SCHOOL HISTORY

A little school house, half sod and half dug-out, which stood just east of the present city limits of Scotia was the first educational opportunity available to the children of this community.

Later in the fall of 1875, a small courthouse was built. This humble structure was also used for school purposes. Mr. E. Craig held school in the same rooms where the county clerk would be busy over his paper.

In 1887 Scotia Precint built a \$5,000 courthouse which a short time later, being empty was used for normal and business college.

Scotia grew steadily and in the meantime a four-room structure was built north of Scotia to house the first ten grades of school children.

However, as time went on the community again outgrew its school. In the year of 1920, the citizens of districts 1, 3, 8, 41, and 48, voted that one big school should be built. Accordingly a \$100,000 school building was erected so that we might meet higher educational standards and that we might not leave the history that the early pioneer made unchronicled, unsung.

Today the Scotia Consolidated Schools meets the highest requirements of the State of Nebraska. It employs only the most qualified teachers. It offers five complete courses, including College Preparatory, Normal Training, Commercial, Smith-Hughes Vocational Agriculture, and Smith-Hughes Home Economics and a well-rounded activity program, including Music, Dramatics, and Athletics.

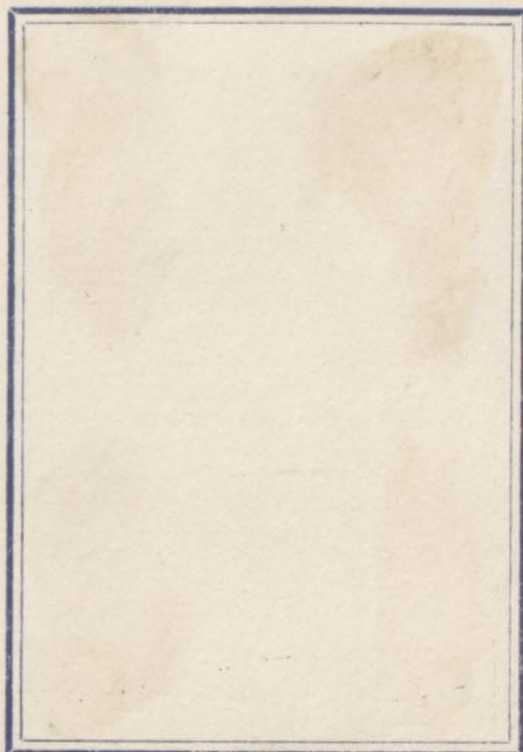

One bright September morning in the year of 1925, an exceptionally smart group of children launched upon their educational career. WINE

I have selected for my topic this evening "wine." For wine is the living blood of the grape. In this address I shall liken your lives to the process of making wine. Just as there are three possible levels that we can reach in life's journey, so are there three levels in the process of making a superior wine.

The first level in the processing of wine is grape juice, or in your lives the period when you first enter school. Grape juice is not merely a solution of grape sugar and water; it contains a large variety of acids and other different substances, which are present in minute quantities only but which play an important part in the type and quality of the wine which will eventually grow out of the grape juice.

Some of these substances present in the wine were present in the original grape juice. But after fermentation, there are substances in the wine of which no trace appeared in the grape juice.

When you first entered school you possessed traits and habits which have now almost disappeared as a result of training and education. And on the other hand you now have acquired traits which you did not have then. For example, self-control, moderation, fortitude. The command of these is an unfolding process, which requires patience and perseverance. These traits and habits determine the final type and quality of your character.

The different varieties of wine are very numerous. There are wines of all shades of color ranging from the palest greenish yellow to the darkest red; there are wines which are a little dry or sweet and others which are sparkling; there are wines which are ready for consumption when they are quite young and others which are at their best when, 10, 15, 20, or even 50 years old.

Just so can you Seniors be classified on your graduation day!

But no wines, whatever their age or their color, can be suitable or even acceptable unless they are sound. This is the only rule which applies to all wine without exception. A sound wine is a normal wine, a well-balanced wine, a harmonious whole; it is a wine

made of the juice of freshly gathered grapes, either completely or partially fermented and containing nothing but the normal natural by-product of normal fermentation.

Can you Seniors ask yourselves this question, "Am I sound?" and answer it in the affirmative? If you can, then you have reached the second level in life's journey. (That is, have you done the best you could with the opportunities that have been afforded you in developing a well-balanced personality?)

All of you can strive to be like fine wines--wines which are perfectly balanced, but such wines lack that sparkling vitality which makes superior wine. They are like those who travel the road which moves uneventfully forward, providing little excitement, little success, little of disappointment, just colorless monotony.

Some of you will not be content with mediocre lives. You will overcome your difficulties and seek lasting success by embarking upon the third and last level of life's journey, or be like sparkling wine.

All wines might be made into sparkling wines, but only the lighter types of wine are suitable for the purpose, wines with greater "finesse" than strength, with greater breed than body. Those of you who are not content with mediocre lives, must then develop personalities to the utmost.

Some of you will despair and bemoan your handicaps and say that you haven't the opportunities that others have to travel in this last level. But take your lesson from the wine that is grown in the Champagne district of France--the birthplace of sparkling wine--grown upon a soil so poor, under climatic conditions and other conditions so difficult, that large yields are out of the question, and grapes of the finest breed can alone be reared and are grown for quality, not for quantity, then alone can fine still wines be made which will be still finer as sparkling superior wines. To travel in the last level is one of struggle, but the prize is big! The game is a battle, but the reward is victory.

You select! You decide!
