

2 WBSAF Impact Grants Awarded SUBMITTED BY NEIL VAN BOENING

The Blue Springs Cemetery Association and the Wymore Food Market are the beneficiaries of the latest round of Wymore Blue Springs Area Fund (WBSAF) Impact Grants. The recipients were chosen from public charity applicants who are committed to creating positive change in southern Gage County. The total dollar benefit is \$1,700.00 to enhance our communities.

The WBSAF is an affiliate of the Nebraska Community Foundation (NCF) whose mission is to "unleash abundant local assets, inspire charitable giving, and connect ambitious people to build stronger communities and a Greater Nebraska." "Through philanthropy, the NCF team helps communities develop strong local economies, high quality of life, and abundant leadership and volunteer opportunities...Our affiliated funds are led by those who best know the needs of the community-the people who call it home." The funds for local Impact Grants are from a portion of the investment earnings of the WBSAF Unrestricted Endowment Fund which currently over \$85,000.00. This Fund consists of donations from individuals and Memorial Fund donations since their November 2015 inception. Continued donations to this Unrestricted Endowment Fund will allow for larger-sized future Impact Grants.

The Blue Springs Cemetery Association is awarded \$1,200.00 to enable the Association to purchase equipment to more efficiently provide the final place for inurnments, which is becoming the burial practice of choice more frequently. The Association maintains and improves Nebraska's Oldest Recorded Cemetery. This grant provides for purchase of a digger to accommodate placement of urns, mower blades, rock to preserve the lanes, and paint to maintain the border fence. If desiring to personally assist the Association, contact President Gale Hardin.

A \$500.00 Impact Grant is awarded to the Wymore Food Market to purchase food monthly from the Lincoln Food Bank for "30 to 60 kids and their families" each month. The Wymore Food Market distributes to families comprised of youth from the Southern Public School District, ages 1-18 years, on the 3rd Wednesday of each month, at the Wymore Methodist Church. This time is when funds are near depletion for those who receive monthly income at the 1st of the month. The Food Market volunteer labor is from 3 local congregations: Our Savior's Lutheran, Wymore Methodist, and Immanuel Stateline Lutheran. A majority of the financial support comes from the same 3 congregations plus generosity of the Gage County Foundation. To personally assist this charitable program, contact Rod Goes.



Giving Our Adherence and Assent to God

Giving our adherence and assent to God

Have you ever seen someone making the sign of the Cross? The gesture consists of placing one's right hand first to the forehead, then to the heart, then from the left shoulder to the right. You may have seen athletes on the playing field making the sign of the Cross.

The sign of the Cross's words begin with saying, "In the Name". As the hand is placed to the forehead, the words are "of the Father". Then to the heart, "and of the Son" is said. And then from left to right shoulder, the words are "and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." The sign of the Cross is one of the first prayers that Catholic parents teach their children.

By making the sign of the Cross, one professes and proclaims his or her faith in one God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This faith is a personal adherence of ourselves to God. This faith is also a free assent to the whole truth that God has revealed. These two aspects of faith, adherence and assent, are only related to God. This type of faith is different in kind from the faith we place in family and friends. God is the only one to whom we can fully entrust ourselves and believe absolutely in what he says.

Once we give to God our personal adherence and assent to his truth, it follows that a Christian believes in the beloved Son whom God the Father has sent. In Mark 1:11, the Father says he is "well pleased" with the Son and that we are to "listen to him." As the Gospels and the writings of St. Paul attest again and again, Christians believe that Jesus is himself God. Because Jesus has seen the Father, as taught in John 6:46, it follows that he is the only one who knows him and can reveal him.

Giving our personal adherence and assent to God means that we believe that the Holy Spirit, too, is truly God. In 1 Corinthians 12:3, it says that "no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit." To recognize who Jesus is requires that the Holy Spirit reveals his identity to us.

So the sign of the Cross is not only the outward showing of a Christian's belief in the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, but also shows that one gives personal adherence and assent to the truths taught by this one God, who is a Trinity of Persons. In a world which is dismissive of God and his guidance, a good place to ground ourselves is to reaffirm our belief in the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.


Jeffrey Lynn Garrels Obituary SUBMITTED BY LAUGHLIN-HOEVET FUNERAL HOME

Blue Springs Sentinel, July 1892 - It would not be a bad idea nor very much work if our citizens would all take a little time and clean up at this time of the year. With cholera spreading all over Europe and diphtheria already here the officers should see to it that all ordinances governing or touching the sanitary condition of the city are rigidly enforced. The people themselves however should have pride enough about them to keep their vaults, pig pens and manure piles around the stable cleaned up. Of course, cholera may not reach this country, but it is well enough to be prepared for any and all diseases that are prevalent in warm weather by having your premises neat and clean and thoroughly disinfected. A few cents spent in slacked lime or chloride of lime may save you a good many dollars, besides if everybody will take hold of this matter and clean up, how much neater does it make the town look. Try it and see if you don't feel lots more like living for a while instead of shuffling off a dirty mortal coil. (Seems as if cleaning up the towns was a priority 132 years ago also.)

Blue Springs Bee, April 1927 - Funny things, human nature. Let a town get ragged and run down and every citizen wants to sell his home and move away, and nobody wants to buy. Take the same town, give it a general clean-up, paint up and fix up campaign, in other words put it in first class shape, and you can find plenty of buyers, but lo, the citizens don't want to sell. That's human nature and knowing that we've got human nature to deal with, why not clean up this town till it will sell itself both to its citizens and others as well? (The encouragement continues.)

Blue Springs Bee, July 1939 - Blue Springs picnic committees are preparing for one of the best picnics in this section of the state this year. Talent includes two big bands, and free acts galore, beside a big array of concessions, shows, and dance, with good orchestra furnishing the music. The Rolling Rockets, professional roller skating act, Phyllis Jean, contortionist and toe dancer, and other free acts, with versatile Duckey D as master of ceremonies, is scheduled for the platform, and the program committee feels that it has a well-rounded program to please all. The dates, August 7 and 8, should be written in your music list. Plan to be here.

Weekly Wymorean, July 1894 - Bicycle Races on the Fourth - As per program the wheelmen and ladies formed in procession under command of Captain Reuling, at four o'clock, and after parading through the principal streets, went to the fair grounds (Arbor State Park), where the races were called......The ladies half mile race for "94 riders, was fairly won by Miss Gertrude Burkhalter, who came down the home stretch several lengths ahead, but as she failed to cross the line, first place was awarded to Miss Cora Greenwood...Miss Burkhalter was somewhat overcome with her exertions, but soon recovered and is now more in love with the sport than ever......About a thousand people, more or less, thought it would be impossible to see the races from any point except the center of the track, and 'tis a wonder that none of them were run over. The next time they will be fenced out.

Wymore Arbor State, July 1959 - "Old Settlers" Picnic Starts-The annual Old Settlers Picnic sponsored by Barneston American Legion Post 356, is to start here Friday, run through Saturday. A troupe of free entertainment from KOLN-TV, Lincoln, including the Co-Eds Singing Trio, Bill Morris, Wayne West and Tammy, the educated Ape, will be on hand for the gala event. At 7-7:30 each night, a free band concert is scheduled, and a free dance, sponsored by Barneston merchants, is scheduled both nights. The Music Masters Orchestra will furnish music for the dance. Thomas shows will set up rides and carnival stands at the event.****Wymore Y-Teen members attended the Nebraska District Y-Teen encampment at Camp Merrill near Fullerton.
