They passed a few grave markers along the way, but luckily no one died of dysentery before they finally made it to Oregon.



# Gering Public Library Adult Program Sherry Preston



June was a lively month for the Gering Public Library's adult summer reading program. We offered a Cricut class and Nebraska author Bruce Arant taught us how to draw cute little faces. Genealogist Robert Zemanek taught a class on how to search old newspapers for our ancestors. We discussed "The Fortune Cookie Chronicles" by Jennifer 8. Lee in our regular book discussion group. Alex at the Emporium Express Bean & Bottle taught us about champagne at our ever-popular Wine 201 class.

Finally, our Life-Sized Oregon Trail game was a huge hit for pioneers of all ages. A total of 167 people attend the program over the two days. Participants started with a passport, a small compass and \$4 to spend at the St Joe store. At St Joe for \$1 each they could select water, bullets, a blanket, food, or a small first aid kit. Because they had only \$4 and five items to choose from, each wagon train had to make a choice of which item to not purchase. Pioneers then set out on the trail to get their passport stamped at eight stations, and risk their lives as the Western Nebraska Pioneers baseball team distributed calamities like snakebite and dysentery.

Partners along the trail included the Army National Guard, Nebraska Game & Parks, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, the National Park Service from Scotts Bluff National Monument, the Lakota Sioux in conjunction with the National Park Service from Agate Fossil Beds, the Legacy of the Plains Museum, the Friends of the Gering Library as well as many volunteers.

A teacher from the Minatare Summer School had this to say about our Life-Sized Oregon Trail, "The kids loved that activity. We stopped by Rebecca Winters' gravesite on the way back to the school. The whole thing was a great experience." This program was made possible through a generous grant from the Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation.

Lied Scottsbluff Public Library Elaine Bleisch



The Summer Reading Program has come to a successful end at the Lied Scottsbluff Public Library. We had a great time with the "Adventure Begins at your Library" theme. For décor, we focused on local tie-ins, with hot air balloons and the Oregon Trail. Our program began with a registration event on Tuesday, June 4 and ended with a wrap-up party on Tuesday, July 23 and Teen Library Olympics on July 25.

Over the eight-weeks of our summer reading program, 1,463 children and 193 teens registered; the children read 62,641 books and the teens read 2,104 books. Nine hundred twenty-six people attended 20 in-person programs. One of our more popular programs was the Adventure Fair. The fair featured tables around the park in front of the library that families could participate in various activities or learn something new. Participants included community groups such as Sixpence and Kiwanis; city departments including the police, fire, and parks; and local attractions such as the Riverside Discovering Center, Scottsbluff National Monument, and Wildcat Hills. Participants could explore a fire truck or police car, get their face painted, listen to a book, handle a snake, engage in parachute play, and more.

This year, we decided to try two take-home craft kits. For the first, we made a rocket that flew using straws and pipettes, and the other was a bookmark using wood medallions cut on the library's laser cutter. The kits were very popular and we gave out around 600 over three weeks. We also set up an Oregon Trail themed scavenger hunt around the library. The hunt took them not only around the library, but also through the trail from Missouri to Oregon, learning what life was like for the pioneers along the way.

In 1995, Fowler made the commitment to transition from teaching middle school to songwriting and touring. As a certified National Teaching Artist, Fowler aims to work towards integrating the arts into science, math, and language arts. "It is a wonderful way to inspire kids to use the creative space in their heads to think about the world they live in," Fowler says.

A highlight of the SPL's Sidney Summer, Fowler's sing-a-long "call and response" songs delighted the young participants while educating them on the importance of telling stories of common people

bringing uncommon tales to life. As a featured guest, he brought his classroom therapy pet, his beloved dog a black lab named Kumba. Fowler made a lifestyle out of the things he loves most, his pets being one of those. His book series, "The Adventures of Bella and Choco" features endearing stories of his two adventurous companions. The book's keynotes include teaching character traits and a variety of life lessons, as well as the importance of Mother Earth and our impact on the planet. Unfortunately, Bella and Choco, passed away in late 2022 in a traffic accident. As a way of creating a lasting legacy, Fowler continues to spread their stories and write about the duo.
