The 103rd Wymore-Southern Alumni Banquet was held Saturday, May 25, at the Wymore Community Center. The Alumni association welcomed the Class of 2024 as new members of the association. Gary Colgrove '66 gave an update on the Don Epp Scholarship and introduced Jaidyn Allington as the recipient of the 2024 scholarship. Gwenith Closs Colgrove '67 presented information on the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project expansion to the museum and talked about the video made by Nebraska Public Media for Nebraska Stories. ## Great Plains Welsh Heritage Meeting

The Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project (GPWHP) Board of Directors and Advisory Board met on Saturday, May 18. Director Robert Humphries reported that he has been busy updating the website. Robert suggested that GPWHP raise some funds for the expansion project by inviting anyone to create a Welsh-themed quilt square for a donation of \$25 (or more). The finished quilt would be displayed in the museum as a way of recognizing these donors. New acquisitions for the Archive for Welsh America are a 1901 poster depicting prominent Welsh ministers (donated by Dale Hughes of the Wisconsin Welsh Gymanfa Ganu [festival of sacred hymns] Association), two sterling silver spoons commemorating the 1896 Denver Eisteddfod (a competitive festival of music and poetry), and Welsh-language books from Jan Batty. Robert is also working on a possible livestream on Welsh Love Spoons by Thomas the Woodcarver. This would be presented on YouTube and the date of Friday, June 7, is being considered. Summer hours were discussed, and it was decided to be open every Sunday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Janice Cohorst reported on the visit to the one-room school by the 4th graders from Southern Elementary. They also visited the GPWHP museum. The float for the Sam Wymore Days parade was discussed. On July 7th, the GPWHP will celebrate the birthdays of Janey Williams Rudder and Carolyn Jones Strother at an open house at the one-room school. Along with celebrating their birthdays, there is a celebration of the completion of renovations of the one-room school and recognizing one-room school students.

#### An Easter meditation

The holy women who went to Jesus' tomb early on the morning of the first Easter thought they would find a body to anoint; instead they found an empty tomb. For this reason, the Gospel tells us, the women "were seized with trembling and amazement" (Mark 16:8). They saw the great stone before the tomb rolled away and inside a young man in a white robe. Imagine hearing the words of the angel: "Do not be afraid! You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen". And then this important message: "He is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him". What does this mean, that he will go to Galilee and wants the disciples to meet them there?

For the disciples, going to Galilee meant that Jesus was giving them new lives. They saw it as going back to the place where the Lord first called them to follow him. Beginning in Galilee, they had followed Jesus. Yet, even though they were close followers, they frequently had misunderstood his words. In the face of the cross they had abandoned him and fled. Even so, the Risen Lord gives the message that he will go ahead of them to Galilee. It is as if Jesus says to them: "Let us start over from where we began. Let us begin anew. I want you to be with me again, in spite of everything".

We are each called to go to Galilee with the risen Lord. Easter teaches us that it is always possible to begin anew. In spite of our past, God can create the work of art which he has always intended us to be. The Risen Lord is asking his disciples now—us—to go to Galilee. Our Galilee is our daily lives, the country roads and highways we travel every day.

Why does the angel say that the risen Jesus will meet with his disciples in Galilee; why not Jerusalem or Bethlehem? Because Galilee is where Jesus began his mission; he was first and foremost called Jesus of Nazareth. In Galilee, he first brought his message to the excluded ones, to those whom the world looked down upon.

Our own Galilee is our normal everyday life. Here, Jesus makes himself present in the lives of those who share our day, those at home and at work, in our neighbors down the road or across the street. In Galilee we learn to find the Risen One in the faces of all of our brothers and sisters, in our closest loved ones, in strangers, and in those who we find to be unlikable.

The Lord loves, this we know. He also likes us, a lot. And he wants us to go to Galilee to be with him so that we can be with him forever in heaven.




### Christopher Lee Volle Obituary submitted by laughlin-hoevet funeral home

#### Way Back When submitted by lois milburn

Blue Springs Sentinel, June 1896 >>Alumni Entertainment - Last Monday evening was a gala time for the patrons of the city public schools and the way they turned out to hear and attend the entertainment given in the opera house by the Alumni society, showed conclusively that they are vitally interested in the welfare of our public schools and its pupils. The opera house was crowded to its utmost and many were unable to secure seats and were forced to stand during the rendition of the program. At 8:30 the entertainment commenced with an overture by the orchestra, then music by the male guartet; a recitation by Miss Laura Evans, another selection by the orchestra and then the drama was announced. \*\*Decoration Day Exercises -The weather could not have been more pleasant than it was on last Saturday for Memorial exercises. In the morning a number of the old veterans went to Wymore and report having heard an excellent address by Dr. Dean, pastor of the M. E. Church of that city after which the soldiers' graves in the cemetery adjoining the town were strewn with flowers. The services took place here in the afternoon and were attended by a large crowd of people from the city and the surrounding country while a number were noticed from Wymore. Scott Post was joined in the services by Coleman Post of Wymore and the Relief Corps of both places, and Battery A.N.N.G. with two pieces of artillery were also present. Everything about the services passed off very pleasantly and there is no doubt but that a good impression was made upon the minds of the rising generation.>>Sun Cholera Mixture - Pursuant with numerous requests, here with is given the formula for the famous Sun Cholera Mixture. It will be found an invaluable remedy for all kinds of summer complaints, both for adults and children. It is: Tincture of opium, Tincture of rhubarb, Tincture of capsicum, Essence of peppermint, Spirits of camphor. Equal parts. Dose fifteen to thirty drops in a wine glass of water for adults, taken every two or three hours. Dose for children from five to fifteen drops in like quantity of water, according to age. The mixture will be more palatable with a little sugar added. (Please keep in mind that this was from 1896)

Weekly Wymorean, June 1889 >>Since April 1st over fifty wolf scalps have been received at the county clerk's office. They are worth one dollar each, which is paid by the state.>>The village board of Liberty has granted a saloon license to M. L. Rawlings of this city, and he has commenced business in the building just north of the city hotel.>>The eight foot plank sidewalk on the north side of Bloomfield Street (E Street) has been put down, and it is an improvement greatly appreciated by the people who travel that street.>>A train of sixteen palace stock cars pulled out of Wymore Sunday, bound for Chicago markets. These cars are so arranged that stock can be fed and watered while in transit, and by this means they arrive at their destination in better condition and in quicker time than by the old conveyance.>>Memorial Exercises - Wednesday, May 30th, was Memorial Day and Providence honored the dead and living with a bright, beautiful day. The procession formed on Blue River Avenue, near the Touzalin at nine o"clock and marched to Blue Springs where it joined the Blue Springs delegation and together all proceed to the cemetery where the usual exercises over the graves of the departed comrades were observed. At the conclusion of the services the procession broke ranks for dinner. At one o"clock the procession again formed in front of the Touzalin, and headed by the Reynolds band, marched to the M. E. church, where appropriate services were held. After the ceremonies at the church were concluded, the procession moved to the cemetery where the graves of the old soldiers were covered with a profusion of flowers, wrought by skillful hands into the form of bouquets, crosses, wreaths, etc. Nor were these offerings of love laid solely upon the grave of the soldier. Many others were beautifully decorated.

Wymore Arbor State, June 1969>>Spirit Club officers for the 1969-1970 school term were elected by fellow members. Elected were Terry Philippi, president; Don Crowley, Vice-president; Dave Ottersberg, secretary, and John Jones, treasurer. Ron Eltiste is the executive secretary. The spirit club was organized for the first time this year and is an all-male group to help generate spirit in school and sporting events.>>Justice Court - Thomas C. Lattimer and Larry Timke were fined \$25.00 each and costs of \$4.00 by Justice of the Peace Lacy Mittan on the charges of drag racing.

Wymore Arbor State, June 1989>>The Wymore Legion Midget baseball team picked up a win at home, sandwiched between two losses on the road, during action last week. Chan Holmbeck took the loss on the mound for Wymore. Holmbeck allowed eight earned runs on four hits and seven walks. Holmbeck was also credited with two RBI with two hits while at bat three times. Max Greenwell went 2-2 at the plate while Travis Klover and Matt Heusman were the only other players to get hits for Wymore. Wymore will be trying to work their record to an even mark this week as they have backto-back home games with Fairbury and Hickman.

Wymore Arbor State, June 1994>>The new 1994-1995 Junior drum major for the high school band was selected through auditions on Tuesday, May 24th. Angie Kier is the new drum major. She is the daughter of Roger and Debbie Kier. Angie will assist Senior drum major Deann Ames in drum major duties. Both girls intend to go to the marching camp held at Northwest Missouri State in July. They will receive intense training in conducting, marching and leadership skills. Deann will be returning for a 2nd year at this camp.>>The Wymore High Class of 1939 met for their 55th class reunion.
