

The Role of the Three Rivers Library System

I have done presentations here and there to share all that the Three Rivers Library System (TRLS) has to offer, but it never hurts to go over things again. In everyone's busy lives, it is easy to overlook available resources. Here is a short video covering the Nebraska Regional Library Systems.

If you are reading this, it means that you likely already know about the monthly newsletter that TRLS provides. This is a great way to keep track of events happening in the library world. It is also interesting to learn about the fabulous ideas that other librarians have for their libraries, and it is a perfect platform to share your own terrific programs, events, and ideas. If you have pictures or articles to share, please send them to Chelsea. The most current issue is found here, and all of the past issues are found here.

TRLS offers <u>scholarships</u> for continuing education opportunities. The <u>application form</u> is easy and basic, and the only requirements are that you, of course, attend the event for which you applied and then submit an article for the monthly newsletter sharing details of the event. This helps other librarians learn about these opportunities, and it also reminds others that these scholarships are available. The usual process is reimbursement once the article has been submitted, but the money can be provided ahead of time if necessary.

Another scholarship opportunity through TRLS is for a <u>Humanities Nebraska</u> speaker. Again, this is an easy and basic <u>application</u>. The librarian hires the speaker and pays the fees. After the event, the librarian will write an article for the newsletter, and pictures are welcomed! The \$50 or \$75 fee will then be reimbursed. Again, if there is hardship with waiting for the reimbursement, TRLS is willing to work with you.

Book kits and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) kits are available at the TRLS office. These are easy to borrow. Simply contact Chelsea for assistance. You are welcome to make arrangements to pick up the items at the office in Omaha; these can be delivered as schedules allow; or these can be mailed, depending on the weight and size of the item(s). If these items are mailed, you have the option of having the return postage paid by TRLS. This makes the process even more beneficial to your libraries! If there are specific titles that you would like, please offer the recommendation for consideration by the TRLS committee.

TRLS offers workshops, librarian meetings, and networking opportunities. Many of these are in-person events, and sometimes these are done virtually. Several of the virtual events are available on the TRLS YouTube Channel. If you ever have a specific topic you would like to explore in a workshop or meeting setting, please share your ideas.

I help with other things such as weeding or inventory projects, public library surveys, board meetings, and more. I am always just an email, call, or text away (402-910-7005). I am an enthusiastic cheerleader for libraries, and I am available as a sounding board whenever needed.

Omar and his brother Hassan have been in the Dadaab refugee camp for seven years! Without their parents, the boys live on their own, watched over by an aging foster mother, Fatuma. Having the responsibility of caring for himself and his nonverbal brother, everyday Omar must clean the floorless tent they sleep on, hide any valuables from thieves, and wait. Wait for water, wait for food, wait for his mother to find them, wait for the war to end, and wait to leave the refugee camp. When Omar gets a chance to attend school, he is far behind other children his age, and soon, the pressure of school and chores begins to make him angry and resentful. As he grows and becomes continually frustrated with his situation, he sees how everyone else is stuck just like him—especially the girls, who, like Omar, are burdened with too many responsibilities. With encouragement from his friends and community, Omar grows more confident in his abilities and in Hassan and starts dreaming about a future outside the camp. And one day, Omar's and Hassan's names are called for an interview with the UN for a chance to finally leave Dadaab, an exciting and terrifying possibility.


