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

Cessation of Activities for Wymore PD

Re: City of Wymore Police Department; Cessation of Activities

As of March 1, 2023, the City of Wymore no longer has sufficient full time police officers to effectively staff the Wymore Police Department and is ceasing law enforcement activities at this time. We have had two meetings with the Gage County Attorney and the Gage County Sheriff. At this time, Gage County Sheriff's Office will be handling all calls for service for all state law violations occurring within the corporate limits of the City of Wymore. The Gage County Sheriff's Office shall also be dispatched for all calls for service involving dangerous dog violations (dog bite cases) under state law as well.

Calls for service for nuisance violations (junked motor vehicles, weeds, litter, dilapidated dwellings, dogs at large, etc . . .) under the Wymore Municipal Code can be reported to the Wymore City Office at (402) 645-3377.

Wymore City Council has approved to form a Police Advisory Committee and is in search of three community members to serve a role on this committee to look into the future of the Wymore Police Department and to help resolve law enforcement issues.

Treat Them Right, so They Won't Ignite

It is spring cleaning time around the house, a great time to do a deep clean, getting rid of those old flammable products that you may have around the home that you are no longer going to use or have outdated. Keeping your family safe is the number one priority for everyone in your home.

Always store flammable substances in a cool well-ventilated place, away from furnaces, heaters, ranges, clothes dryers, power tools, or any sources of heat and direct sunlight. Use only airtight containers designed for storing flammables. Glass containers break easily, plastic containers maybe eaten away by the flammable substances.

Do not use flammable substances or spray aerosol cans around heat or open flames. When using flammable substances indoors, open windows and doors so that vapors disperse safely. Always store flammables with heavy vapors, such as gasoline and propane, outdoors. Never store them in a basement. The vapors could collect in large amounts, waiting for an ignition source to cause a major explosion. Use flammable liquids, gases, and grease only as directed. If you spill a flammable substance, clean it up and dispose of the cleaning rags properly. If you smell gas, leave the area, call the fire department or 911. 911 will call the utility company right away to have them come out and check for the problem.

Never use gasoline to start a fire. Use only laboratory approved containers for storing gasoline. These containers should be airtight, unvented and should have a pouring spout to prevent spills. Leave at least two inches of space at the top of the can for vapors to expand. When transporting, keep the container on the floor of the backseat with the windows down. When refueling a machine, always turn the engine off, make sure the equipment you are refueling is cool. When you are pouring gasoline into an engine do so outdoors, so the vapors disperse into the air.

Know the flammability levels of each substance you bring into your

home. When selecting a product to do a

specific job, read the labels carefully and choose the least flammable substance available. Just in case, always have a fire extinguisher close

Here is a partial list of flammable items that can be found around your home: paint thinners, certain paints, turpentine, nail polish remover, contact adhesives, gasoline, butane, propane, wood stains, spot removers, furniture polish, oil based paints, certain solvents, glues,

rubber cement, pesticides, grease, and certain cooking oils.



Sharon Schuster and Dan Albers officiating. Burial of ashes was at the Oketo Cemetery.




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Karen Kay (Vonasek) Rownd Obituary SUBMITTED BY LAUGHLIN-HOEVET FUNERAL HOME

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Bert Wymore Obituary



Wilma Arlene Koher Snyder passed away on March 22, 2023, at the age of 98 years, six months, and 15 days.

Wilma was born on September 7, 1924 at Edgar, Nebraska, to Harry and Velma Hattan Koher. Two years later, her sister Doreta completed the family. The family lived above the depot in Burchard, Nebraska, where her father served as station master. Wilma graduated with honors from Burchard High School in 1941. She was awarded a college scholarship, which she turned down in order to take care of her mother, who was ill with multiple sclerosis. She served for a time as telephone operator in Burchard.

Wilma married Leonard Dale Snyder on December 26, 1945. At first, the couple lived in Burchard to be able to help with her mother's care. The family then lived near Holmesville, close to the Blue River. Five children were born to this union: Lesa, Meredith Lynn, Johnny, Mary Beth, and Annette. Meredith Lynn died in infancy. In 1959, the family moved to the farm north of Liberty where Leonard farmed.

As the children grew up, Wilma was busy gardening, leading 4-H, entertaining the Pleasant Hill Extension Club, attending Bible Study classes, and teaching Sunday school and acting as deacon for the Holmesville Church of the Brethren. She freely shared her musical talents, playing the piano and organ at church and accompanying soloists at funerals and weddings. As the children grew up, she formed The Snyder Family Singers with her four children. She had a lifelong love for animals, dating from a childhood pet dog named Mattress. She raised pedigreed English Springer Spaniels while on the farm, along with chickens, turkeys, and numerous cats. Her hospitality was legendary. When she could no longer entertain, she encouraged others with phone calls and handwritten notes.

After her children graduated from high school, she began a prison ministry, visiting prisoners on death row. She continued in this ministry for 17 years, educating herself and becoming a licensed minister of the Church of the Brethren, so that she could share the love of Christ with those lonely and troubled men. When one of the inmates was executed, she was present, and she helped to find him a decent burial place outside the prison walls.

She is survived by her children, John (Becky) Snyder, Mary Beth (Marty) Tuttle, Annette (Lowell) Dell, son-in-law Arnie Eichenberger, grandchildren Eric and Evan Eichenberger and Marla Sohl, Rachel and Casey Snyder, James, William, Marshall and Grant Tuttle, Rosanna Dell Henning, Laura Dell-Haro, and Silas Dell, 14 great-grandchildren, and one sister-in-law, Gladys Snyder. She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Leonard, her infant daughter Meredith Lynn, her daughter Lesa, and her sister Doreta, as well as numerous in laws and other relatives.

A memorial service was held Tuesday, March 28, at 11:00 a.m. at the Holmesville Church of the Brethren, with Ken Tubbesing officiating. A private family graveside service took place at an earlier time.

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Kenneth M. Grell Obituary


Kenneth M. Grell, 95, of Blue Springs, died March 8, 2023, at the Beatrice Community Hospital in Beatrice. Kenneth was born to Frank and Mildred (Hood) Grell on a farm near Blue Springs on November 13, 1927. He attended Maple Grove School, District 143, of rural Blue Springs, and graduated from Beatrice High School in 1945. He and his wife, Dorothy (Hajek), were married July 24, 1965, at St. Mary Church, Odell, and settled on the family farm, where they raised their three children. Prior to residing at the nursing home, Kenneth lived on the family farm for all but the first two years of his life. Kenneth is survived by his wife, Dorothy, of Blue Springs, and by children, Mary Huggenberger of Lincoln; Father Loras of Wymore; and Mark of Lincoln. He is survived by one grandchild, Will Huggenberger. He is also survived by one sister, Loretta Fritschi of Hanover, Kansas. He was preceded in death by parents, Frank (1990) and Mildred (1974); son-in-law Robert Huggenberger; sisters and brothers-in-law, Lucille and Leland Morris, Doris and Keith Pascal, Robert Fritschi, and Stanley Hajek; sister-in-law Gretchen Hajek; nieces, nephews, and cousins.

Kenneth served in the United States Air Force in 1951, at George Air Force Base in Victorville, California. He was honorably discharged due to hardship since he was his family's only son and was needed to help with the family farm. He began working at the Beatrice Post Office in 1961, delivering packages at Christmas. Kenneth became a substitute rural mail carrier; at one time, he knew the layout and delivery points for all four Beatrice rural routes. While continuing to farm, he accepted the offer of a full-time rural route in 1979 and carried Route 4 and Holmesville until he retired in 1996.

Kenneth loved the land he farmed. He was a good steward, taking measures to limit soil erosion, cutting weeds in his fields, keeping fence lines clean, and maintaining his roadside ditches. He was proud of owning 34 acres of virgin prairie. Kenneth ran a cow-calf herd of white-faced Herefords until he sold them at age 81. While carrying his mail route, he touched many people by his friendly and timely delivery of the mail. Kenneth was currently the longest-serving member of the Knights of Columbus, Council 1723 Beatrice, having joined the fraternal organization on November 1, 1949. Kenneth followed in his father's footsteps, Frank Grell, who was a charter member of Council 1723.

As his health diminished over the years, he lived at Angels Landing at the Good Samaritan Society in Beatrice. The family profoundly thanks all those who took care of him in this memory care household.

Mass of Christian Burial was held at 10:30 AM Tuesday, March 14, 2023 at the St. Joseph Catholic Church in Beatrice. Interment with military honors provided by the United States Air Force was at the St. Joseph Catholic Cemetery.



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Way Back When

Blue Springs Sentinel-June 1, 1916 – Commencement Week—The commencement exercises have come to a close for this year and the class of 1916 has gone down in the annals of school history. The entire program of commencement was put into the last week of school this year and it certainly made a full week of it. The exercises started Sunday evening when the baccalaureate address was given by Rev. Connell in the Evangelical church. Tuesday night, May 26th, the class with the assistance of some of the members of the other classes of the high school produced the play, "The Sweet Girl Graduate" in a very pleasing manner to a full house. The various members of the cast were fitted to their various parts and too much praise cannot be given them in this, their first play. Thursday evening was the regular commencement exercises in the Methodist church at which time Dr. George Sutherland, President Emeritus of Grand Island College, delivered the commencement address. He admonished the class to have a purpose in life and to keep steadily at work on that idea until success crowned their efforts. A. R. Patton, secretary of the board, presented the diplomas to the class. Professor Judkins then presented the scholarship to Miss Venus Brubaker. Friday evening was the annual Alumni banquet and reception to the graduating class and was held in the I. O. O. F. hall. The room was the scene of much merriment during the games of the earlier part of the evening and the banquet was held in the room under the opera house which had been very tastefully decorated with the alumni colors, blue and white. A two course banquet was served. The usual toast list was omitted this year for the first time.

Blue Springs Bee-May 25, 1944 – Alumni banquet held Thursday Eve, May 18 – The Alumni Banquet was held Thursday evening. May 18, in the basement of the Evangelical Church with about 60 present. Mrs. J. C. Martin was the acting president of the evening. The room was gaily decorated, and the tables decorated in class colors. Guests of honor, the Class of '44, were seated at a table by themselves, the class of 1924 who gathered for class reunion were at another table, and the rest were seated at a long table. A delicious banquet was served by the Willing Workers. It consisted of creamed new potatoes, pork tenderloin, buttered asparagus, carrot strips, hot rolls, jelly, Waldorf salad, raspberry whip, white cupcakes and coffee. The after dinner program consisted of reminiscing of the class of 1924. Mrs. Gladys McPheron, attired in her graduating costume of twenty years ago introduced the members, and Mrs. Viva Harms, who had taught the class gave her impressions of her one-time pupils. This was the first reunion of the class since their graduation. 
