Listening is a Skill

I recently spoke with some library staff members about what to do when a patron is angry and disruptive. Listening was mentioned as a way to deal with conflict in the library. Good listening skills can prevent many problems. Here are some tools to improve our ability to listen and accurately understand what others are saying.

Choose to listen. This may sound silly, but many people are not good listeners because they don't want to be. One of the first and simplest steps we can take to improve our listening skills is to decide to be a better listener. Make it a priority to pay attention to what the speaker is truly trying to communicate.

Focus on the speaker. Listening is an active skill, not a passive one. Get rid of all the distractions and pay complete attention.

Make eye contact. Much of any message is nonverbal, and you can't pick up those cues without looking at the speaker. A person's facial expression adds meaning and context to the words, as well.

Take notes. Your notes should be very brief, just a few words or phrases on the main point.

Ask clarifying questions. Give the speaker time to make a point, but don't let the conversation go too far before asking clarifying questions such as "Tell me what you mean by..." and "When did you first notice this..."

Offer summarizing statements. These statements are best used after listening for awhile and checking to see that you properly interpreted the message before taking any action. Your tone of voice is important here. Summarizing statements must be worded and expressed in a non-judgmental manner.

Silence. Giving the speaker even five seconds of silence offers the opportunity to gather his or her thoughts and can really help.

Keep an open mind. Perceptions shape the way we listen, and these perceptions can lead to receiving the wrong message. Everyone has biases. Although we think of them as regarding race, gender, national origin, and so forth, our biases can also be triggered by a person's clothing, use of language, social status, physical appearance, or age. Make only those judgments you absolutely need to in order to address the library issue at hand.

Really listening carefully to what is being said has several benefits. First, it gives you the information you need to formulate an intelligent response. Second, it makes the patron feel respected and connected. We can frequently take control of a tense situation by listening carefully from the start and letting the patron know that we are listening.

CPLS Board Nominations

Do you know someone who would be interested in serving on your Library System Board? For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, the Central Plains Library System is accepting nominations for one new member on the Board. CPLS board members are elected at the Annual Meeting and serve for a 3-year term.

What is the Role of the System Board?

The System Board is the governing body of the Central Plains Library System; its function is similar to that of a public library board of trustees or any non-profit corporation. Board member tasks include:

- Being an advocate for the System and System services
- Budget preparation
- Evaluation of System services and programs
- Design of specification for provision of System services

How Often Does the System Board Meet?

The System Board meets four times per year, at designated places around the System or by telephone conference call Meetings usually last less than two hours.

Are Members of the Board Reimbursed for Expenses?

Members are not permitted to receive a salary, wage or fee for their services. However, they are reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in carrying out their duties. The cost of travel to and from Board and committee meetings is reimbursed at the current Federal allowable rate; examples of other reimbursed expenses are telephone charges and postage.

Nominees for the positions may be library employees, library board members, or library customers. Nominees representing any of the System counties are welcome. 

The Book Club Set, which includes 6 copies of the title, *The Stranger in the Woods: The Extraordinary Story of the Last True Hermit*, by Michael Finkel, was donated to CPLS by the Grand Island Campus Library of Central Community College.

Here is Amazon's description of this book:

In 1986, a shy and intelligent twenty-year-old named Christopher Knight left his home in Massachusetts, drove to Maine, and disappeared into the forest. He would not have a conversation with another human being until nearly three decades later, when he was arrested for stealing food. Living in a tent even through brutal winters, he had survived by his wits and courage, developing ingenious ways to store edibles and water, and to avoid freezing to death. He broke into nearby cottages for food, clothing, reading material, and other provisions, taking only what he needed but terrifying a community never able to solve the mysterious burglaries. Based on extensive interviews with Knight himself, this is a vividly detailed account of his secluded life-why did he leave? what did he learn?-as well as the challenges he has faced since returning to the world. 




After Tova Sullivan's husband died, she began working the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, mopping floors and tidying up. Keeping busy has always helped her cope, which she's been doing since her eighteen-year-old son, Erik, mysteriously vanished on a boat in Puget Sound over thirty years ago. Tova becomes acquainted with curmudgeonly Marcellus, a giant Pacific octopus living at the aquarium. Marcellus knows more than anyone can imagine but wouldn't dream of lifting one of his eight arms for his human captors—until he forms a remarkable friendship with Tova. Ever the detective, Marcellus deduces what happened the night Tova's son disappeared. And now Marcellus must use every trick his old invertebrate body can muster to unearth the truth for her before it's too late.

The One Hundred Years of Lennie and Margot, by Marianne Cronin

This Book Club Set was purchased because of a request from a CPLS library. It is a debut novel labeled "charming, fiercely alive and disarmingly funny." The System has 10 copies.

Seventeen-vear-old Lenni Pettersson lives on the Terminal Ward at the Glasgow Princess Royal Hospital. Though the teenager has been told she's dying, she still has plenty of living to do. Joining the hospital's arts and crafts class, she meets the magnificent Margot, an 83-year-old, purplepajama-wearing, fruitcake-eating rebel, who transforms Lenni in ways she never imagined. As their friendship blooms, a world of stories opens for these unlikely companions who, between them, have been alive for one hundred years. Though their days are dwindling, both are determined to leave their mark on the world. With the help of Lenni's doting palliative care nurse and Father Arthur, the hospital's patient chaplain, Lenni and Margot devise a plan to create one hundred paintings showcasing the stories of the century they have lived—stories of love and loss, of courage and kindness, of unexpected tenderness and pure joy.

Though the end is near, life isn't quite done with these unforgettable women just yet.

Libraries are community centers and technology hubs and contain many other resources available for everyone and anyone. And **The Reading List**, by debut author Sara Nisha Adams, is all about how libraries are much more than what they carry on the shelves.

We follow two reluctant readers: Widower Mukesh, who, upon reading an old library book left by his late wife, finds comfort and solace in the characters who help the memory of his wife live on. Energized by the experience, Mukesh decides to make an effort to connect with his shy granddaughter through her love of books leading him to a small Wembley library. In the library, we meet Aleisha, a disillusioned but whip-smart teen working in the slowly dying library over the summer to support her sick mother. Aleisha has no particular love for libraries or books until she is handed a mysterious list of books titled "Just in case you need it." Inexplicably drawn to reading the first on the list, **To Kill a Mockingbird**, Aleisha encourages Mukesh to read it as well. Soon they are both making their way down the list and are surprised to find how much they want to talk with someone about the books or maybe just to talk with someone at all.

Much like the *Sisterhood of the Traveling Pants*, the titular "list" in The Reading List serendipitously makes its way across London, finding people who could use a break or a breakthrough. When tragedy strikes, the group's bond and the lessons they learned from the mysterious reading list and each other become more important than ever.

New to our collection, *The Reading List* is the perfect book club pick because it centers around characters who inexplicably find themselves in a far-reaching book club. In the beginning, Aleisha and Mukesh are nervous about discussing the books themselves, feeling like they need to be some sort of expert or have an earth-shattering revelation to be worth sharing. Still, as time goes on, they gain confidence in sharing their ideas. While each book might not be the ideal fit, they still find something to discuss and enjoy. The idea of the modern-day book club started as an avenue to encourage open discussion, and they still play an essential role in expressing that inherent want to connect (but I may be biased). People are always looking for connection and community; reading and hearing others' stories and struggles makes us more open, compassionate, and self-confident. Unlike other "books about books," there is no magic library or all-powerful novel in *The Reading List*. Instead, there is simply the magic and importance of people. And at the end of the day, the people and their community are the most critical asset to libraries.

Central Plains Library System Hybrid Board Meeting April 14, 2023, 10:00 a.m.

Call to order and roll call: President Terri Johnson called the meeting to order at 10:07 a.m. Secretary Terri Eberly took roll call.

Present: Sharon Bohlin, Jody Crocker, Jamie Dennis, Sherri Dux-Ideus, Terri Eberly, Janene Hill, Terri Johnson, Kina Stefka, James Tidei. **Absent:** Doris Brandon, Stephanie Branham, Lisa Mount. **Others in attendance:** Denise Harders, Autumn Carlson, Christa Porter, Tim Johnson.

Approval of the minutes: Spelling corrections to the minutes, rae/Rate, Krista/Christa. It was moved by Jamie Dennis and seconded by James Tidei to approve the minutes with the spelling corrections. The minutes were approved as corrected.

Financial Report: Denise reviewed the financial report and clarified spending in some of the categories. It was recommended to change the title of other expenses to reimbursable expenses for clarification. It was moved by Jamie Dennis and seconded by Sherri Dux-Ideus to approve the financial report. The financial report was approved as circulated.

Correspondence: Denise read correspondence

Director's Report: Denise reported on the activities of the CPLS office.

- Busy with the SRP distributed 445 Craft kits/380 die cut shapes.
- Several workshops were held, along with the Thursday morning meetings with 13–22 attending each session, visits to libraries within the system.
- Denise informed the board of censorship in Fremont, NE. City Council passed an amendment allowing parents or legal guardians to relocate any book from the children's section of the library to the adult section, if their child is eleven years old or younger and they feel the content is not age appropriate. This comes on the heels of one Fremont citizen's continued attempts to ban sex education and LGBTQ+ books from the public library. The NLA firmly stands in opposition to this amendment. Be aware of the attempts to censor books in our communities, keep your library boards aware of issues as they arise.

Old Business:

- CPLS invested funds in a CD with Edward Jones as directed at the January meeting. 4.75 annual rate.
- CPLS Biennial Conference- "Tools of the Trade", will be held October 19, 2023, at the Kearney Public Library. The system has put out a call for presenter proposals. Commission presentations to consider include ILL program/Tech Kits/Intellectual Freedom.
- Three areas of programming: 1. Director oriented 2. Library Programs 3. Areas of interest for school librarians. Lightening rounds will be held during lunch and Keynote speaker. There is a lot of excitement surrounding the conference.
- 2023-24 Nonprofit Corporation Biennial Report was completed.

Summer Reading Performer, David Marsh, is being made available to the libraries in the system. The \$50.00 fee will be paid for the program. Libraries request the performer through Humanities Nebraska. So far 17 libraries have booked the performance.

New Business:

- CD at Lincoln Federal is coming due in August. The current rate is very low. Board discussed whether to cash before maturity and take penalty and invest the funds at the higher rate at Edward Jones. A motion was made by Terri Eberly and seconded by James Tidei to cash CD 03 216706 07 in the principle amount of \$10,462.87 before the maturity date of 8/21/23, knowing there is a penalty for early withdrawal, putting the proceeds in a Cashier's Check or Money Order payable to CPLS and reinvesting \$10,000.00 of the funds with Edward Jones. Motion carried. Another motion was made by Kina Stefka and seconded by Jamie Dennis that if the penalty for early withdrawal is greater than explained or the penalty would decrease the principle balance that Denise Harders would contact board members before acting. Motion carried. Doris Brandon resignation. Denise received a letter from Doris on 2/2 stating that for personal reasons she was submitting her letter of resignation from the CPLS board. The resignation was accepted. The by-laws indicate that we can operate as normal with the number of board members remaining. The position will be put on the ballot at the annual meeting. • CD at Lincoln Federal is coming due in August. The current rate is very low. Board

Nominate Books Now for the 2023 Nebraska Book Awards

The 2023 Nebraska Book Awards program, sponsored by the Nebraska Center for the Book (NCB) and Nebraska Library Commission, will recognize and honor books that are written by Nebraska authors, published by Nebraska publishers, set in Nebraska, or relate to Nebraska.

Books published in 2022, as indicated by the copyright date, are eligible for nomination. They must be professionally published, have an International Standard Book Number (ISBN), and be bound. Books may be entered in one or more of the following categories: Nonfiction, Fiction, Children/Young Adult, Cover/Design/Illustration, and Poetry.
