Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre Plans Expansion SUBMITTED BY ROBERT HUMPHRIES

The Great Plains Welsh Heritage Centre in Wymore has launched a campaign to raise \$175,000 towards the addition of a 2,200 squarefoot exhibit space. This expansion will allow the museum to display many more artifacts that tell the history of Welsh immigration to the Great Plains. The Archive for Welsh America preserves many historic documents and photographs relating to the Welsh in Nebraska and in the Bethel Welsh community south of Wymore in particular. The decision to expand comes in response to the 2023 North American Festival of Wales held in Lincoln, which brought hundreds of visitors from across the USA, Canada, and Wales to Wymore. The board of directors has already conducted a feasibility study resulting in a preliminary rendition of the expanded facility. Any contribution, large or small is appreciated, and all donor names will be honored in the finished addition. The board has also applied for grants to support this major project. 

The Obedience of Faith

To obey God is counter-cultural. For some, to obey him sounds weak; they say we need to trust in ourselves rather than God. To some, obedience to the truth seems to be impossible or even obsolete.

A Christian, however, views obedience differently. For us, to obey in faith means to hear the word of God and submit freely it. The truth of the word has been guaranteed by God, who is Truth itself. The truth of God is unchangeable and cannot be relativized, and so when we hear it, we are called to obey it.

The great hero of obedience of faith in the Old Testament is father Abraham. Over the years, I have come to love Abraham more and more. He listened to God and obeyed in a way that we all probably fall short of. Whatever God said to do, he did. When God called him to take his family and flocks and migrate to the Promised Land, he trustingly did so. In Hebrews chapter 11, it states that "by faith Abraham obeyed ... and went out, not knowing where he was to go." By faith, he believed that Sarah, despite her age, would conceive a son, and by faith, he offered that son in sacrifice.

The Blessed Virgin Mary is the most perfect embodiment of the obedience of faith. Think of Luke 1:45, where her cousin Elizabeth cried out: "Blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her from the Lord." Mary listened to God's messenger Gabriel and consented to the Holy Spirit overshadowing her so that Jesus, the Son of God, became incarnate in her womb.

Mary's faith was tested. She and Joseph had to flee with Baby Jesus to Egypt to escape the murderous Herod. She and Joseph could not locate Jesus when he was 12 years old because he was teaching in the Temple, his Father's house. As much as her faith was tested, Mary believed in the mission of her son even to the point of watching him die upon the Cross. Her faith was radiant when she joined with about 120 other disciples at Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit fell upon them all.

Truly, obeying in faith, to hear the word of God and act according to it, is necessary in the life of each Christian. As a community of believers, we must support each other as we obey God in faith.

Blue Springs Weekly Sentinel, May 1899 --- THIS & THAT - Did you get a May basket? The young people as well as some of the older ones were especially active last Monday night. That was a mighty mean dust storm that prevailed last Friday and it looked as though there were several quarter sections of Kansas real estate in our atmosphere. Call and see our new line of wall paper at Wonder & McNutt's. Hubert Glasgow of Odell has had his pension raised from \$8 to \$10 per month. **** Memorial and Decoration days will be observed by the post in Blue Springs. The sermon on Sunday the 28th at 11 o'clock in the M. E. Church by Rev. W. L. Dillow. The address on Tuesday the 30th will be by Rev. S. A. Parker. Time and place announced hereafter. All necessary arrangements for the procession will be made and notice placed in next week's issue of the paper.

Weekly Wymorean, May 1899 --- The city council met in regular session at the council chambers, and transacted business of a routine nature, Wednesday evening. A petition was before the council, signed by fifty-eight voters from the old third ward, asking the council to re-establish the ward, which was knocked out by the council last winter, but the petitioners were given the stony stare by the city dads and their petition was laid on the table indefinitely. The third warders claim that they are entitled to more representation on the council, and further allege that the ordinance which abolished that ward was not legal. It seems to be the desire of a big majority of the voters of the old third to have the ward re-established for there were less than a hundred voters in the ward, and the petitioners say they could have secured the signatures of all of them if they had have had time to see them. Another thing the council did was to abolish the ordinance which made it a misdemeanor for barbers to shave on Sunday, and now if the barber is willing, the man who grows whiskers can have his face scraped on Sunday the same as any other day. Just who is responsible for the abolishment it is hard to learn, for every barber in town has a kick coming, and claim they would much rather not shave on Sunday. Another ordinance which was annulled was the one which required drays, hacks, etc., to pay a license. They will continue to pay the same amount, but it will be an occupation tax, and will go to the city instead of the school fund.

Blue Springs Bee, May 1929 --- Meeting of the Blue Springs High School Alumnae at school house, Friday, May 2, at 8 p.m. All members please be present because of important business. Don L. Harpster, President. **** City council minutes stated that F. J. Patton was appointed as a member of the Park Board; Jeffry Miller was appointed as marshall, and street and water commissioner; a motion was made, seconded, and approved to blow the fire whistle at 9 o'clock p.m. as curfew. **** The annual commencement exercises for the Blue Springs High school were held in the school auditorium on Thursday evening, May 16. The members of the class are as follows: Helen Knight, Velva Zugmier, Dorothy Shaffer, Katheryn Houseman, Gladys Emerson, Marjorie Martin, Helen Harpster, Mable Crowner.

Wymore Arbor State, May 1949 --- The Lone Elm team south of the State Line will play the opening game of the season with the Wymore baseball team here next Tuesday evening, May 10th. Game time is 8:00 o'clock. Numerous improvements have been made at Arbor State park in preparation for baseball season. The score keeper and announcer will now be located on top of the grandstand where they will have a birdseye view of the game. Wire is to be stretched in front of the grandstand to catch some of the foul balls which have been going over the top. In this first game the locals hope to get their team organized and ready for the serious business of baseball. Admission will be 50 cents.**** John Hernandes placed fourth in the mile run at the Doane College Invitational Track Meet at Crete Tuesday. Wymore was defending champion in class B and was replaced by Ulysses.Other track men making the trip were Fred Yockel, Dale Dahley, Skip Chapman, Buddie Crane, Lyman Bednar, Dale Chase, and John Poutre.

Wymore Arbor State, May 1974 --- Southern High's Class of 1969 is planning a five year class reunion with a luncheon Saturday, May 25, at 1 p.m. in Arbor State Park House, Wymore.**** Southern golfers brought home the second place trophy they won in their division last week at an invitational in Fairbury. Golfers are Harry Watson, Doug Ottersberg, Kirk Niday, and Stan Rudder. Ron Eltiste is the coach. Ottersberg was a medal winner at the match.**** Sixty-three Southern seniors, gowned in red and white, will step across to a podium in the park next Tuesday night to receive the diplomas which will end their high school careers. This year's class is one of the largest for the school, although it falls short of the 65 graduation in 1972, Prin. Tom Barrett said.**** Queen candidates for Gage County Little Britches Rodeo this summer are Geri Rumpeltes, Janene Mann, Julie Scheideler, and Laura Johnson. The girls began competition in the contest Sunday.


Wymore Arbor State, May 1999 --- The Wymore City Council got their first look at a proposed plan for the new addition at the Wymore Public Library.
