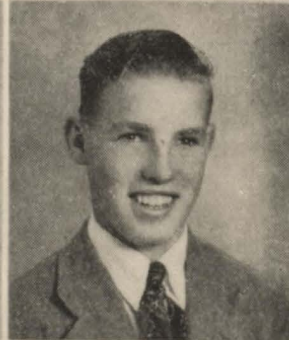

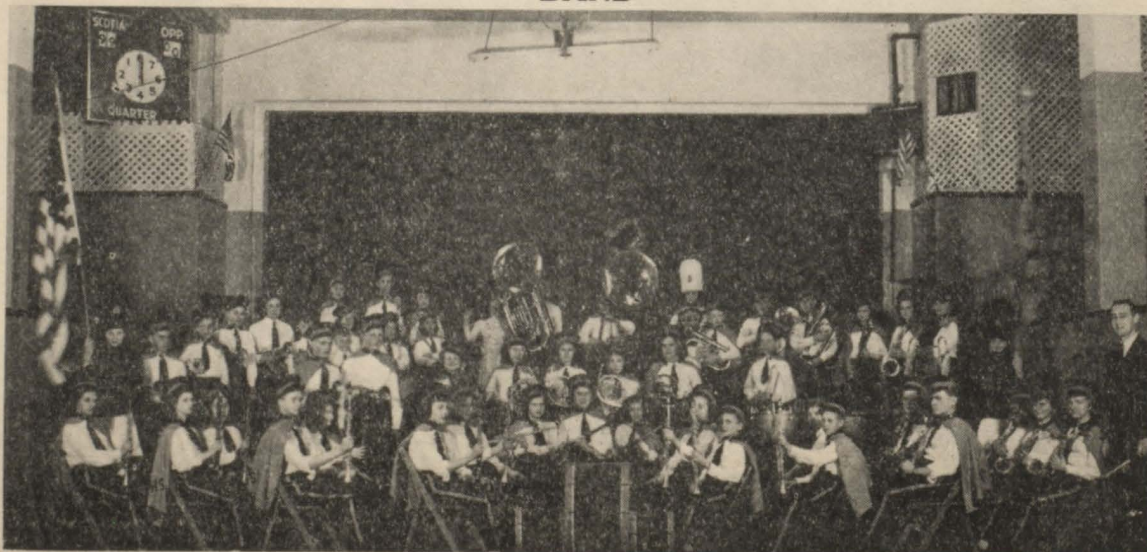

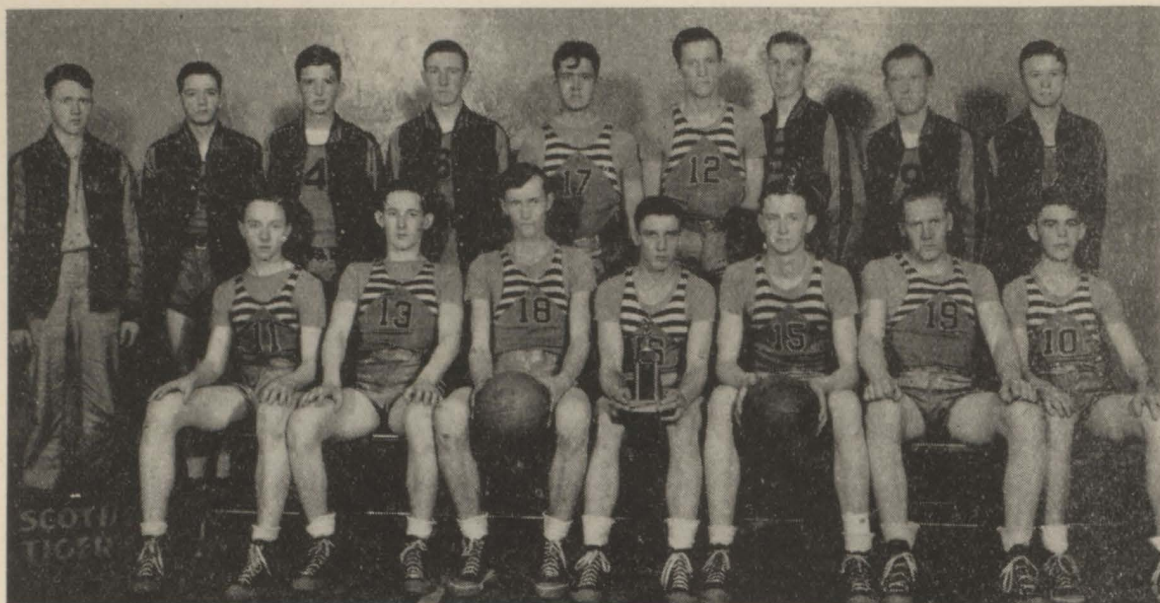
PEP SQUAD
