

When a team establishes a record of seven wins, one tie, and only one loss, probably the man deserving the most credit gets the least of it. That man is Don Keebaugh, better known as "Coach" to the boys. Mr. Keebaugh also teaches social science.

Although 38 boys reported to Coach Don Keebaugh with 11 of them returning lettermen, the outlook was not good because of a shortage of backfield material with experience; but after losing the first game, Scotia continued the season with no more defeats. The record, the best Tiger record in 19 years, was achieved by the effort of the entire team.

The first game was played on September 12 on the Burwell gridiron, and the Tigers took their first and only defeat. The Tigers were jittery and nervous and made three costly mistakes, giving the Longhorns 20 points while we could muster only 13.

On September 19, Scotia played Litchfield in a Loup Valley Conference game. The Tigers were determined to win this one, and did so with comparative ease, romping to a 32 to 6 victory, with the reserves seeing plenty of action.

The Tigers won their second conference game at the expense of Comstock, the team who shared top laurels with Scotia in 1951 in football. Beck highlighted the exciting game with a 70-yard kick-off return. The final score was 24 to 18.

On October 3, Scotia went to St. Paul to play the previously unbeaten Wildcats. Although Scotia's offense could not click because of St. Paul's rugged line, the Tigers also thwarted all of St. Paul's offensive threats. The score, therefore, ended in a scoreless tie. A large crowd, many of them Scotians, witnessed the thrilling deadlock.

For the first time in years the Tigers defeated Loup City, the score being 14 to 0. The Tiger line was at its best, and the crisp blocking and tackling of the Tigers was too much for the Red Raiders.

Coming from behind, the Scotians won another close game from Stromsburg on the Scotia field, 7 to 6. Neither team scored until the latter part of the second quarter when the Vikings pushed over from the one-yard line, giving them a 6 to 0 lead; but Scotia marched right back and scored, going ahead 7 to 6 as the half ended; and the score remained the same.

On October 24, Scotia went to Arcadia to play the undefeated Arcadia Huskies. The first half was scoreless, but in the third quarter, Scotia, in a sustained drive, took the kick-off and marched to a touchdown. The six-point lead was not enough because Arcadia scored immediately. In the fourth quarter Vance caught a TD pass which gave Scotia a 12.6 victory.

In the last home game of the season, Scotia had little trouble defeating Sargent 26-6. The Tigers were definitely "off," especially defensively, for they were unable to stop Sargent's big boys.

Scotia defeated Taylor 19-7 in the last game of the season, giving Scotia the undisputed championship of the Loup Valley Conference.


Athletic Banquet

This year we had a good schedule of meets but for the most part "old man weather" wasn't on our side in the early meets. One of the highlights of our season was the large turnout. All boys who expect to play football in the fall are asked to report in the spring for track. It is believed that the individual attention the boys receive in starts, conditioning, and endurance will stand them in good stead come fall. We also hope to qualify some boys for the state meet.



During our sophomore year we lost Delmar Iverson, Mickey Jeffres, Norma Madison, Leonard Bell, Sharon Fisher and gained Bill Hatcher.

In the junior year we began to take on the more serious ideals of a senior. We were joined by Carol Peterson, but lost Sue McIntyre and Raymond Stanger.

During our 12th and final year our class remained the same, and out of our 20 members only six have weathered the storms and tempests of school life at Scotia Consolidated Schools and are now in this year's graduating class. They are Marcia Gebhardt, Darlene (Johnson) Jensen, Joyce (Hosch) Walkup, Harold Bremer, Bernard Beck and Simon Walkowiak.

Prophecy
