

# Library Board Certification Program

One of the twelve minimum requirements for library accreditation is the successful certification of the library board. For a library board to become certified, the board members must, collectively, participate in at least twenty hours of continuing education in a three-year period. You can find information about this on the Nebraska Library Commission's website: <a href="https://nlc.nebraska.gov/trustees/pubcert.aspx">https://nlc.nebraska.gov/trustees/pubcert.aspx</a>. There is no cost for certification.

Some reasons for this certification, as listed on the Nebraska Library Commission's website, are:

- Improve board effectiveness
- Increase board involvement
- Improve library service
- Fulfill library accreditation requirements

https://nlc.nebraska.gov/trustees/CertStatus.asp. One helpful tip I have seen is to include this information at the end of the board agenda, such as:

Current CEUs: 16Units Needed: 4

• Date due: January 31, 2026

Doing this allows all the board members to keep track of the progress, and it prevents that due date from sneaking up on them. Perhaps you have another way to regularly share this with your board members. The important thing is that they are always aware of this information.

There are many ways library board members can earn these Continuing Education Credits. They can attend conferences. They can watch approved webinars. They can view and discuss the Short Takes for Trustees videos that are designed for Library Board Training.


At the Three Rivers Library System, I have designed a couple of Breakout Box Challenges specifically for Library Board Trainings. The first one features the United for Libraries Tools for Trustees handouts along with the sample accreditation materials that Library Board Members get to keep. The content for the hour-long training includes a variety of puzzles and challenges that were created around the accompanying literature. For example, crossword puzzle answers can be found in the United for Libraries content, and I have never had it completed without the board members reading through the material. The second challenge is designed the same way, but the accompanying material is the 73-page Nebraska Library Board Manual.

I have plans to create a couple more of these by using Nebraska State Statutes and Nebraska Open Meetings Act. <u>The Sentence</u>
by Louise Erdrich

Mackenzie Marrow is the librarian in charge of book clubs at the Nebraska Library Commission and wants to share with everyone the hidden gems in the <u>NLC's Book Club Collection</u>. Below is an excerpt, but to read the full details go to <u>Mackenzie's blog post.</u>

The Sentence, like Erdrich's previous novels, explores contemporary life as an Indigenous person in the upper Midwest, with all its heartache and laughter intertwined. As we continue to observe Native American Heritage Month and reflect on our country's history, this novel is a thoughtful way to open up the discussion around America's disposition of its Indigenous people. Their removal still haunts us today in the land, the culture, and the resilient survivors, much like the haunting of The Sentence's bookstore is a colonization in itself. For Adult Book Clubs, they will find a novel that celebrates the humanism and community optimism unique to a flash in the pan moment during the COVID pandemic as a way to digest the more difficult moments. Erdrich wrote through the pandemic with Tookie as her guide. A messy, witty, and loveable protagonist to work through the continuing loss and uncertainty.

### **ARSL Conference Reflections**

Thanks to a generous grant from the Three Rivers Library System, I was able to attend the ARSL Conference in Albuquerque, New Mexico, this September. ARSL stands for the Association for Rural and Small Libraries and is an incredible organization dedicated to supporting smaller public libraries across the country. The annual conference brings together library professionals from communities of all sizes to learn, share ideas, and celebrate the vital role that small libraries play.

The sessions covered a wide range of topics. There were big-picture issues like intellectual freedom and collection development to practical discussions tailored to small and rural libraries. Workshops addressed everything from managing volunteer programs and improving social media engagement to building strong relationships with community stakeholders.

One of the highlights for me was a session on staffing challenges in small libraries, which explored strategies for training, preventing burnout, and improving employee retention. Part of the discussion focused on leadership, and one piece of advice that stuck with me was the reminder for directors and managers to "be present, be patient, be approachable." It was a simple but powerful message about leading staff with empathy and awareness.

Another memorable experience was the Roundabout Lunch, a fun networking event where each table was assigned a theme; some professional, like "Children's Librarians" or "Library Directors," and others just for fun, like "Sports Fans" or regional groupings. These informal conversations gave everyone a chance to meet new people, share what they'd learned, and trade stories about life in their libraries.

I left the ARSL Conference with a deep sense of appreciation for small libraries and the dedicated staff who keep them thriving. While we face unique challenges, working in a small, rural library is truly rewarding. We have the privilege of seeing firsthand the difference we make in our communities every day.

A heartfelt thank-you to the Three Rivers Library System for making this opportunity possible. It was an inspiring and energizing experience that will continue to shape my work for years to come.


My appreciation to the Three Rivers Library System for continuing education moneys for registration so I could attend the Iowa Library Association's annual conference.


After attending the 2024 IA Library Association conference, I wanted to attend again.

Two key points and a highlight: The highlight was seeing the documentary "The Librarians" by Kim A. Snyder "librarians emerge as first responders in the fight for democracy and our First Amendment Rights." Key point #1: Al is not so much "intelligent" but a computer program that isn't all it claims to be. As librarians, our mantra of "verifying information/facts" is alive and well. Unfortunate examples were given; one from the director of Sioux City's Libraries: her boss did an Al inquiry and it said they could cut their library budget in half because they "didn't need all that."

Key point #2 was from Carrie Geno's presentation: "Setting Your Library Up for Success: Creating Tools to Empower Yourself and Your Staff" where she shared a table of contents for her Operations Manual and her Director's Manual. I get the Operations Manual: documenting what you do. She said to delegate to staff members and get them involved. I never considered an Operation's Manual for the director's position. This stemmed from her walking into a director's position with a stack of articles but nothing else. She proceeded to start documenting so the next director would not experience or guess or learn how she had to. Not only what you do but a rational/"why" behind it. She suggested taking 30 minutes each week to dedicate to this. When she's ready to retire and/or leave, she will print a copy for the next director.





#### Young Readers Invited to Write to Favorite Authors

Young readers in grades 4-12 are invited to write a personal letter to an author for the Nebraska Letters about Literature (LAL) contest, a state reading and writing promotion program. The letter can be to any author (living or dead) from any genre: fiction or nonfiction, contemporary or classic - explaining how that author's work changed the student's view of the world. Submissions must be completed online October 1 - December 31, 2025. Nebraska Letters About Literature is coordinated and sponsored by the Nebraska Center for the Book and the Nebraska Library Commission, with support from Lincoln City Libraries, Francie & Finch Bookshop, and Humanities Nebraska. The Nebraska Center for the Book's panel of judges will select a winner and an honorable mention per competition level (Level I for grades 4-6, Level II for grades 7-8, and Level III for grades 9-12) to be honored in a proclamation-signing ceremony at the state capitol during National Library Week in April 2026. Their winning letters will be placed in the Jane Pope Geske Heritage Room of Nebraska Authors at Bennett Martin Public Library in Lincoln. Nebraska winners and honorable mentions will receive state prizes. Teachers, librarians, and parents can download the contest guidelines, free teaching materials, information on the online entry system, and past winning letters on the Nebraska Center for the Book website. An informational NCompass Live webinar aired on October 1st, discussing this year's contest, the submission process, and judging criteria, with a recorded session soon available. 
