After moving to Mission, he became known as the mayor of Golf View Estates. He always told new people who were

moving in that they had to throw a party or give him \$50. He had a parking place at the pool and beware to anyone

Way Back When

Blue Springs Sentinel (June 1902) – A PLEASANT SURPRISE - As our Post Commander was about to call the Post to order Saturday, a gentle tap on the door was heard. It was announced that J. H. Casebeer, editor of the Blue Springs Sentinel had a few words he would like to say to the boys. He was admitted and gave us a nice little talk about his recent trip to some of the battle fields of the war of 1861-65 especially of Lookout Mountain. He then produced a very neat gavel which was made from a piece of timber grown on or near the mountain. With a few appropriate remarks, he presented it to the Post. Post Commander Taylor thanked the Editor handsomely for the gift on behalf of the Post. EFORCE THE ORDINANCES – The city has erected a pound on the city lot back of the standpipe and propose that pasturing animals on the street shall cease. This is proper and we hope the officers will see to it that the ordinances are rigidly enforced. City ordinances should be enforced, or the ordinances repealed. We believe that one of the most vicious ideas in our civilization is that one that violates the law with impunity, yet a great many people will hold up their hands in holy horror at some man bootlegging whisky or violating some moral code while they will violate some other code as quick as the other fellow, if its provisions happen to cross their wishes.

Weekly Wymorean (June 1923) – A large water wheel arrived for the Black Brothers hydro-electric plant at Blue Springs last Tuesday. The wheel weighs 42,000 pounds and two cars were necessary to haul it. Dynamos and other machinery have been ordered and their arrival is expected at most any time. The new plant is to be equipped with the very latest devices for the manufacture of electric power. Thirteen carloads of cattle, 498 head, went through Wymore, Friday, over the Burlington from Texas to Greeley Center, Neb., where they will be fed for market. The horse and buggy belonging to Robert Rice of Blue Springs, which was taken a few days ago from the streets of Wymore, was recovered on the farm of John Pisar, Wednesday night, and two young men were taken into custody by the Wymore officers near the Kansas line. One of the two men had been employed at the Pisar farm previously, so he knew just where to locate the small amount of money, revolver, and saddle horse with which they attempted to continue their adventures. They were released to the custody of their parents awaiting further action by county authorities.

Wymore Arbor State (June 1973) – Twenty-three-year-old Ted Henderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Henderson of Wymore, joined the Gage County Sheriff's Office Monday as new communications man. Henderson's duties at the office will include manning the radio, teletype, and phone, as well as keeping surveillance over the jail, according to Sheriff Fred Steinkamp, Jr. A 1967 graduate of Wymore High, Henderson attended Fairbury Junior College for two years and most recently has worked as shoe store manager at Newton, Iowa. He and his wife, the former Kathy Johnson of Filley, are seeking a home in Beatrice. Henderson joins a brother, Mike, already on the sheriff's staff. SCHOOLHOUSE MUSEUM OPENS WITH NEW CURATOR, NEW AIM – Wymore's schoolhouse museum opened its doors Friday with a new curator-manager and a new aim for the 1973 season. Sixteen-year-old Southern High senior, Gregg Mullens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Mullens, Wymore, is the museum's new curator-manager for the three-month season-June 1 through Aug. 21, from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Wednesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. And the museum's new aim-a more concerted effort to gain items for display will be part of Mullen's job, according to Ron Eltiste, Wymore Historical Society representative and Southern High history instructor. Through a Wymore Sertoma Club grant, money to operate the museum recently was provided for the second consecutive year, Eltiste said. With the museum open again, Historical Society members are hoping to add to displays this year, giving credit to those who bring items to show. Eltiste said the group is especially interested in securing articles related to early rural education, since the museum itself is the former old Pleasant View School building moved from District 81 in May 1967 to McCandless Park on Highway 77 to be used as a Monument to Rural Education." Last year's curator, Jerry Fairbanks, of Wymore, had one new set of items to show last summer-the ninth edition, 1897 copyright, of Encyclopedia Britannica, given by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Mettscher of Blue Springs. That set of volumes is shelved at the front of the building now, along with other old books. Besides the addition of new items, the Historical Society also is tentatively planning a Scrub-Up Day for the building's interior, Eltiste said, although no definite date has been set. Helping with these historical projects will be part of Mullen's duties, but greeting visitors will be his main job. On an average, 200 to 300 guests are generally signed on the museum's register each summer. Last year's visitors were from 14 states-Nebraska, Oklahoma, Missouri, Iowa, Kansas, Arizona, Texas, California, south Dakota, Colorado, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, and Minnesota.

Southern Junior High boys 1600 m relay team broke the old record of 4:08.9 (1987) to 4:07.0 set at Junior High SNC held at Geneva on May 9, 1998. Runners on the relay team are Crif Scheideler, Travis Hardin, Ryan Trump and Tyler Ray. The 1987 team was Steve Watson, Tim Zvolanek, Todd Miller and Dustin Martin.



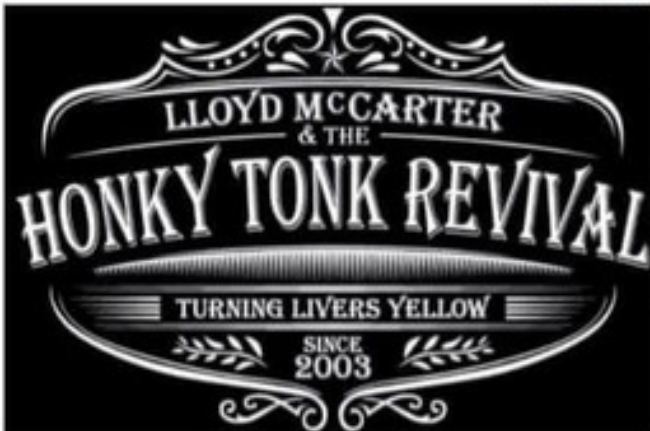
