MISS VIOLA CLEMENT

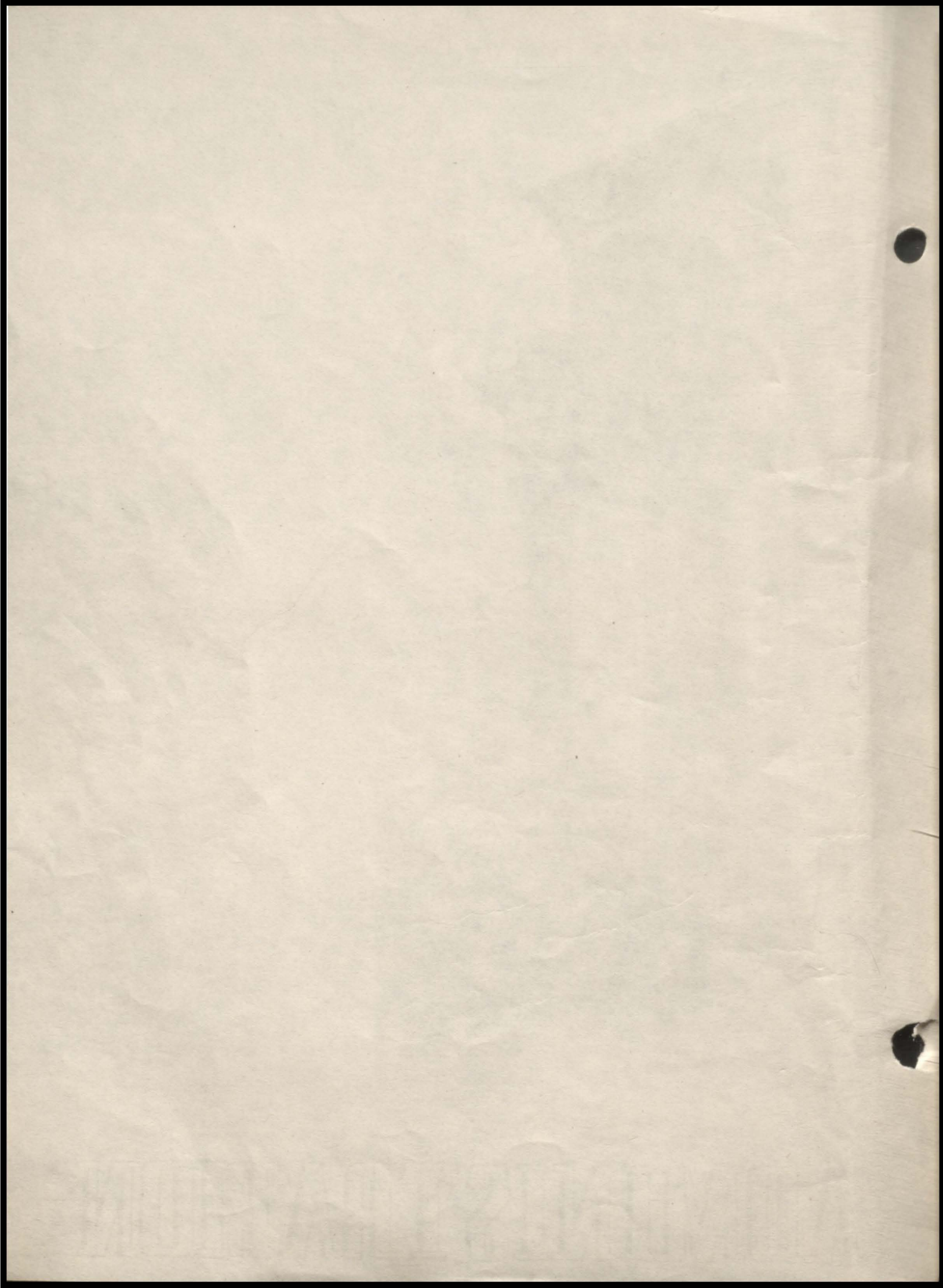
Attended Kearney State Teachers College for two years and has a Junior Elementary Certificate. She has had fourteen years experience. She teaches 4th and 5th grades.

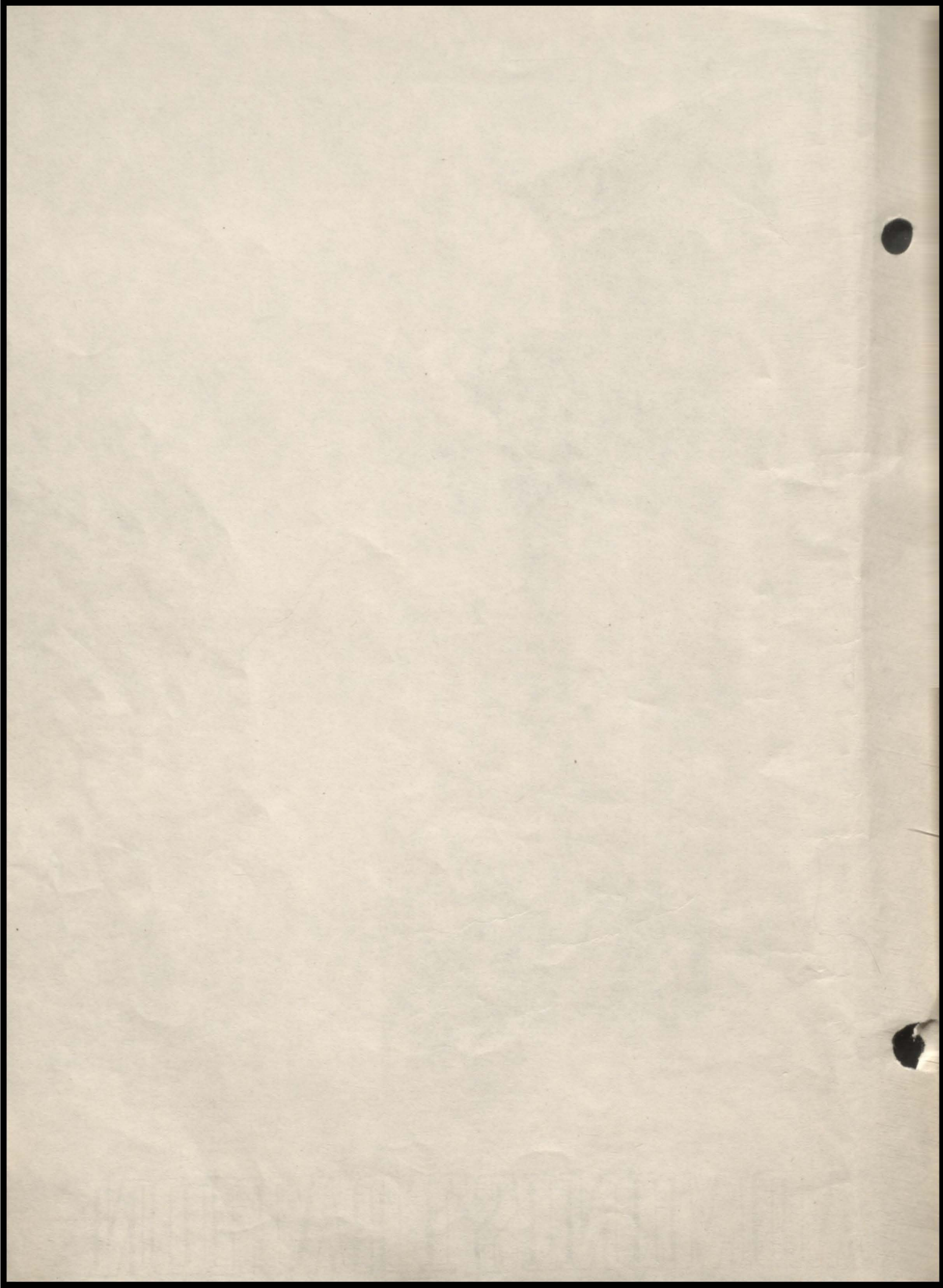
MISS BETTY BONSAR


MR. BROOK TAKES OVER


A full featured motion picture ended the evening's entertainment.

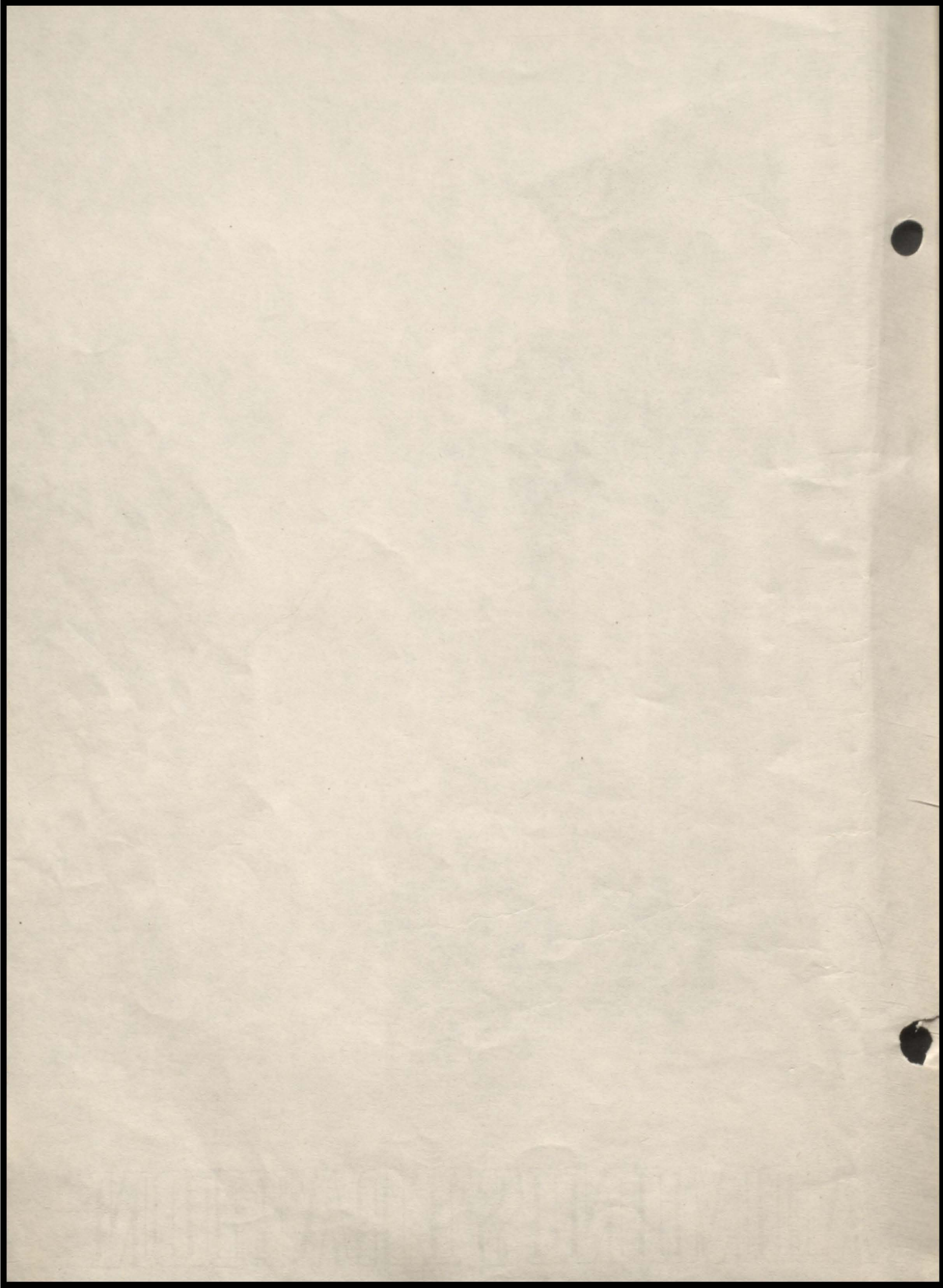



VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

During the year, thirty-five boys enrolled in vocational agriculture. All freshmen boys are required to take Ag. I (animal husbandry). Their class work consists of the proper care of farm animals, their diseases and causes, etc. The Ag. II course (farm crops and soils) includes identification of farm seeds and soils of different kinds. The Ag. III course (farm management), consists of studying about market fluctuation, proper care, and the operation of a farm.

Each of the three classes has certain required projects in shop which must be completed by the end of the school term.

A new central toolroom has been built for the shop. During shop periods, one of the boys stays in the toolroom to check equipment in and out. This has proved very satisfactory. Through the aid of the Federal Government and the school, many new tools and power machines are being added. In addition to the full line of small shop tools, a jig-saw, buzz-saw, power grinder, post drill, and arc welder have been added to the electrical equipment. An acetylene-oxygen welder has been furnished to the school by the Government.

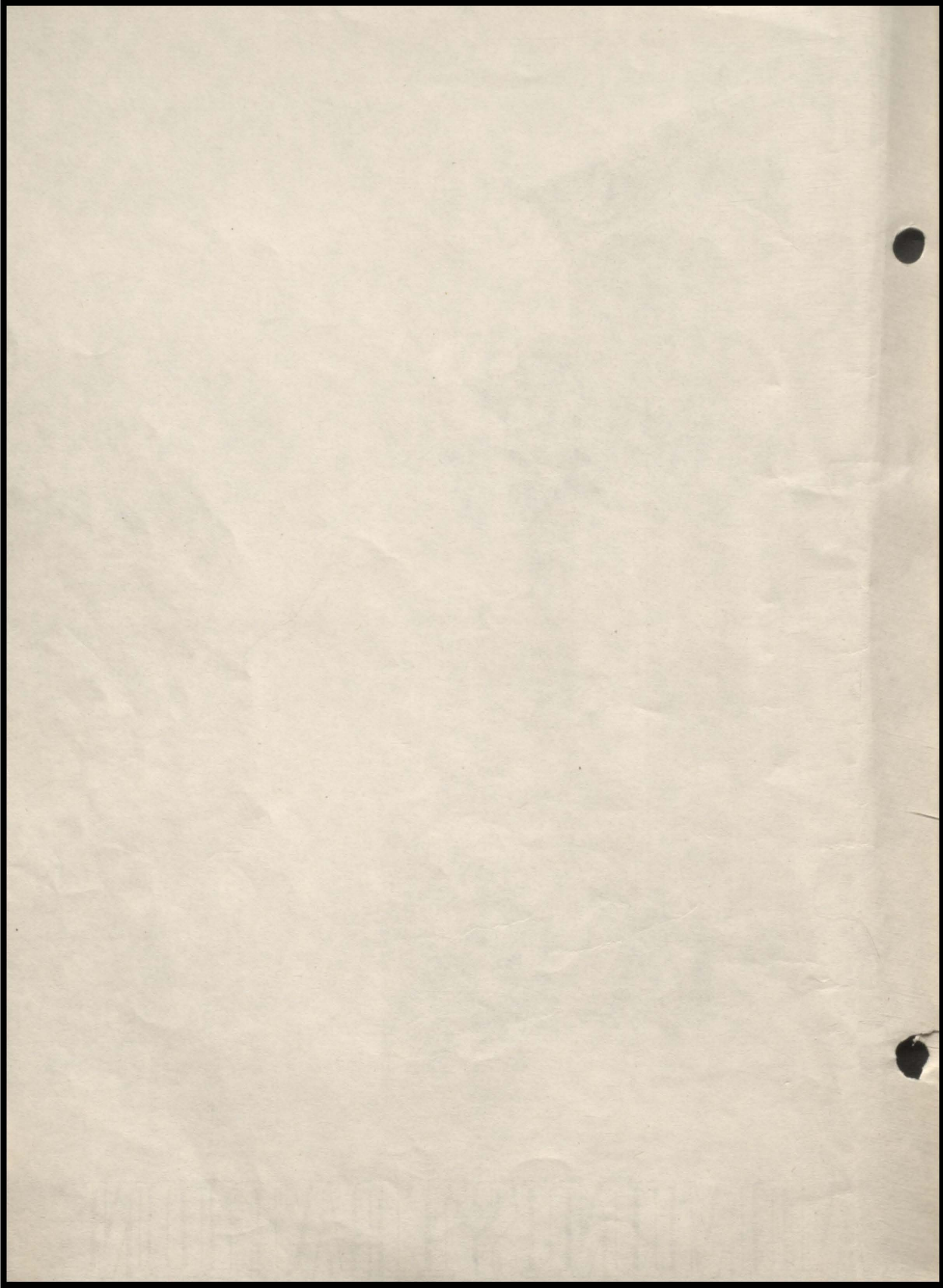
COLLEGE PREPARATORY


One of the most important courses offered in the Scotia schools is the college preparatory course. It completely prepares the pupil for college entrance. The course consists of four years of English, two or three years of mathematics, two years of social science, two years of science, and other subjects of individual interest. A complete program of activities is available which prepares the graduate for college life.

This course meets the requirements of all colleges and universities and so the graduate can be accepted without special examinations. All students planning to enter college should take this course. Scotia is proud of her many college graduates.

GENERAL COURSE

The requirements for the completion of the general course includes four years of English, three years of an elective and two years of at least three other subjects. A complete program of activities is available to any student wishing them.

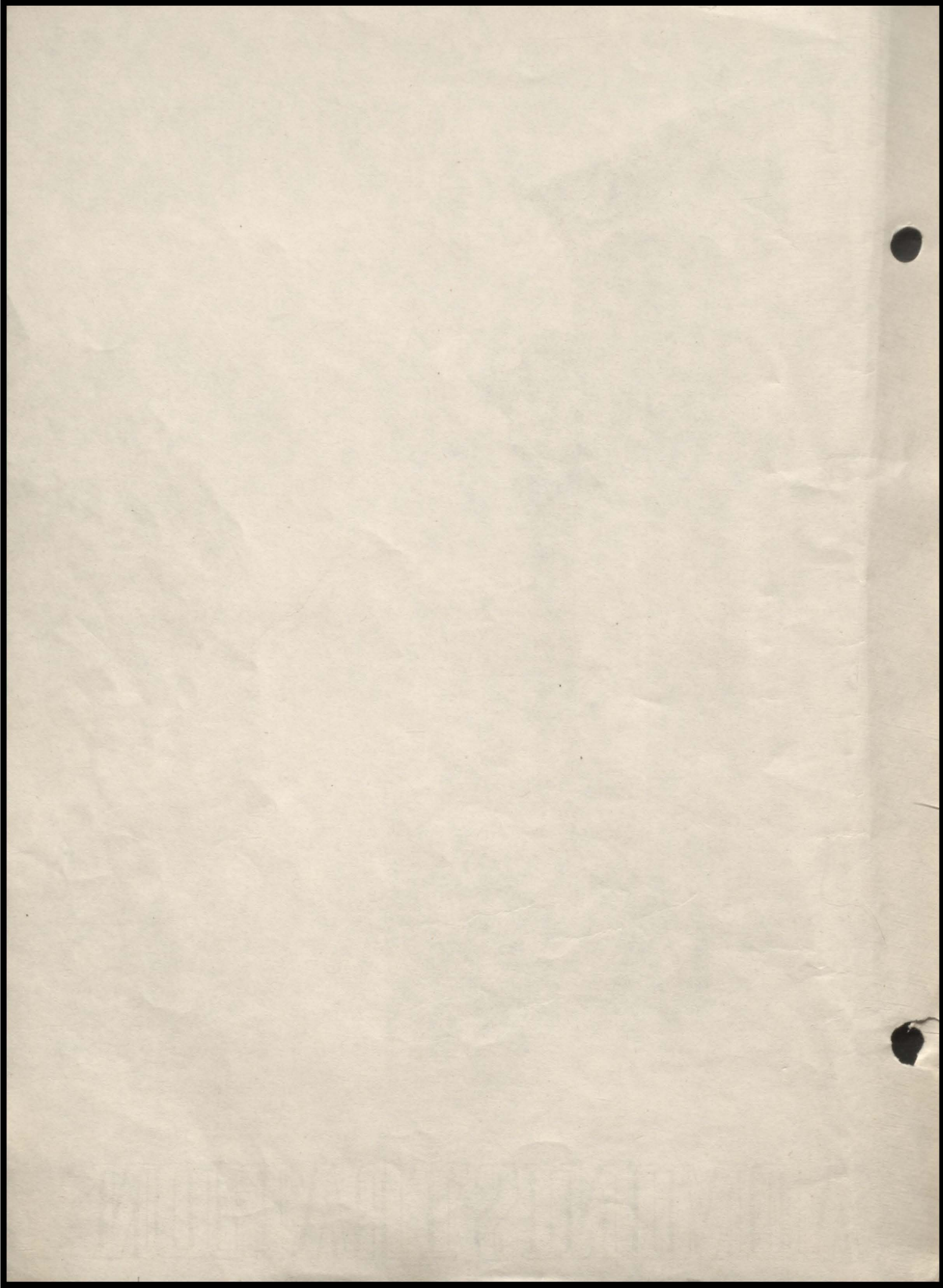
MYSTERY IN THE LIBRARY

COMMERCIAL

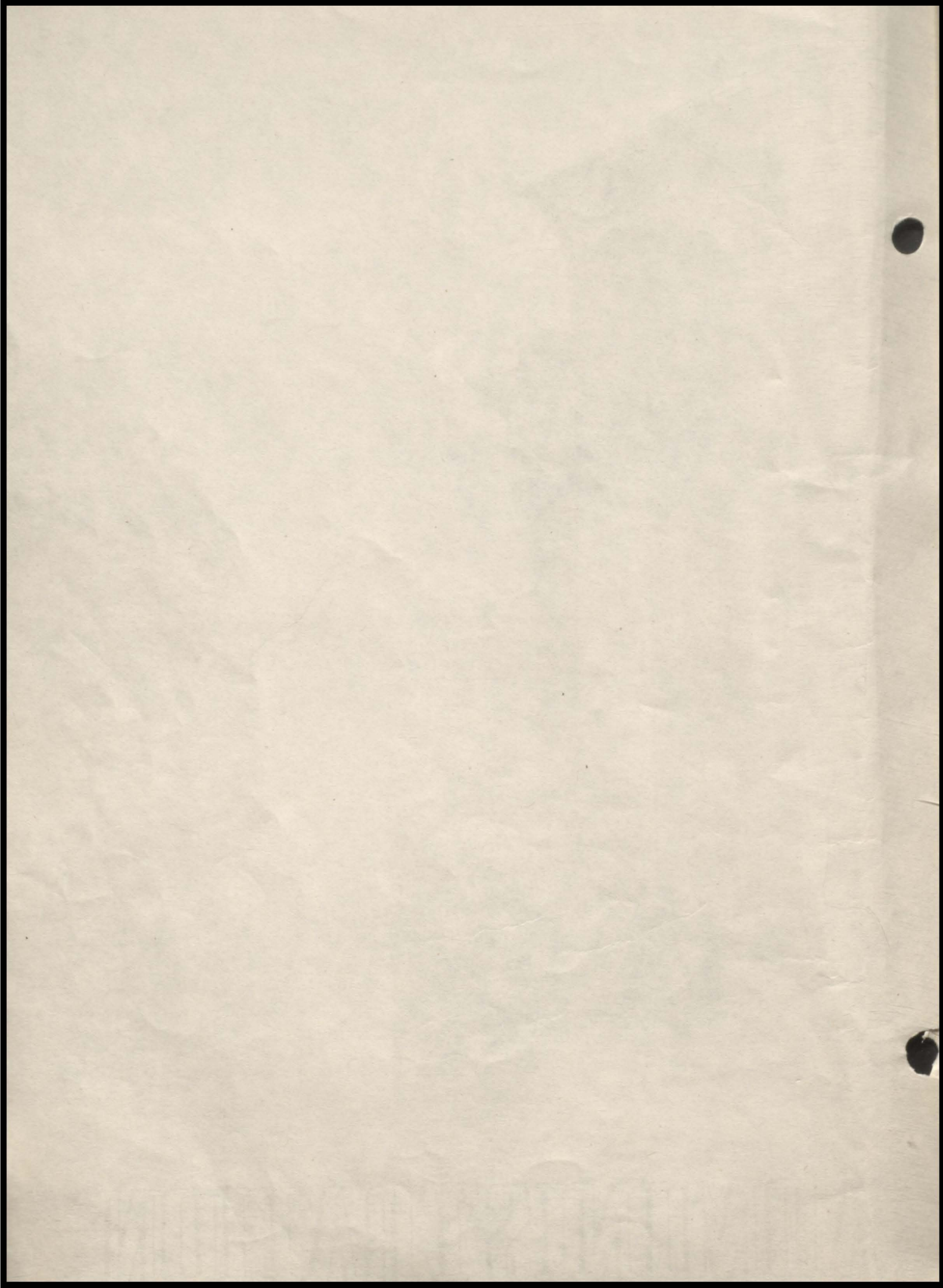
For the past five years the commercial department of Scotia High School has offered a very complete course including bookkeeping, typing, and business training.

Shorthand is a very important branch of the commercial department. Each student must acquire a sufficient skill in writing and transcribing of shorthand. This subject takes a lot of study and practice in order to acquire the technique in writing shorthand rapidly and correctly.

Bookkeeping helps the individual, the professional man, the business man, social organization, or the running of any business. This course consists of various books used in home, and office. Practice sheets with business papers help to make the course interesting.

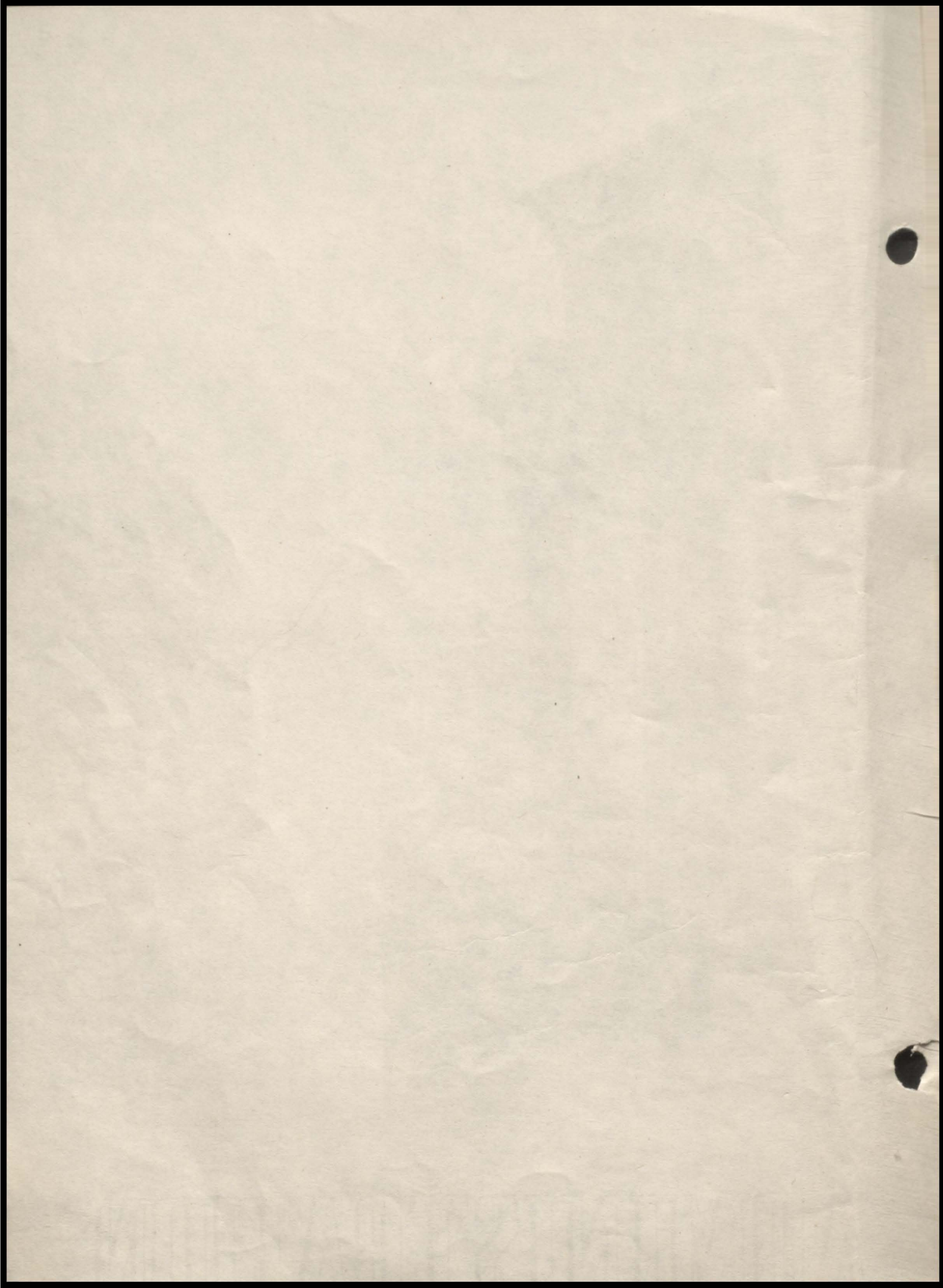
Typing seems to be the most interesting course in the commercial department. The classes are divided into two groups, typing I and typing II. In these classes we must use the essential rules of English, punctuation, paragraphing, and syllabication. Both personal and business letter writing, manuscripts, and stencils are included in the curriculum. The one minute accuracy and erasure time tests proved to be very interesting.

Office Practice is also offered in which the students work in the office under the supervision of Mr. Coonley. In this course the students answer the telephone, and do any routine work which Mr. Coonley may assign. We also have books for this course.

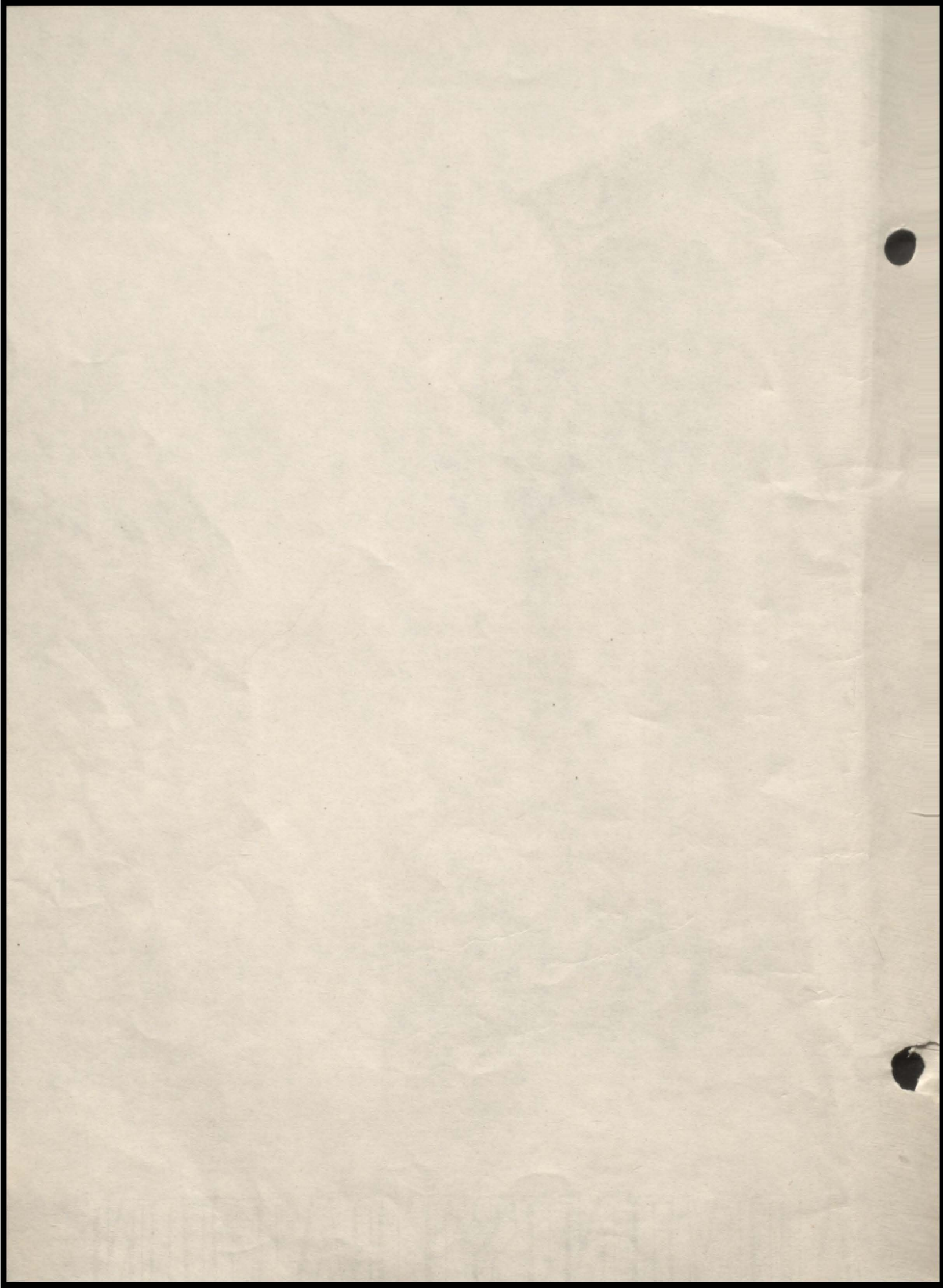

The first semester the Dramatics Club spent their time laying the foundation for readings and plays by studying the fundamentals of speech, and giving one entertainment before the assembly.

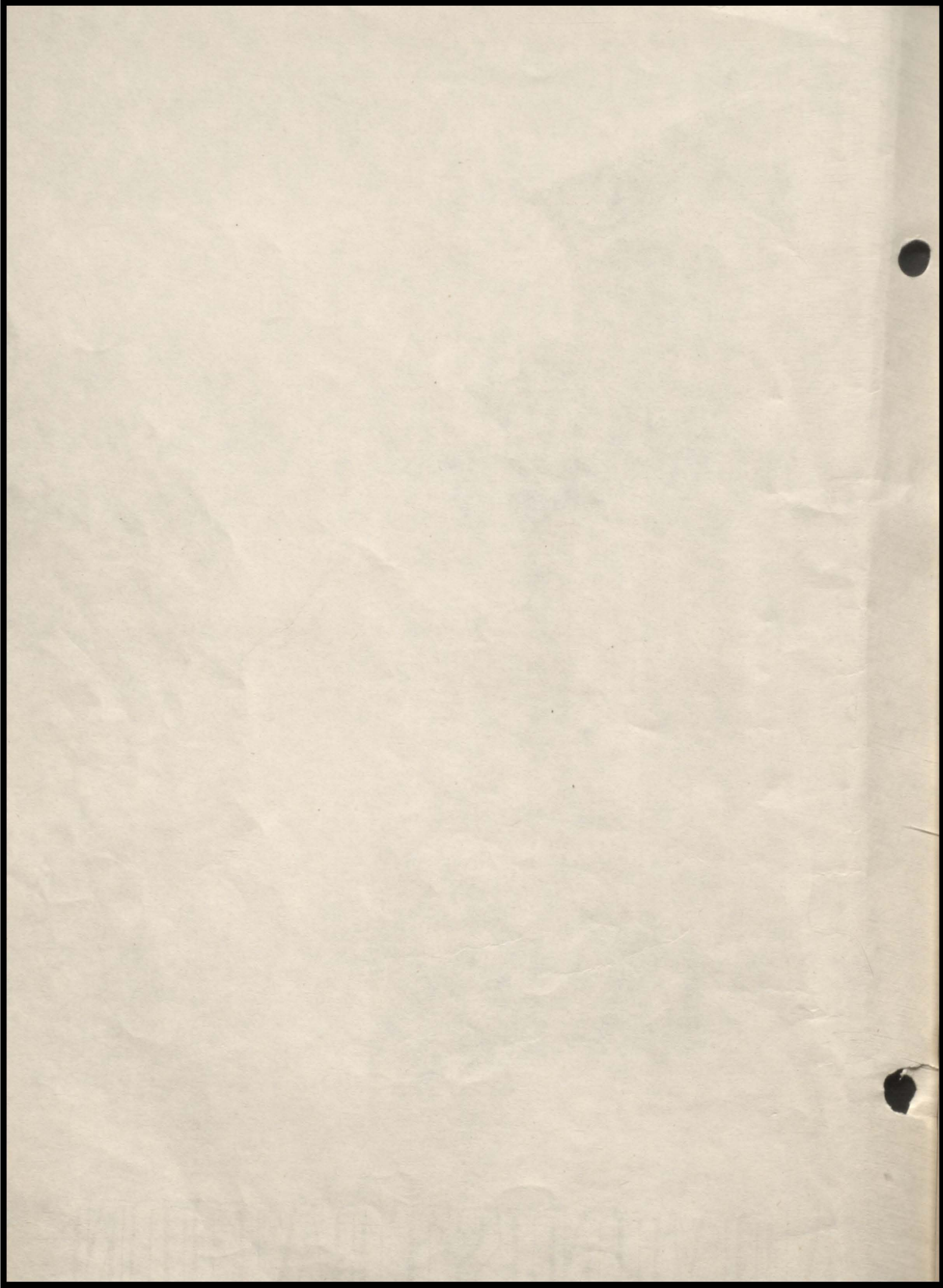

In April our party was held at Betty Jean Yax's. Games were played after which an enjoyable evening ended with a dainty lunch.

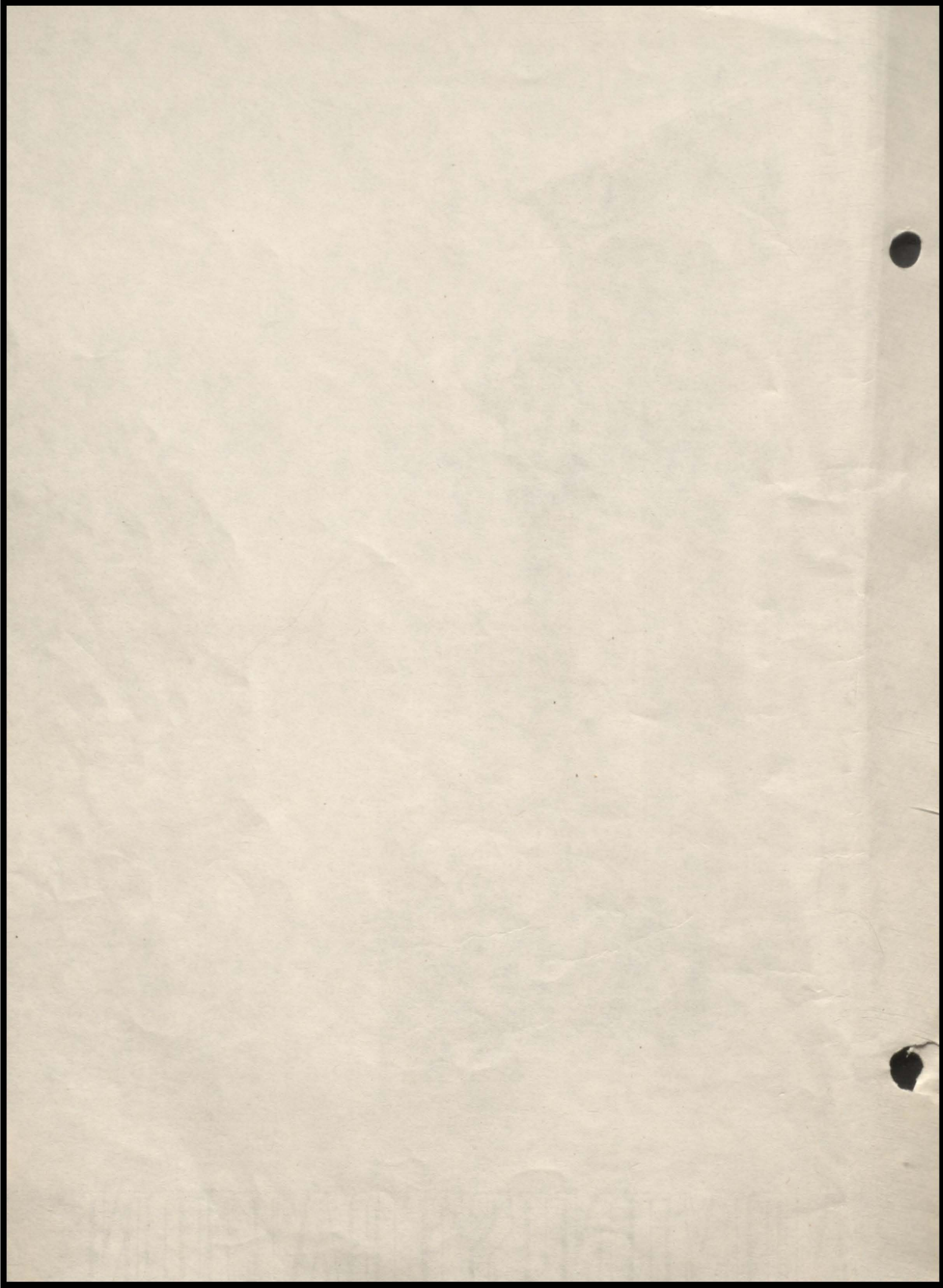
In May the Wits rented Violet's dance hall for their party. They all wore formals and tried to act very sophisticated!

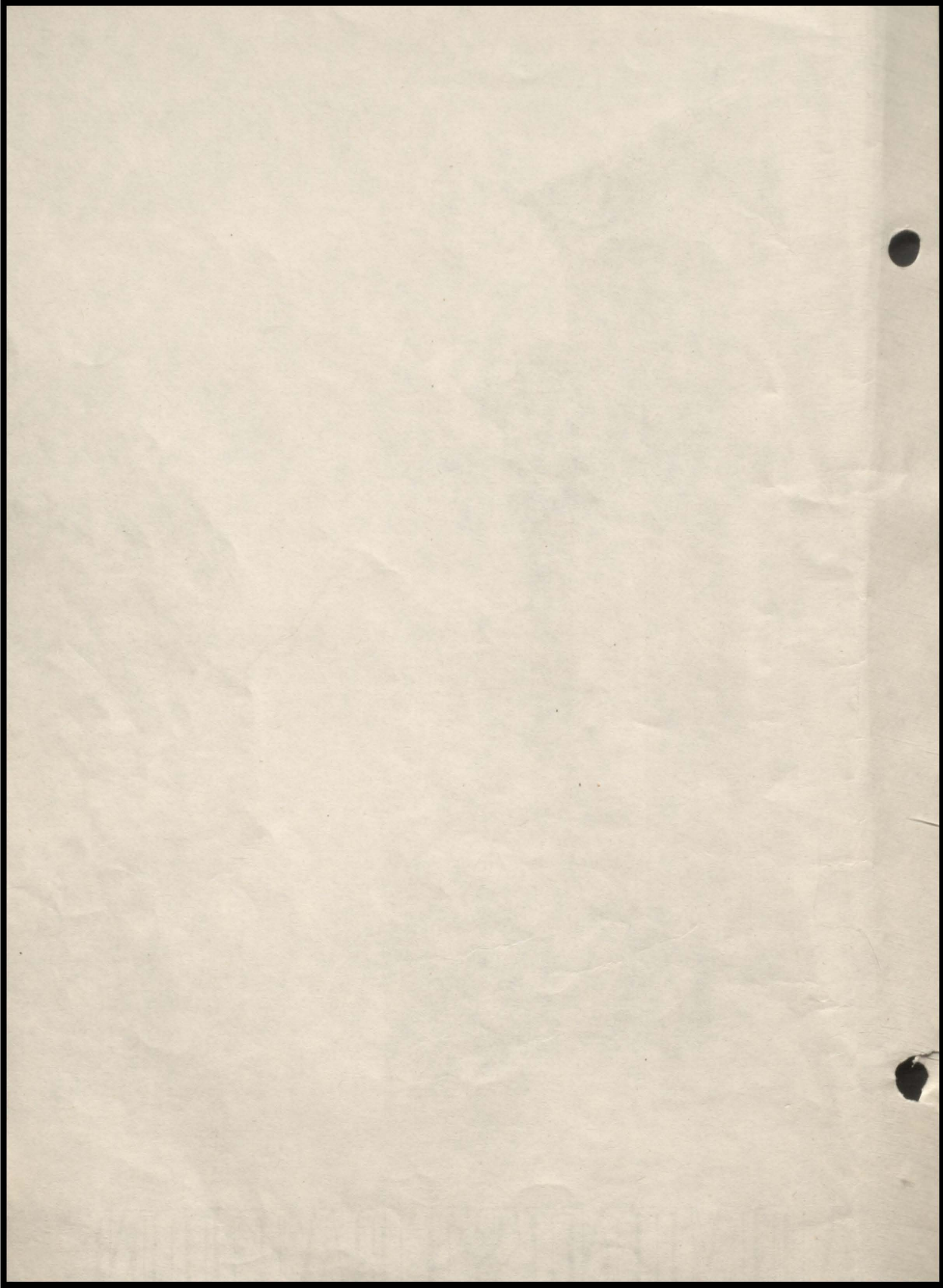




Miss Norma Wunder, state advisor and Rhoda Lange, state delegate, attended a state convention at Norfolk and a Four State Convention at Lincoln.

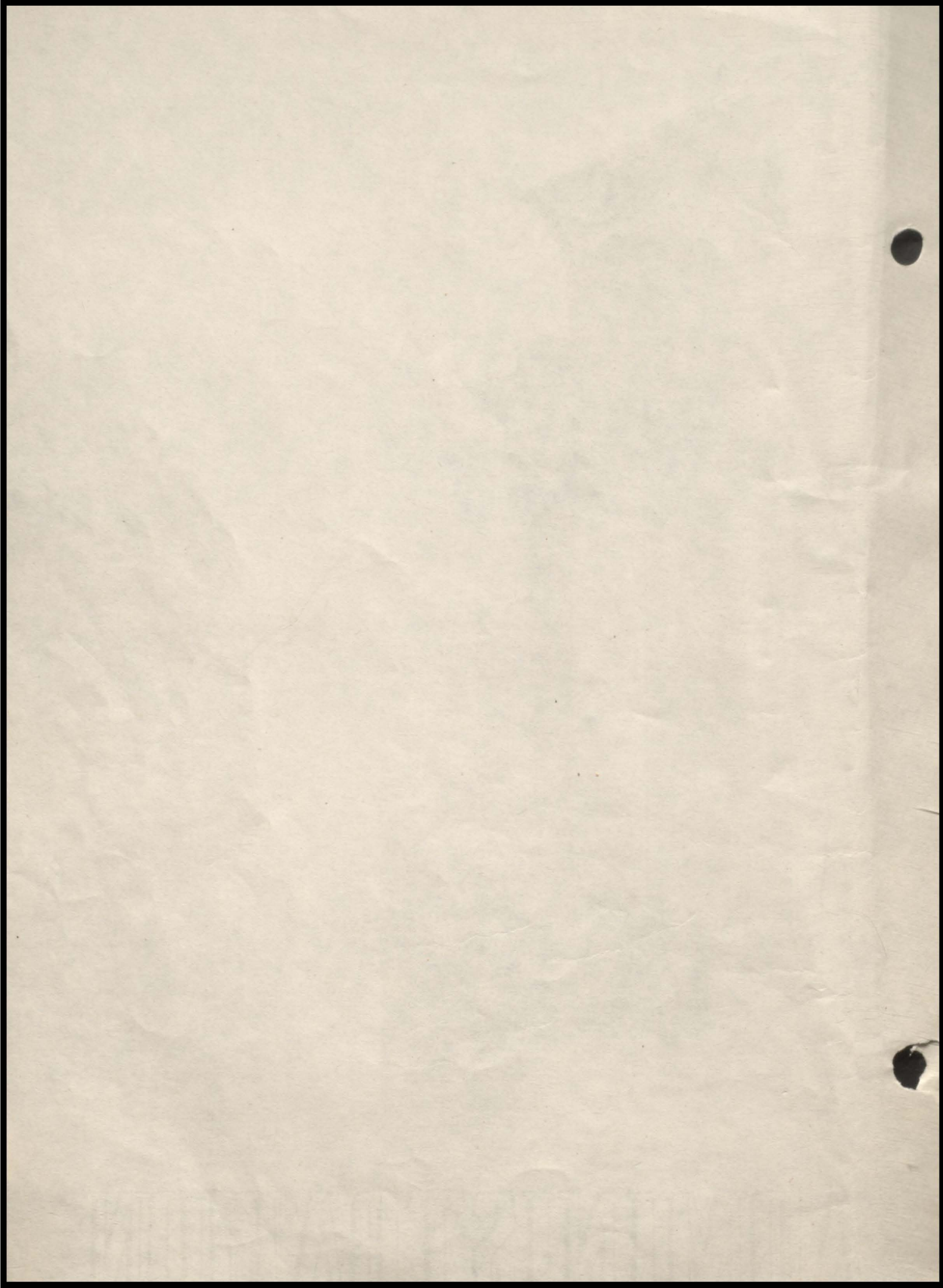

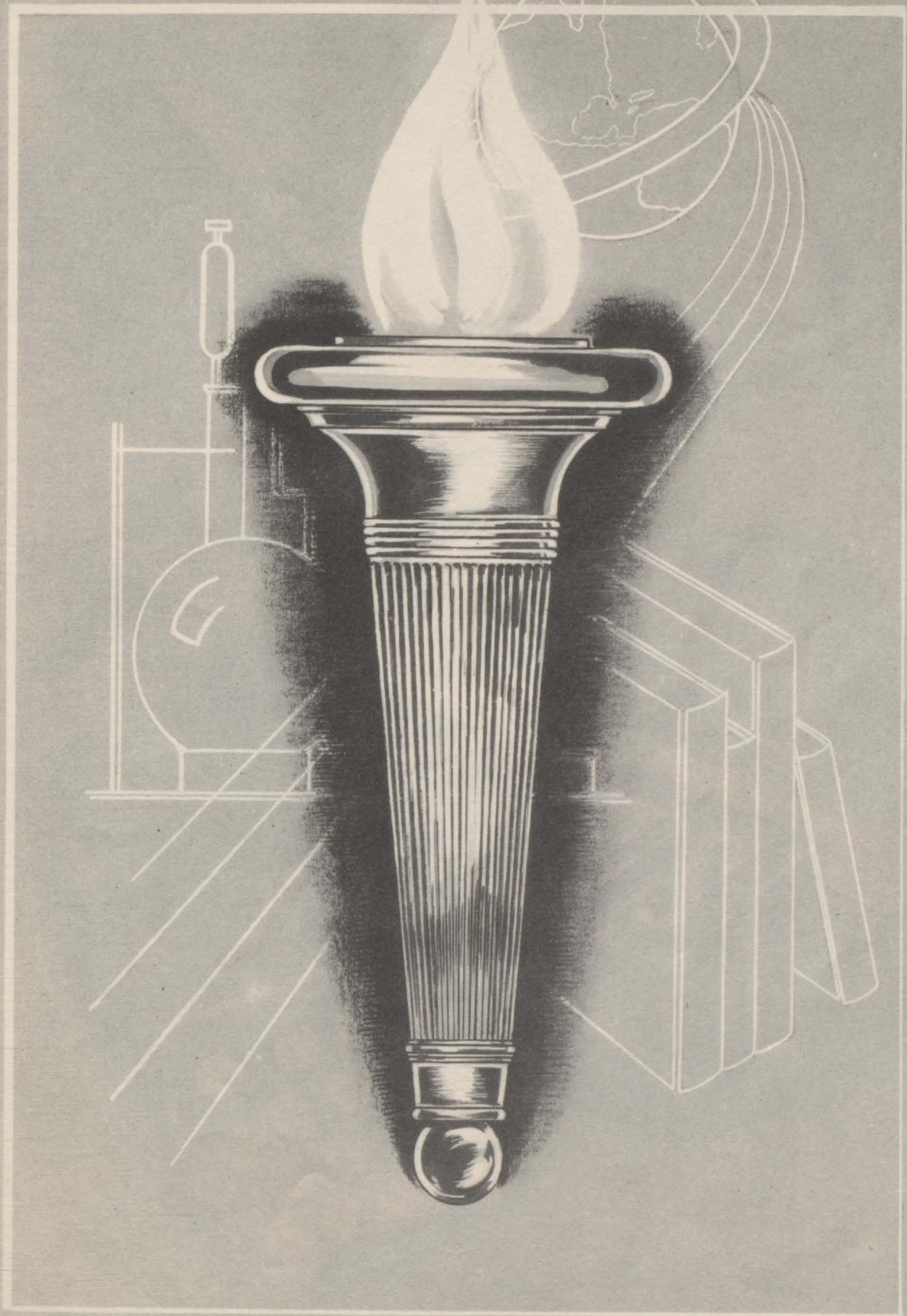

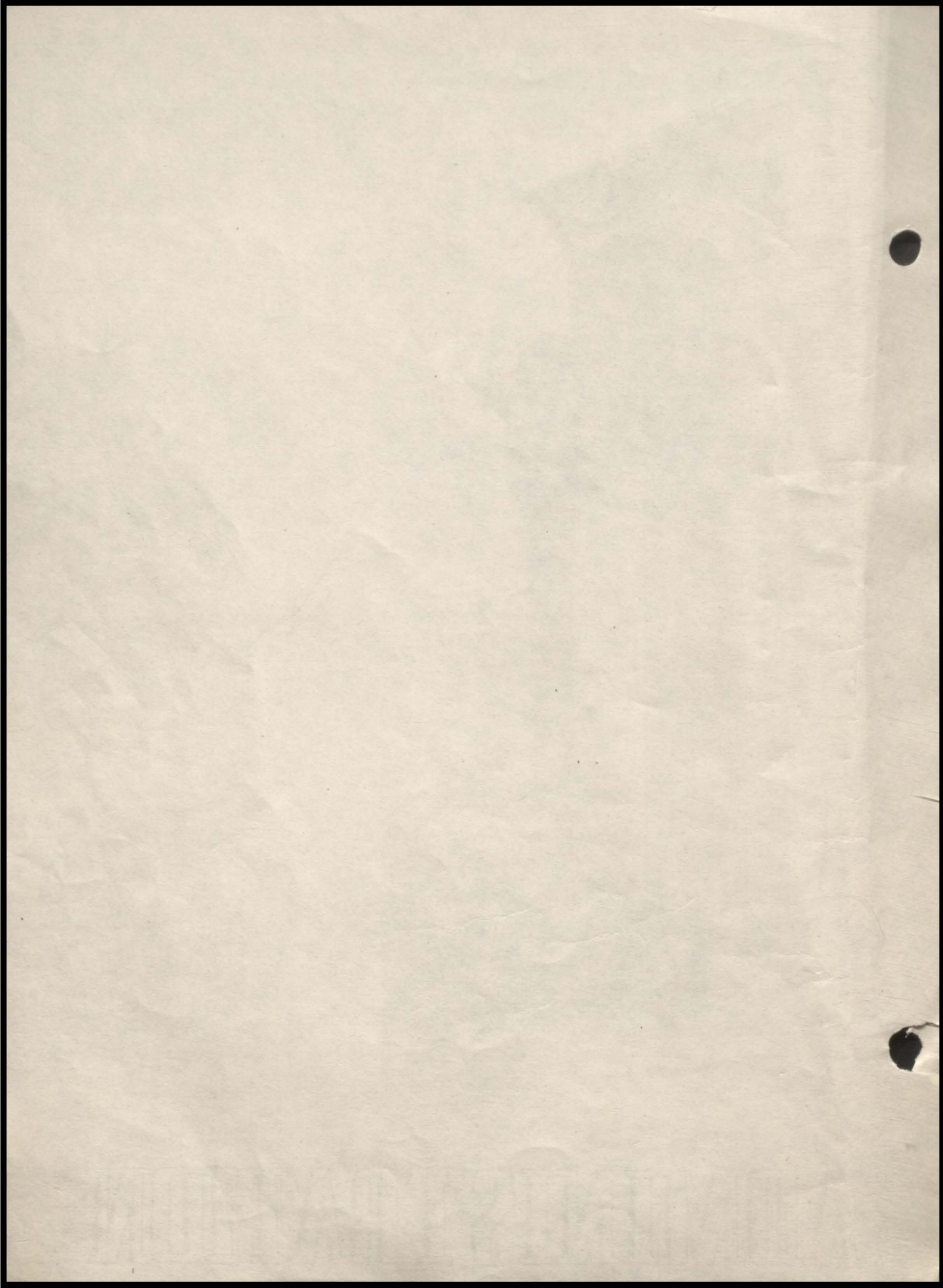
Our activities for the school year thus far have been an initiation ceremony and a party, a project tour and coyote hunt.

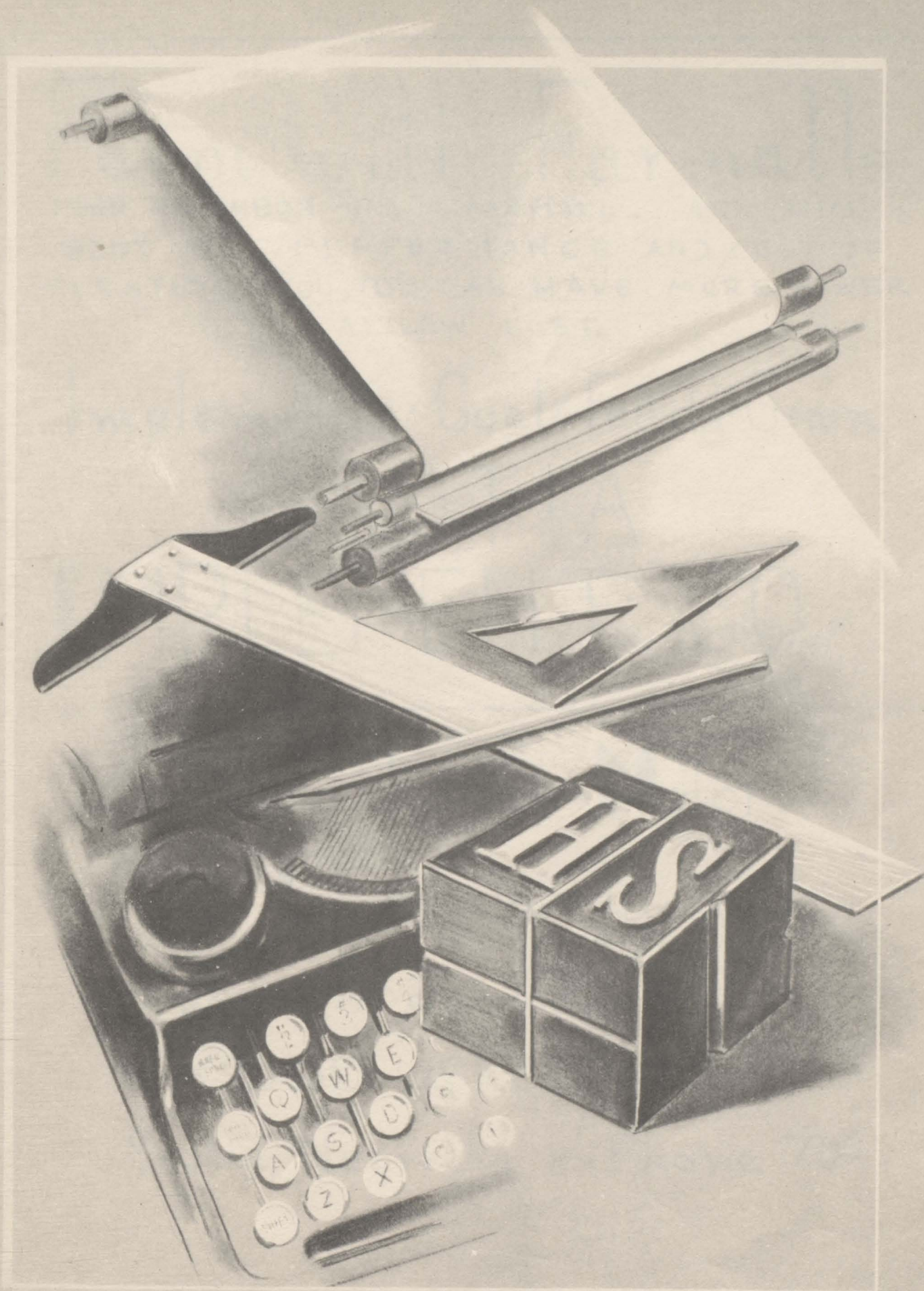
