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Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth

Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth

April 2024

As a priest, I proclaim to my people, Sunday after Sunday, almost the entirety of the New Testament. This happens over the span of three years. We read abundant portions of the Old Testament too. The Psalms are a bedrock every Sunday, and many of the prophetic books are read.

In Sacred Scripture, God speaks to man in a human way, a way that we can understand. The human authors, all the way from Moses to Matthew, were each writing to affirm some truth which God wanted them to reveal by their words.

The sacred authors wrote in different times and cultures. They were also affected by literary genres in use at the time as well as the modes of feeling, speaking, and narrating. Prophetic and poetic styles, as well as Gospel narratives, express the truth in various ways.

Sacred Scripture is inspired by God the Holy Spirit. To interpret the differing authors, the Scriptures must be read and interpreted in the light of this same Holy Spirit.

All of the Scriptures, Old and New Testaments, are unified in God's plan of salvation through Christ Jesus. The Old Testament points to all that Christ said and did, while the New Testament fulfills all of the prophecies which had been proclaimed about the Lord.

It has been said that the Sacred Scripture is written principally in the Church's heart rather than in documents and records. The Holy Spirit gives the Church the spiritual interpretation of the Scriptures.

When reading the Scriptures, the analogy of faith is interwoven throughout its pages. This analogy means that the coherence of the truths of faith are united among themselves and within the whole plan of Revelation. In other words, the faith expressed in one part of the Bible cannot be contradicted by anything found in another part.

I enjoyed the Bible when I was a child. But now I can say that I love the Sacred Scriptures. The Sacred Word of God is received by each generation and then handed down to the next. You could say that the books of the Bible bring forth salvation in Christ to all generations. The catchy acronym given to the word "bible" is proven true again and again: Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth.

Blue Springs Weekly Sentinel, April 1893 - The thermometer registered 90 degrees in the shade Monday (early April) afternoon. That means growing weather. ****Beatrice Ike, a well known trotting horse in Beatrice, dislocated his hip Sunday in his stall. This seems to be an unlucky season for trotters so far.****Tramps, a species of human nature that was born tired, seem to abound in this locality at the present time. One of them was trying to sell shoes the other day which had evidently been stolen from some place. There is no need of people being out of employment at present in this locality as it is almost impossible to hire workmen.

Weekly Wymorean, April 1894 - Thieves broke into P. T. Thiesen's saloon Wednesday night, by breaking the panels out of a back door. The cash register was relieved of \$3.70 in change and some nickels and pennies lying on the bar were also taken. None of the wet goods or cigars have been missed and it is probable that none were taken. Thieving around town is getting a little too frequent for sound sleep.****A gentleman and lady, strangers in the city and occupation unknown, who had been stopping at the Burlington hotel for a week or more, suddenly disappeared Wednesday, leaving a board bill unpaid.

Blue Springs Bee, April 1944 - SCHOOL NOTES -- Marjorie Cawood, Marion Gallentine, Ralph Hevelone, Donald Huls, Lura Lamb, George Leland, Carroll Podendorf, Beverly Rhoten, Jimmie Sterling, Marilyn and Marjorie Zugmier have perfect attendance for the last six weeks. Phyllis Wilson and Marceline Klee each favored us with a piano solo in Music class last week. The Little Citizen's Club elected new officers as follows: President: Kay Schiermeyer, vice president, Kenneth Schultz and secretary, Joyce Massie.***An ad for Rice's Red and White Store stated that they had for sale: hoe handles, rake handles, garden rakes, dandelion rakes, scrub brushes, dust mops, floor wax, Light bulbs (10 cents and up), lard cans, hay rope, glass cloth, glass-o-net.

Wymore Arbor State, April 1944 - At the regular meeting of the Wymore Commercial club last Thursday evening, it was voted to sponsor a baby chick program similar to those carried out in many cities the past few years. While definite rules and regulations have not been worked out as yet, the plan is for the club to give boys and girls a certain number of baby chicks. Of this number, a small percentage will be returned to the club at a date to be announced this fall. The chicks will be purchased from the Kohlmeyer Hatchery in Wymore. This plan has gained considerable momentum in recent years and enables youngsters on the farm to have a small flock of chickens of their very own.****After three weeks of track workout, the complete list of boys to report is Bob Kirchner, Floyd Wilson, Eugene Swanson, Alvin Keck, Dick Stewart, Bux Brown, Dick Punches, Max Page, Joe Windle, Duane Free, Harry Hall, Ted McPheron, and Jerry Pangburn. On days that the weather permitted, the trackmen worked out on the school grounds practicing quick starts and fast dashes as well as endurance trials on longer distances. Other exercises were skipping rope to build leg muscles and numerous calisthenics for the development of the rest of the body.

Wymore Arbor State, April 1974 - Band and vocal students at Southern together earned eight superior, nine excellent and three good ratings last week during District Music Clinic in Crete. Superior (or No. 1) rankings were gained by Mark Johnson, who gained two--for percussion solo and boys' high voice; the flute quartet; the Swing Choir; the boys' quartet; Mary Jane Dunn, girls' high voice; Rodney Rock, boys' high voice; and Barb and Debra Bowen, duet. Those who received the excellent rank were Jweff Lobsiger, tuba solo; Larry Schmidt, alto saxophone solo; Bruce Goies, baritone saxophone solo; clarinet quartet; band; choir; girls' glee; girls' sextyet; and Roger Petersen, boys' medium voice. The good ratings were received by Debra Marshall, piano solo, and John Warren, saxophone solo.

The 3200 replay team of Jill Weiner, Jody Workman, Carmen Pralle and Brandi Hardin placed 4th.***The sixth grade Lady Raiders finished their season on March 27. 
