#### Vocational Agriculture Curriculum

JOHN G. DAVIS-INSTRUCTOR

Animal husbandry comprises a study of the feeding and the care of all breeds of farm animals and poultry.

Farm crops and soils consists of a study of the cultural methods of crops grown in the middle west, in their relationship to the soil, weeds, insects, diseases, and rainfall.


Farm management is a study of farming in its relation to important pres-

ent day problems and practices confronting the farmer.

Farm shop is a three-year course including a study of rope work, soldering, leather work, blue prints, figuring bills of lumber, wood work, tools, forge, machinery, concrete work, and rural electrification. Each boy carries one or more projects during the year which puts into practice class room instruction.

Vocational agriculture is a popular course in the Scotia schools. Fifty boys

are enrolled which makes our department one of the largest in the state.



#### Vocational Agriculture Building

The above agriculture building was constructed in 1937 by the school district and the Works Progress Administration at a small cost to the district. Most of the material in it was salvaged from the old school house that stood on the north hill. Very little new material was used.

The building houses the complete agriculture department which includes a class room, a wood working room, a forge room, and a paint room; up-to-date in every respect.

The normal training course consists of two classes in reviews, one class in professional training and other related subjects including normal training music, American history, advanced civics, sociology, agriculture and geography of Nebraska, etc.

#### College Preparatory Course

The College Preparatory Course prepares the pupils primarily for college entrance. Academic majors and minors are offered in English, mathematics, language, social sciences, and sciences.

Scotia credits are accepted for full value by the various colleges and universities. A complete college preparatory curriculum is offered. Many students

avail themselves of this course each year.

#### Commercial Course

The Commercial Course offers pupils those fundamentals that will help them decide whether or not they wish to choose commercial work as a life vocation. It also helps many secure positions in the business world. A complete course is offered which consists of typewriting, shorthand, English, mathematics, bookkeeping, business training, office practice, etc. The Commercial curriculm is very popular with the students.

#### General Course

Everyone is urged to choose and continue with one definite course. However, provisions are made for a general course, made up of the various subjects offered. It has few requirements other than the regular 32 credits required for graduation.
