

National Poppy Day is May 26th, 2023.

In World War 1 the poem "In Flander's Fields" refers to the poppies growing among the graves of war victims in a region of Belgium. The poem was written by Canadian physician Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae on May 3rd of 1915 after seeing the death of his friend and fellow soldiers the day before. A French woman by the name of Anna Guérin also known as "The Poppy Lady" planned the US Poppy Day in May of 1918 by encouraging everyone to wear a poppy for the fallen veterans. After the Legion Convention in 1920, the poppy was adopted as their symbol of remembrance. Today, millions of people still don the poppy to remember those who have fallen during World War 1.

The Cub Scouts will be going door to door during the month of May to collect donations for poppy flowers. Proceeds will go to the Wymore Legion Auxiliary. Their will also be poppies in some stores. The Scouts will also get credit for one of their projects. Thank you for supporting the Cub Scouts and remembering the sacrifice of so many men and women who gave their lives to fight for their country.

Police Department Advisory Committee Minutes 4/20/23

Meeting Minutes Wymore Police Department Advisory Committee April 20, 2023

The Wymore Police Department Advisory Committee met in open and public session on Thursday, April 20, 2023 in the Wymore Community Center. The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Committee members Bryan Davidson, Kelly Garcia, Lisa Munstermann, Krystal Rutti, Tony Shepardson, Jeff Spier, Jeff VanWinkle, Neil Van Boening, and Interim Chief of Police Mark Meints. Absent was Jacque Borzekofski. Also present was Mayor Collin Meints, City Attorney Andrew Carothers and 5 members of the public.

Collection of Member Email Addresses for City Office: Committee members provided their email addresses for the City Office.

Nomination & Election of Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary:

Jeff Spier nominated Bryan Davidson to be Chairman of the Committee; said nomination was seconded by Lisa Munstermann. There being no further nominations made, a vote was taken and the nomination was confirmed 8-0.

Bryan Davidson nominated Tony Shepardson to be Vice Chairman of the Committee; said nomination was seconded by Jeff Spier. There being no further nominations made, a vote was taken and the nomination was confirmed 8-0.

Jeff Spier nominated Lisa Munstermann to be Secretary of the Committee; said nomination was seconded by Tony Shepardson. There being no further nominations made, a vote was taken and the nomination was confirmed 8-0.

Review Ordinance No. 673 & Discuss Purpose of Committee:

Committee Member Van Boening red Ordinance No. 673 at the request of Chairman Davidson. The Committee identified the following three duties of the Committee as most pressing:

- Section 2-210(2)(c)(iii) Recruitment and retention of Police Department employees.
- Section 2-210(d) feasibility of maintaining a police department or other options of providing law enforcement services.
- 3. Section 2-210(a) Police Department accreditation requirements under LB 51.

Chairman Davidson asked each Committee member to provide a two or three sentence statement as to what they believe the mission of the committee to be. At the next meeting of the Committee, the Committee will develop a mission statement so that the Committee can remain focused. Chairman Davidson also asked Committee to write down questions they might have.

Interim Chief of Police gave a quick update on the status of the Police Department: Lt. Schachtschabel will be resigning in the very near future and pursuing other employment options including completing a degree in accounting. Part-time Office Jason Duff has resigned and turned in his gear.

Chairman Davidson asked each Committee member to state the reason they wanted to be on the Committee or the reason why they agreed to be on the Committee.

Jeff VanWinke – commented that this was his community and this is a very important issue to resolve. Jeff Spier – it is important to have a law enforcement presence to deter criminal activity; Wymore has always had a Police Department and needs to continue to have a Police Department.

Police Department Advisory Committee Minutes 4/20/23

Niel Van Boening – commented that he has been discouraged about the direction the Department has been going in since LB 51 was passed; Committee needs to look at different options to provide the best for the community.

Kelly Garcia – commented that she has lived in the community for 4 years and believes it is crucial to have a Police Department to attract families and retired individuals.

Lisa Munstermann – commented that everything has looked different or changed since the COVID pandemic; every option needs to be considered; maybe law enforcement does not have to look like it did previously; she wants to be a part of the solution.

Tony Shepardson – commented that LB 51 changed everything and that a community really needs to be particular about who you hire.

Krystal Rutti – commented that as a business owner, it was nice to know that there is a presence in the community and that the Police Department was checking on business establishments during the night; she wants to be a part of the process that brings law enforcement back to the community.

Interim Chief of Police gave a summary to hiring differences between pre-LB 51 and post LB 51. In his opinion, the two largest issues making it difficult for Wymore to maintain a Police Department is LB 51 and the lack of available housing for Police Officers and their families. Interim Chief of Police also indicated that there are two communities of similar size to Wymore (Ceresco and Yutan) that have been able to maintain their Police Departments by utilizing part-time police officers and that the Committee should investigate how they staff their Police Departments.

Agenda Items for Next Meeting: The following agenda items will be discussed at the next meeting:

- 1. Discuss and adopt a mission statement for the committee.
- 2. Review and discussion of LB 51 and the requirements placed on Police Departments.
- 3. Police Department facilities and equipment review.
- Discussion of guestions from Committee members.
- Preliminary review and discussion of budget for Police Department and other possible resources.

Mayor Collin Meints thanked all of the Committee members for their willingness to serve and to provide recommendations to the Governing Body.

Next Meeting: The next meeting to the Wymore Police Department is Thursday, May 4, 2023, at 7:00 p.m. in the Wymore Community Center.

There being no further business before the Committee, Committee Member Garcia moved to adjourn; Committee Member VanWinkle seconded the motion. There being no objection to the motion, the Committee adjourned at 8:35 p.m.


Stanley Hays Obituary

Way Back When

Blue Springs Sentinel (May 8, 1913) Alumni Meeting – The Alumni are urged to turn out in full at the meting at the F. E. Rice home Friday, tomorrow, evening. Plans will be made for the annual banquet to the incoming class. As the time is short all are urged to attend and push.

Blue Springs Sentinel (May 25, 1913) The Alumni of the high school met with the treasurer Miss Emma Rice last Friday evening. The attendance was small on account of the storm but those present decided to hold the annual reception for the incoming class the first Tuesday in June. The annual dues of 75 cents per member were levied. Miss Lona Davis was chosen as the one to engineer this year's banquet and we all are assured of its success. Committees have been appointed and the work is progressing nicely.

Blue Springs Bee(May 25, 1939) Commencement for the Senior class of the Blue Springs school was held last Thursday evening, at the school auditorium with a large number in attendance. The girls wore white dresses with blue sating boleros and sashes. The program included: Processional by Betty Jane Scott, Invocation by Rev. F. F. Cook, Special Violin Solo by Miss Pettit, Presentation of Speaker by Mrs. Harms, Address by E. E. Powell, Special Horn Solo by Dwight Davis, Presenting of Diplomas and scholarships by Mr. Rickers, Benediction by Rev. F. F. Cook. Irene Gibson, Betty Ann Gillham and Gordon Roberts received the scholarships. Irene was valedictorian. The graduates were lla Ault, Lawrence Blevins, Paul Free, Irene Gibson, Betty Ann Gillham, Wayne Maine, Gordon Roberts, and Beulah Netz.

The Alumni banquet was held in the gymnasium of the Blue Springs high school last Friday evening, May 19, with about one hundred present. After the banquet, President Don Harpster welcomed the senior class of 1939 and class president Irene Gibson responded. The president then introduced the toastmistress Miss Irene Wondra. The theme of the evening was "Wrong Way Corrigan". The following toasts were given: Leaving the Airport by Miss Jean Schiermier, Wrong Way Compass by Leonard Barnes, Hitting on all Cylinders by Mrs. C. B. Scott, Be Your Own Navigator boy Jack Atkins, Flying High by Miss Inez Hevelone, and Tuning up the Motor by B. Guy Chamberlin. After the toasts Wyman Smith as Wrong Way Corrigan and Jack Atkins as the radio commentator took us on a trip around the world which proved very interesting.

Weekly Wymorean (May 19, 1921) There will be a meeting of the Alumni of the Wymore High School at the Vendome hotel on Saturday night, May 28th, at 8 o'clock. This meeting will be a reunion and a banquet. Plates must be reserved before May 26, by notifying Walter Beldin. A large number of graduates have signified their intention of being present. A good program is being arranged. Plates - \$1.

Weekly Wymorean (June 2, 1921) – Monument Unveiled – Nearly 4,000 people gathered in the cemetery at Blue Springs, Memorial Day, to pay tribute to soldiers and sailors of this country. Over 500 automobiles lined the road on which marched soldiers of the Civil War, Women's Relief corps, American Legion, Spanish-American War veterans, women's auxiliary of the American Legion and Daughters of the American Revolution. H. E. Sackett of Beatrice was orator of the day. Boy Scouts, under the direction of Scoutmaster Roy Smith, had gathered quantities of evergreen branches and these were reverently laid on the base of the monument as the procession passed slowly around it. Pictures of the event were taken by Gale of Beatrice. Music was furnished by the Wymore band.

Wymore Arbor State (June 7, 1973) Twelve members of the Wymore High Class of 1923, with their spouses, met Saturday noon to celebrate the 50th anniversary of their graduation. These class members represented an original group of 37 of whom 13 are now deceased. During high school years, these classmates accomplished several firsts in Wymore. They were the largest class ever to graduate up to this time from Wymore High School and because of their number in their junior year, they were able to present the first junior class play staged using only juniors in the history of the school. Also, it was the first class to successfully produce a yearbook. Later in the evening the group attended the alumni banquet at the high school building of Wymore. The banquet table at which the honored group was seated was decorated with place cards, nut cups and flowers of purple and gold, the class colors and centered with standards bearing the class year, 1923.

Wymore Arbor State – 1973 – An open house in honor of the 25th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Jones was hosted by their children May 27 in the Fellowship Hass of the Wymore Presbyterian Church. – Lisa Vickers celebrated her eighth birthday with a slumber party at her home. – The John Philip Sousa Band Award went to Jeri Plihal of rural Blue Springs and the Outstanding Instrumentalist Award went to Kalynne Moore.

Wymore Arbor State – 1993 – Eddie Lytle of Fairbury became the newest Command Sergeant Major of Task Force 2nd Battalion, 134th Infantry on April 1, when he was promoted from the rank of first sergeant to that of the second highest enlisted rank in the United States Army. – The Kenny Reed scholarship committee announced the selection of Lyndon McKeever as the recipient of their \$500 scholarship for agriculture studies at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. Lyndon is the son of Ernest and Val Jean McKeever of Wymore. – Senior Brad Mailahn was the lone gold medalist for Southern at the Tecumseh Invitational, resetting his own mark in the high jump for a new school record. Mailahn's new record is 6'3", bettering his old mark of 6'2".


