Showcase Your Collection

Library patrons can become overwhelmed with the huge array of books that are available at the public library. Displays of books and other materials can help overcome that problem, and they add color and excitement to the space. By browsing through the books on display (i.e. new, seasonal, holiday, or topical) the reader has a limited number to consider.

The main point of taking the time and effort to prepare displays is to draw the patrons' attention to new and interesting material, and, of course, to increase circulation. By featuring books in the stacks and in designated display areas, library staff members ensure getting maximum use of the materials purchased with the library's budget. Changing the displays monthly and keeping them full of fresh-looking books, help to keep the library's patrons interested and coming back.

In order to build a successful display, consider the following elements:

- <u>Theme</u>. Use all types of library material as well as objects that relate to the theme you have in mind. Objects include plants, tools, sports equipment, household items, and cultural items.
- <u>Size</u>. Vary the sizes of displayed material. Mix small items with large ones. Bring smaller things to the front.
- <u>Height</u>. Mix taller items with shorter ones. Use stands or stack your items on top of each other.
- <u>Space</u>. Use a table in front of a wall so you can put things on the wall and on the table. Make sure it is not too crowded but not too empty.
- <u>Colors</u>. Vary the colors. Mix bright with dull and light with dark. Step back and see if it is visually appealing.



ALA Libraries Transforming Communities: Accessible Small & Rural Libraries

The American Library Association invites applications from small and rural libraries for the Libraries Transforming Communities (LTC): Accessible Small and Rural Communities grant.

Library workers may apply online for grant funding from November 1, 2022, to February 28, 2023, at ala.org/LTCAccess. Up to 300 libraries will be awarded in this application period, part of ALA's longtime community engagement initiative.

ALA will accept applications from November 1, 2022 to February 28, 2023

Chosen libraries will first conduct community input-gathering sessions to assure that their work aligns with local needs. Libraries will be required to identify the primary audience they are hoping to reach (e.g., homebound seniors, children with autism, Deaf community members) and facilitate a community conversation with the impacted populations to guide improvement of the library's services. Grantees will then use the grant funds to create services or improve their facilities based on the needs identified by their audience.

Selected libraries will receive \$10,000 or \$20,000 to support costs related to their community engagement project; virtual training to assist project directors in developing their community engagement, facilitation, and disability service skills; a suite of online resources developed to support local programs; and technical and project support from the ALA Public Programs Office throughout the grant term.

The opportunity is open to libraries serving small and rural communities in the U.S. and U.S. territories. To be eligible, a library must be located in an area that's more than, or equal to, five miles from an urbanized area and with a population of 25,000 or less, in keeping with Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) definitions of small and rural libraries.

Creative Aging through the Arts Program

Creative Aging Arts Program (CAAP) grants pay for programs with teaching artists trained in best practices of creative programming with older adult participants. Select teaching artists from NAC's CAAP Artist Cohort, which is listed with <u>CAAP grant information on the NAC website</u>. During CAAP residencies, artists share their expertise through skill-based, sequential arts lessons in a variety of disciplines. Sessions also foster social engagement among participants, ending with a culminating event to showcase participants' work. Sponsor organizations, including non-profits, senior centers, local agencies on aging, and libraries may apply. Grant applications have a rolling deadline - apply at least six weeks ahead.



Many Grant Opportunities Available

There is a tremendous amount of grants available right now! Go to the Nebraska Library Commission's website to find out more details on each one. These grants are for specific items such as arts, seniors, or accessibility in your library. However, many are available for summer reading programs, teens, graphic novels, equity, financial education, etc. Some grants may require matching funds but not all do so it pays to check out the details. Grant amounts range from \$500 to \$50,000. Discover new opportunities for your library today!

Central Plains Library Board Meeting January 13, 2023 Zoom Meeting

<u>Call to order and roll call:</u> President, Terri Johnson called the meeting to order at 11:06 a.m. via Zoom, Secretary, Terri Eberly took roll call.

<u>Present:</u> Sharon Bohling, Jody Crocker, Jamie Dennis, Sherri Dux-Ideus, Terri Eberly, Janene Hill, Terri Johnson, and James Tidei. Absent: Doris Brandon, Stephanie Branham, Lisa Mount, and Kina Stefka. Others in attendance: Denise Harders, Christa Porter and Tim Johnson.

<u>Approval of the minutes:</u> Correction to the minutes, book title: changed from "The Lincoln Library" to "The Lincoln Highway". It was moved by Jamie Dennis and seconded by James Tidei to approve the corrected minutes. The minutes were approved as corrected.

<u>Financial Report:</u> Sherri Dux-Ideus moved to approve the financial report. Jamie Dennis seconded the motion. The financial report was approved as circulated.

Correspondence:

- Thank you from Maggie Berndt, Nebraska Public Media for collaboration on the Nebraska Pollinators Project.
- Thank you from Gail Irwin, Ainsworth Public Library and Laurie Yocom, Wilson Public Library in Cozad for providing funds for the Jonis Agee, Humanities Speaker program
- Thank you from Anne Quigley, Valentine Public Library for the Matt Mason Book Set
- Thank you from Denise Harders and family for the gifts, thoughts and prayers extended to the family following her father's death.

Directors Report: Denise reported on the activities of the CPLS office.

- Reviewed report on the bulk loan program from McCook Library
- Statistics showed many book kits loaned out, as well as Makerspace equipment.
- Accreditation process complete with one new library in the CPLS being credentialed for the first time. All CPLS libraries due doing this period were accredited.
- Holly Woldt, NLC Technical support, reached out to Denise regarding Digital Equity for Nebraska residents. Holly worked with the Nebraska Libraries during the BTOP grant. Currently, a half million dollars has been set aside for the planning phase of this project. The project is to make access to digital (Internet availability) possible for rural areas with poor internet service. Denise will report what library systems do for communities.
 Stakeholders: Economic Development, corporations and businesses—very happy to have libraries included in the conversation.

 - A couple of the southern counties in the CPLS have had an issue with a patron viewing
 material unsuitable for children on the computers. The material was seen by children
 which led to the city/police being called to the library. Computers were removed. Another
 library was contacted to be on the alert for the individual accessing this material on library
 computers. Denise reminded us that as long as it is not child pornography or sex traffic
 related, though the material may be offensive, it is not illegal. Tread lightly when involving
 outside authorities.
 - Sheila Carmony is the new librarian at Axtell. The township was dissolved, and the city of Axtell took over management of the library. The downtown facility has added restrooms, put in new flooring, decorative fireplace, furniture and moveable bookshelves. A popular program is called the Pre-School Book Club. They have 28 preschoolers involved in the program.
 - Denise has offered the part-time CPLS position to retired librarian, Deb Fairbanks. The flexible schedule works for Deb. Hours will be 10-15 weekly depending on seasonal demand.

Old Business:

- Certificate of Deposits. Denise has a meeting with a financial advisor at Edward D. Jones to discuss and invest \$10,000.00 from the general fund in two CDs with different maturity dates to keep the money available as needed. Terri Eberly will meet with them to be the additional signor on the account for the board.
- CPLS Biennial Conference will be held October 19, 2023, beginning at 10:00 a.m., at the Kearney Public Library. The Conference theme "Tools of the Trade". Four rooms have been reserved for the sessions which will allow for 4 concurrent sessions per hour. We are looking for 20 presenters, each providing about one hour on a topic, a keynote speaker, and three lightning round presenters. This would be equivalent to 6 CEs if an attendee went to each session. At this time, we do not think we will have any repeat sessions. Looking at a take and go lunch. There is a lot of excitement for this conference.

New Business:

- Denise filed the 2023-24 Non-profit Corporation Biennial Report online with the Secretary of State. The cost was \$25.00 plus a \$3.00 handling fee.
- Upcoming workshops were highlighted (see the packet handout)
- CPLS is working with David Marsh on a Humanities Program that can be tied to the summer reading program "All Together Now". He has a musical program with music from around the world. CPLS would offer this to libraries and pay the \$50.00 program fee for each library.

- A System Services Survey will be out in the next few months. Denise has been working on the questionnaire. The survey will be in google form and the link will be sent via email.
- Terri Johnson asked the board to consider options for the annual meeting. Denise recommended Cozad. Several area museums of interest, as well as a Nebraska Arts Council series on art for seniors. One specific is a Eustis resident with a barn quilt presentation. To be discussed further in April.
- Next meeting is April 14, 2023, 10:00, Room 210-211 at CCC Grand Island.

Other Business: Christa Porter presented the NLC report—January 2023 HIGHLIGHTS

- LSTA Appropriations. Congressional FY 2023 Omnibus Appropriations bill provides increases for several library programs. IMLS +26.8 million, LSTA +13.5 million, LSTA grant to states +183,000.00 and Innovative Approaches to Literacy +1 million.
- NLC Grants for 2023. Grant awards are in the mail. CE/Training-8 applications funded for \$5,000.; Youth-34 libraries awarded \$31,466.13 (1,466.13 left over from Kreutz-Bennett); Internship grants- 20 libraries awarded \$20,000.; and Library Improvement grants-25 libraries awarded \$60,000.00.
- Public Library Accreditation. 2022 accreditation process complete. 183 accredited libraries in the state. This cycle 27 were re-accredited; 2 new libraries were accredited Stapleton (CPLS) and Sterling; 7 libraries given extension and 2 libraries were not re-accredited.
- E-rate for 2023. "E-Rae: What's new for 2023?" online workshops were held in November 2022. The recording is available on NLC webpage. Form 470 window closes 2/28 and form 471 window opens 1/18 and closes on 3/28/23. Questions contact Krista.
- 2023 Special Construction Fiber to the Library Recordings available. Year 3 of the E-rate Special Construction State Matching Fund Program, Three online workshops were held and recordings are available on the NLC website
- Big Talk from Small Libraries. The conference will be held February 24, 2023. Schedule and speakers listed on the NLC website.
- Library Commission Personnel News. Andrew Sherman (former director of Sidney Library) has been hired as the IT Infrastructure Support Analyst
- N-Compass Live Schedule and Basic Skills 2023 Schedule available on the NLC website

\$20,000 in Internship Grants Awarded to Nebraska Public Libraries

Nebraska Library Commission Director Rod Wagner. Student interns
will learn about library work as they shadow staff, assist with day-to-day library operations, and
implement special projects.

Eye Catching Book Displays for March

<u>Armchair Travel</u>—Gather all the books about scenic destinations in the US and around the world. Display with one of the following slogans: Around the World in a Book; Let's Travel; Books Transport You to Far Away Places.

<u>National Quilting Month</u>—Display books about quilting and patchwork projects. Make a sign that says "Piece By Piece." Add a small quilt or fabric swatches.

<u>Pi Day</u>—Children get pretty excited for Pi Day, which is celebrated on March 14 as a nod to the fact that pi equals 3.14. Display books about math concepts including any of the ten "Sir Cumference" books. Even though these books look like picture books, they are actually written for middle grades. You could also celebrate by serving slices of pie.

Quick Reads—Display short story collections, Chicken Soup for Your Soul, and similar series books.

<u>Women's History Month</u>—Make a poster that says "Women You Never Heard Of" and fill the display with lesser-known women's memoirs.

<u>Youth Art Month</u>—Display books about the creative process. This year's theme is "Your Art, Your Voice." Invite a local artist or book illustrator to show children and teens how to create something special of their own.



NEW BOOK CLUB KITS AT CPLS




Willa Cather's A Lost Lady was first published in 1923. In celebration of the 100th anniversary of publication, CPLS purchased twelve copies for our Book Club Set.


It tells the story of Marian Forrester and her husband, Captain Daniel Forrester who live in the Western town of Sweet Water, along the Transcontinental Railroad. Marian draws her strength from that solid foundation, bringing delight and beauty to her elderly husband, to the small town where they live, to the prairie land itself, and to the young narrator of her story, Neil Herbert. All are bewitched by her brilliance and grace, and all are ultimately betrayed. For Marian longs for "life on any terms," and in fulfilling herself, she loses all she loved and all who loved her. This, Willa Cather's most perfect novel, is not only a portrait of a troubling beauty, but also a haunting evocation of a noble age slipping irrevocably into the past.

A recent movie release starring Tom Hanks, Mariana Trevino and Rachel Keller has increased interest in a novel titled A Man Called Ove by Fredrik Backman. The System has 10 copies plus an audiobook in our Book Club Set.

Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon—the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. 

Seven years later, Maya lives in Boston with a loving boyfriend and is kicking the secret addiction that has allowed her to cope with what happened years ago. But her past comes rushing back when she comes across a recent YouTube video in which a young woman suddenly keels over and dies in a diner while sitting across from none other than Frank. Plunged into the trauma that has defined her life, Maya heads to her Berkshires hometown to relive that fateful summer—the influence Frank once had on her and the obsessive jealousy that nearly destroyed her friendship with Aubrey.

NEW BOOK CLUB KITS AT NLC

For 60 days in the winter of 1957-1958, Charles Starkweather and Caril Ann Fugate raced across Nebraska and Wyoming, leaving 11 dead in their wake. As one of America's most infamous and widely-reported killing sprees, Starkweather and Fugate are immortalized through movies, music, and literature. And Liza Ward, the granddaughter of two victims, Lauer and Clara Ward, decided it was time to tell the story from a new perspective. Her 2004 novel *Outside Valentine* is the story of her family and the trauma that has consumed it for generations. But instead of focusing on the notorious Starkweather, this novel takes a step back, concentrating on Caril Ann and those he left behind in a stunning re-telling of what happened that winter.

Outside Valentine is a fictional account of the Starkweather killing spree, following the three narrators simultaneously. One narrator, Caril Ann Fugate, is a disenfranchised

impressionable 14-year-old who finds solace and a desperate love with 19-year-old Charles Starkweather. Their romance soon burns too hot when he takes Caril on a joyride, murdering her family and anyone found in the way of that love. Four years later, the story follows Susan Hurst, who finds herself obsessively reading about the killing spree, envious of the pair's violent love. Desperate for this kind of love and recognition, she lives a lonely life with her emotionally distant parents, all the while harboring a secret obsession for the surviving son of the Bowmans (the fictionalized Lauer and Clara Ward), whom she has never met. The son, Lowell Bowman, is our third narrator, who, 30 years later, is still dealing with the aftermath of the tragedy. Unable to cope, he runs away from his wife and children, both from and to his past.

Outside Valentine is an engaging and lyrical read that isn't quite "true crime" but still has that thrilling air. Because the story takes place over 30 years, the reader follows how Fugate and Starkweather's actions spiral bigger than just themselves. Ward creates an atmosphere that sucks you in so deeply and wholly that you forget where you are. And the stark winter setting makes this a perfect book club selection coming into the colder months. Book club groups, especially those here in Nebraska, will find plenty to discuss in how Ward uses the setting to instill her characters with deep longing and isolation. She does an incredible job of identifying the true loneliness of being a young girl and the dark side of romanticism.

While both were found guilty and Starkweather sentenced to death, Caril Ann Fugate spent 17 years in prison on a murder conviction before she was paroled in 1976. In 2020, with her father's support, Liza Ward advocated for Fugate's pardon, believing her grandparents "would want people to know the truth," and that it is "time to show that young girl's stories are worth being listened to." And she gives young girls that opportunity in *Outside Valentine*.

It is not just a buffer, but a full-service machine, to both clean and repair your valuable discs. Save those discs that won't play! As long as they are not cracked, we can fix them.


From July 1, 2022 thru June 30, 2023, each CPLS member library has 10 free disc cleanings available to them.
