



Scotia went to Litchfield for its only afternoon game of the season on September 21. Litchfield, led by a junior halfback, Dean Roelle, proved to be an even match for the Tigers. Twice we had to come from behind to tie the score. The game was hampered by many penalties, mostly offside penalties.

The Tigers went to Comstock on September 28 and absorbed a 12-0 defeat. Portis did not see action because of a leg injury, and coach, to make matters even worse, was at home with an infected tooth. The first half ended with the Tigers on the Pirates' eight-yard line, but that was all the closer we could get.

Friday, October 5, found the St. Paul Wildcats at Scotia. Tiger miscues gave the Wildcats two first-quarter TD's. The final score was 27-0 with Scotia on the wrong side. The Tigers outdowned the Wildcats 12 to 6 and completed seven out of fifteen passes.

The Tigers went to Loup City on October 12 to absorb a 33-6 set-back at the hands of the Red Raiders. Portis highlighted the game for Scotia with a beautiful 85-yard run in the third quarter.

On October 19, Stromsburg invaded Scotia and carried home a 32 to 19 conquest. In the first half it was all Stromsburg, but Scotia came to life in the third quarter, playing alert ball, and scored 19 points to show their opponents that the Tigers could fight. But we spotted Stromsburg 13 points too many in the first half.

Football



Scotia won 14-6 in a hard-fought game with Portis, the Tiger captain, leading the way as he did in all the games. It gave the Tigers their first Loup Valley title.


