

Seventy-two Gage County - based nonprofit organizations participated in the fifth Big Give Gage Event on September 14, 2023. This year a total of \$369,493.56 was raised with 1,971 donors. There was \$20,775.57 given by sponsorships which is divided amongst all 72

The overall goal of Big Give Gage is to promote philanthropy throughout the entire community. What is the definition of philanthropy? Philanthropy means generosity in all its forms and is often defined as giving gifts of "time, talent and treasure" to help make life better for other people. One can practice philanthropy by making a monetary gift, such as a donation to a cause you believe in. Anyone can be a philanthropist and the Wymore-Blue Springs Area Fund had 149 during Big Give Gage.

This year Wymore-Blue Springs Area Fund surpassed our goal of \$20,000. We were blessed with \$31,175 raised. The percentage of matching funds received was \$1404.80 for a total of \$32,579.80. This years project was to focus on the building of a new restroom facility in Arbor State Park. After 67 years the cement block bathrooms have

reached their lifespan. The exact location of this amenity has not yet been determined by the park board, city council, and mayor.

The members of the Wymore-Blue Springs Area Fund are grateful to the many people who believe in supporting and sustaining our area and our parks will benefit due to their generosity. Those who have a connection to our area, either living here now, sometime in the past, or whose family has a history here we want you to know we appreciate you. Your community needs you. 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"It Takes a City to Raise a City"

2 months ago, the delicate surgical procedure began by shaving the McCandless Park surgical site for the Inclusive Playground designed for those who are 5-12 years old. In days of old, the evening prior to surgery involved clean shaving of the surgical sight in order to make an unhealthy situation better and ward off infection. After 30 days of intense therapy, the inclusive playground was fully ready to face life on September 28. It takes about 30 days to embed a habit. The new playground is similar to receiving a pacemaker. McCandless Park was becoming weary and needed some assistance in regaining her energy. Several organizations, the City of Wymore, several Foundations, businesses, and many individuals came together to bring some more life to McCandless Park. One is reminded of a statement by Brian Tracy, "Always give without remembering and always receive without forgetting." We are indeed thankful to all who have given so unselfishly so that we can enjoy the playgrounds and restrooms and we are forever thankful to them.

I have stopped by the playground several times and have viewed the many Facebook photos and treasure the sight of young people utilizing the playgrounds and using them in positive ways that I would have never dreamed. For example, I noticed young girls volleying a large ball in a corner of the open area of the new playground. As a result, we have instilled a habit of good experiences and behavior at McCandless Park.

At the same time, some other infectious behavior arrived at a similar time to hinder the post-surgical improvement at the playgrounds. It takes each of us to act responsibly with the playground and park that we have been given. That may mean letting those who abuse the park property that "a thousand eyes" are watching. I recall that as an elementary school student playing football behind the parked cars at the high school football game and reacting a little too physically with a fellow participant when a parent called me on my over-the-top reaction. Needless to say, I restrained my behavior in future contests. Depending on your personality, adverse incidents may or may not involve confrontation of the misbehavior or it may involve contacting law enforcement with sufficient documentation so that investigation can occur.

Whether we like it or not, the condition of the park is our responsibility. Cost of maintenance is funded with our real estate tax dollars, sales tax revenue, and profits from the sale of our utilities. Although "somebody" should oversee the parks, "somebody" does not live here, we live here. It takes all of us to maintain a great place to raise families. We need to thwart this behavior prior to it becoming a habit. In other words, "It takes a city to raise a city." At the end of the day, did you attempt to make us a better city tonight than it was this morning. "The quality of your life will be determined by the quality of your contribution. Protect Your Family with Smoke Alarms

Protect Your Family with Smoke Alarms

The winter season is when most home fires happen. 85% of all fires in the United States occur in homes and 3 out of 5 home fires deaths result in properties without working smoking alarms.

Your home should have at least one smoke alarm on each floor. It is a great idea to have a smoke alarm in each bedroom as well. The National Fire Protection Association recommends installing both ionization and photoelectric alarms or a dual alarm that has the combination of both the technologies. Ionization smoke alarms respond best to flaming fires while the photoelectric smoke alarms respond to smoldering fires.

TEST YOUR ALARM MONTHLY



Make sure to check your alarms one a month whether they are battery operated or hard wired. Remember to change the battery in your smoke

alarms twice a year, doing this at the same time as you change your clocks for daylight saving time is a great

idea. Smoke alarms do need to be replaced after ten years of use.

Remember when your smoke alarm is going off you generally have less than two minutes to get out of your home safely.



After getting out of your home call 911 for help and don't go back inside for anything. Don't forget to have that safe place for everyone to meet.

The Virtue of Charity

October 24, 2023

Charity is the theological virtue by which we love God above all things for his own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God. Charity is the form of all the other virtues and is superior to them. Charity acts likes the mold by which all the other virtues are formed.

Many are familiar with Paul's description of charity in First Corinthians. There, he describes charity as being kind and patient, that it is not jealous or boastful, nor arrogant or rude, nor irritable or resentful. He teaches that charity bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. This passage describes love so well that many couples select it for the Scripture on their wedding day.

I think one of the greatest effects of charity is that it upholds and purifies our human ability to love. Our love can be drawn up into the supernatural perfection of divine love. We can love with the very love of God.

At the Last Supper, Jesus gave the commandment to his disciples that they were "to love one another as I have loved you (John 15:12)." He calls this his new commandment. Jesus has set the bar high for what he expects of us in the practice of charity.

Paul in Romans teaches that Christ came to us while were still enemies. We became his friends by the redemption which he won for us on the cross. So, in imitation of Jesus, who prayed for his enemies from the cross, we too must love our enemies and be willing to forgive them for wronging us. We are to consider ourselves as neighbor to those closest to us and those whom we will never meet in this life. We are to love the poor and children as Jesus himself loved them.

Jesus no longer calls us slaves, but friends. He has "first loved us (1 John 4:19)," so we are called as his friends, as his very sons and daughters, to love him and our neighbor in return. If we love out of love for Jesus, we love as innocently as children.



He thereupon sold his farm and moved to Beatrice where he has already walked 600 miles in a vain effort to find a job.****Quite a number of farmers in this vicinity are loosing their hogs from the savages of the cholera.***The revival meetings in the United Brethren Church continues this week and meetings are held every evening.****A choice lot of Men's and boy's suspenders just received at the Bee Hive Store.****Diphtheria has again broken out in Beatrice.****Bulk pickles are available at the Bee Hive Store.

Blue Springs Bee, November 1928 – Squirrel Supper Served-The Ladies aid of the M. E. church served the squirrel supper for the Brotherhood class banquet las Thursday evening. There were forty present. Rev. Gilbert of Lincoln was the speaker of the evening. He was a former pastor and later was the superintendent of this district. There were letters from former pastors read.****Large New Barn Burns-The new barn on the Governor McMullen farm east of Barneston was destroyed by fire Sunday night about 10 o'clock. Arthur Lane and family, tenants on the farm, lost three head of horses, two calves, a large hot and several pigs. Also, a large quantity of hay, corn and oats and several sets of harness. The causse of the fire is unknown. The barn had just recently been completed and it makes the third barn to burn on this location.****New Municipal Building-The foundation is now being put in for the new municipal building at this place, 32 x 40 feet, to house the fire department truck, city tractor and for use of the city council and for community meetings. The structure will be of brick and tile, located on the city lots east of the standpipe, with a south frontage of 32 feet on main street. The community hall will be 18x30 feet, which will accommodate small gatherings. Work will be rushed along so that it may be completed before the winter sets in.****Will Get First Chevrolet Six-The first Chevrolet Six to be delivered by the Buchanan agency here will be to Floyd Hardy, who has already placed his order, which of course cannot be filled before the first of next January. This new, fine Chevrolet is destined to become one of the best sellers, if not the best, for 1929. The low price coupled with its luxurious appearance and six-cylinder performance is bound to put it in the leading sales class.

Weekly Wymorean, November 1928 – Men cutting walnut logs in territory surrounding Wymore, during the past four weeks, have shipped a total of 21 carloads from here to furniture firms in Kansas City and Des Moines.****Stray Thoughts-People who plan to have turkey for Thanksgiving, will have to miss at least one payment on the car. * We buy out morning papers in the evening, our evening papers in the morning, and our Sunday papers a week ahead of time. * There seems to be a lot of people in this world, who have completely overlooked the fact that a good way to make money is to save some of it. * We are please to say that up to this time, no one has thought to erect a monument to the memory of the party who discovered that spinach could be served as food.

Band Day-The Wymore Band attended Band Day Nov. 6 at the Kansas State game, Lincoln. Forty-three bands were there making a total of about 3500 band members. The bands marched down O street to the football field. During the half of the Kansas-Nebraska game all forty-three bands marched onto the field and formed an "N".


