance of the presentation. This is necessary in order to give Humanities Nebraska time to process the application and to arrange for payment to Jonis Agee.

ARSL & Penguin Random House Grants for Rural & Small Libraries



Applications for the 2022 ARSL/PRH Grants for Rural & Small Libraries are now open!

Through the generosity of Penguin Random House, we are pleased to announce this grant opportunity for small, rural libraries nationwide! This grant is available to libraries that meet both the IMLS definition for small libraries (a service population of 25,000 or fewer) and the definition for rural libraries (libraries located 5 or more miles from the nearest town of 25k or more). <u>Unaccredited libraries are eligible to apply!</u>

Applicants may request:

• One (1) monetary grant in support of a community-oriented project for up to \$1,000.

or

• An in-kind grant donation of up to \$1,000 in equivalent value to support a circulating collection in your library.

Deadline for applications is <u>December 12, 2022.</u>

Notifications of funding decision will be sent to applicants by January 27, 2023.

Funded projects must be completed by December 31, 2023.

Project reports must be submitted by February 1, 2024.

The program will award grants to libraries that demonstrate a true need. Monetary grants are not limited to literacy and may be used for everything from library programming and books to resources like hotspots that help community members access important information. Library seeking support for digital collections should request a monetary grant.

ALA Libraries Transforming Communities: Accessible Small & Rural Libraries

The American Library Association invites applications from small and rural libraries for the Libraries Transforming Communities (LTC): Accessible Small and Rural Communities grant.

Library workers may apply online for grant funding from November 1, 2022, to February 28, 2023, at ala.org/LTCAccess. Up to 300 libraries will be awarded in this application period, part of ALA's longtime community engagement initiative.

ALA will accept applications from November 1, 2022 to February 28, 2023

Chosen libraries will first conduct community input-gathering sessions to assure that their work aligns with local needs. Libraries will be required to identify the primary audience they are hoping to reach (e.g., homebound seniors, children with autism, Deaf community members) and facilitate a community conversation with the impacted populations to guide improvement of the library's services. Grantees will then use the grant funds to create services or improve their facilities based on the needs identified by their audience.

Selected libraries will receive \$10,000 or \$20,000 to support costs related to their community engagement project; virtual training to assist project directors in developing their community engagement, facilitation, and disability service skills; a suite of online resources developed to support local programs; and technical and project support from the ALA Public Programs Office throughout the grant term.

The opportunity is open to libraries serving small and rural communities in the U.S. and U.S. territories. To be eligible, a library must be located in an area that's more than, or equal to, five miles from an urbanized area and with a population of 25,000 or less, in keeping with Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) definitions of small and rural libraries.

The Application deadline is <u>January 16</u>, <u>2023</u>. Those libraries which have previously applied for the grant but did not receive funding are invited to submit again.

The SKPL Team is honored to have the opportunity to enrich the services that public libraries offer. SKPL enables children, parents, and teachers the chance to borrow library kits for hands-on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) learning at home or in classroom.

Call to Order and Roll Call: President Terri Johnson called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. Secretary Terri Eberly took roll call.

Approval of the minutes: The minutes of the July 8, 2022, hybrid meeting were distributed. Sharon Bohling made a motion to approve the minutes as circulated. Doris Brandon seconded the motion. The motion carried and the minutes were approved as circulated.

- Thursday Morning Meetings well attended and received.
- Statistical reports were presented on materials provided to libraries within the system.
- BookPage is provided to 9 libraries in the system.
- 27 CPLS libraries will receive 100 recently published children's books from Brodart Books through the Brownstone Book Fund in New York City. Sally Snyder reviewed and recommended book titles selected for the libraries.
- Announced a partnership between the Nebraska Library Commission and the Nebraska Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired that will expand the services we can provide in every Nebraska library. NCBVI will be providing one 20" ONYX Deskset HD CCTV (electronic video magnifier) to each public library location in Nebraska at no cost.
- New Library Directors: Calvin T. Ryan, UN-K-Evan Boyd; Axtell Public Library-Sheila Carmoney
- Scheduled Workshops: Various Cricut, MakerSpace and Summer Reading Program workshops will November-April. (see newsletter for details). In addition, NLC will host What's New with Bibliostat by Sam Shaw to prepare libraries for the annual report.

Old Business:

- Denise Harders presented the 2022-2023 Financial Budget. Terri Eberly made a motion to approve the budget as presented. Stephanie Branham seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- System ARPA Grant Expenditures were reviewed. Balance of \$1333.69 available for use.

New Business:

- Bulk Loan Program. Denise reviewed the two libraries providing the service for the system
 and explained for the new board members how it operates (participating libraries paying
 \$50.00 fee and CPLS giving funds to the providers for LP collection development
- Cricut giveaway. CPLS is hosting several Cricut workshops, libraries attending the workshops will be put in a drawing to receive Cricut equipment.
- Certificate of Deposit with Edward Jones: After discussion, the board recommended that
 Denise look into staggering lengths and amounts of certificates. This will allow
 monies to be available throughout the year and CPLS can capitalize on higher rates
 as they are available.
- Financial Compilation by Gary Riggs: The financial reports for the fiscal year were reviewed by Gary Riggs and there were no discrepancies or inconsistencies that need to be addressed. CPLS will receive copies of the final report.
- NLA Conference is moving to every other year format. Next conference will be held in 2024. During the Thursday morning directors' meeting it was suggested that CPLS host a mini conference in the off year. The board is in favor of this project, recommending a one-day conference with three keynote speakers and nine breakout sessions. Several topics were discussed for breakout sessions.


Other Business: Christa Porter presented the Library Commission Report (highlights)

- Biennium budget request was submitted on September 15. It included a 5.5% funding increase for the regional library systems
- New NebraskaAccess: The site was reconfigured to accommodate new content, new databases access pages, and new authentication options. There are database access pages for high school and elementary/middle school students. NebraskaAccess passwords will be updated annually on August 1. There is a recording on NCompass Live with details
- Public Library Accreditation for 2022: 36 libraries are up for re-accreditation, twenty-two have been re-accredited. One additional library: Logan County Library/Stapleton received accreditation for the first time. The remainder of the libraries were given extensions.
- NLC Grants for 2023: NLC opened the application process for all four of the usual grants for 2023 on September 16. The applications are due on November 18, 2022.
- There will be regular funding for CE/Training, Internship, library improvement and youth grants for excellence.
- Celebration of Nebraska Books, 10-22-22, at Nebraska History Museum. Featured will be the announcement of the 2023 One Book One Nebraska title and Nebraska Center for the Book's Nebraska Book Awards
- E-rate Funding and E-rate What's New for 2023? Workshops are scheduled
- NCompass Live Schedule and Basis Skills 2022 Schedule were presented
- As always, check out the Library Commission website //nlc.nebraska.gov for additional and more detailed information.

Adjourn: There being no further business, Doris Brandon moved to adjourn.







Adoration of Jenna Fox by Mary E. Pearson — 10 copies (Grades 8-12)





Mad Honey by Jodi Picoult and Jennifer Finney Boylan — 10 copies


Our Missing Hearts by Celeste Ng − 10 copies

The Whalebone Theatre by Joanna Quinn – 10 copies







From July 1, 2022 thru June 30, 2023, each CPLS member library has 10 free disc cleanings available to them.

If you have more than 10 discs that need fixing, you may send them to us and we will repair them and send them back with an invoice for .50 cents per disc plus return postage. If you come to the CPLS Office in Hastings and pick up the repaired discs, the charge is .50 cents per disc. A similar service at a retail video outlet costs more than \$5.00 per disc!


