


Fireside Chat Book Discussion

Ruth Jefferson is a labor and delivery nurse in a Connecticut hospital. During her shift she does a routine check-up on a newborn, but she is told that she is being reassigned to another patient. The parents are white supremacists and they don't want Ruth, who is African-American, to touch their child. The next day the baby goes into cardiac distress while Ruth is alone in the nursery. What is she going to do? Obey orders or does she intervene?

Banned Books Week is an annual awareness campaign promoted by the American Library Association and Amnesty International, that celebrates the freedom to read, draws attention to banned and challenged books, and highlights persecuted individuals.

Banned books are books or other printed works such as essays or plays which are prohibited by law or to which free access is not permitted by other means. In the United States, books have been and still are banned by school and public libraries, despite the opposition of the ALA to book bans.

Banned Books Week not only encourages readers to examine challenged literary works, but also promotes intellectual freedom in libraries, schools, and bookstores. Its goal is "to teach the importance of our First Amendment rights and the power of literature, and to draw attention to the danger that exists when restraints are imposed on the availability of information in a free society." National Read a Book Day



September 6th is National Read a Book Day

Take this time to relax with one of your favorite books and **READ!**

A favorite pie of Cindy's but not her own recipe
(sharing from allrecipes.com)

Peach-a-Berry Pie

Ingredients:

- 4 cups fresh peaches - peeled, pitted & sliced
- 1 cup fresh raspberries
- 3/4 cup white sugar (*I substitute organic raw sugar*)
- 3 Tbls all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 2 - 9 in pie crusts (*refrigerated roll-out or scratch*)
- 2 Tbls butter, softened and cut into pieces

Additional course granulated sugar for topping
and a little extra soft butter.

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees
2. Place peaches and berries in colander for until any excess fluid is drained then transfer to large bowl. Gently toss with 3/4 cup sugar, flour and cinnamon. Put into a pie plate lined with one crust. Dot with the butter pieces.
3. Place 2nd crust over pie filling, seal edges and cut vents in top crust. I spread a little butter over top pie crust and then sprinkle with course sugar to taste.
4. Bake 45 minutes or until crust is golden brown. Remove from oven and cool.

Note - Fresh peaches are the best. Fresh that have been frozen and thawed tend to make the pie soupy.



Patriot Day is an annual observance on September 11 to remember those who were injured or died during the terrorist attacks in the United States on September 11, 2001. Many Americans refer to Patriot Day as 9/11 or September 11. Nearly 3000 people died during terrorist attacks in New York, Washington DC, and Shanksville, Pennsylvania on that day.




Tilden Public Library Receives Books from Pilcrow Foundation Grant
