"Don't Learn Safety by Accident" is the motto for this year's National Farm Safety & Health Week. Did you know that according to a 2019 study conducted by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the agricultural sector is the most dangerous in America with 573 fatalities reported in that year? September 15th – 21st is dedicated to spreading awareness to promote safe working practices. Some topics of the week include Equipment and Rural Roadway Safety, Confined Spaces, Reporting Ag Injuries, and Generations of Farming.

Remember to be mindful this harvest season while out on the road. Keep an eye out for any machinery that may be turning on to or off the road and be aware of your surroundings. Slow down as you are approaching any farm equipment. Always stay a safe distance away from any farming equipment you may encounter. Due to the size of most farm machinery, it is more difficult and takes longer to slow down and come to a stop. Also because of the size and nature of most farming equipment, the operators may lose visibility of other vehicles or objects in their surroundings. The Conversion of the Baptized

We use the word conversion in different ways. We might convert an area of yard into a garden, or convert inches into centimeters.

Conversion is something that Jesus calls us to. Baptism is the first and fundamental place of conversion. In holy baptism, our sins are forgiven and we receive salvation. But we are each called to a second conversion after our baptism. This conversion is the movement of a heart drawn and moved by grace to respond to the merciful love of God. It is God who always loves us first and gives us the grace of conversion.

Peter's conversion in the Bible is remarkable. On Holy Thursday night, he denied his master, Jesus, three times. St. Luke's Gospel gives the detail that Our Lord looked upon Peter with infinite mercy after his betrayal. This look drew tears of repentance from Peter. Later, after Jesus rose from the dead, Peter three times affirmed his love for the Lord.

A man from Wymore recently shared with me how he has undergone a second conversion. He was introduced to Christ in his youth, as his mother saw to it that he and his sisters attended Sunday school regularly. But the head knowledge he learned in catechism class did not reach his heart.

Flash forward to his adulthood, 60 years later. He experienced, in a single moment, the knowledge that Jesus was his Savior and that the Holy Spirit was working in his heart and soul. In his moment of conversion, he says, "I found the love and joy and peace that I had been missing for over 60 years of my life!" He had previously thought that holding his Christian faith in his mind was the best that he could do. Conversion for this man came when his head knowledge of Jesus turned into knowing him as a person in his heart.

The Holy Spirit has compelled him to tell his conversion story of his walk of Christian faith, in the hope that it might help others. The man told me that the feeling of love and joy when he accepted Jesus Christ into his heart and asked him to forgive his sins made him truly feel "like I was born anew!" He says, "Now I have more interest in reading the Bible and feeling the message with my heart, instead of just my mind." He said anyone "can feel the love, joy, and peace from Jesus when we allow him into our hearts and ask him to forgive us for our sins."

I would like to thank this man for sharing with me the remarkable story of his conversion. I love conversion stories and pray that his story is helpful to you. Let me conclude with this man's daily prayer: "Thank you for sending your Son Jesus to earth to help save us from our sins! Fill our hearts with your love that we might be a more loving example of your grace and forgiving love! Let your will be done on earth as it is in heaven!"

Weekly Sentinel (C.E. Casebeer, City Editor; J. H. Casebeer, Publisher) September, 1910 -- Had to Come to It - The following from the Wymorean shows that at last they have reached a conclusion that has been known a great many years by residents here: If you want to get enthusiastic about water, go over to Blue Springs and inspect the test wells now being put down at the new water plant. Wells by the dozen, 40 feet deep and full within two feet of the top, with as cool and pure a flow of water as you ever tasted. The tests have demonstrated that there is oceans of water, water everywhere. Not in spots but over a vast area covering hundreds of acres of ground. Some of the wells are nearly half a mile apart, but the result is always the same. About 22 feet of the finest water bearing gravel and an abundance of water.......That there is plenty of good water, enough to supply a city of 100,000 people if necessary, can no longer be doubted. It is safe to say that before this time next year rolls around, Wymore and Blue Springs will have an unlimited supply of the best water in the state. In the meantime, if you want to get your system full of enthusiasm and good water, go and look at those wells.

****One of the Many - A little incident demonstrating one of the possibilities of a wet town was visible on the street Friday evening when a fellow a little the worse for booze came hurriedly up from Wymore endeavoring to catch the Union Pacific train north. The fellow not only had his tank full but a grip full of the exhilarating fluid besides. While hiking along at a pace making speed, his prip flew open and out came the bottles onto the cement sidewalk. Of course, several broke but that made no difference as he gathered them all up and set out for the depot leaving a trail of beer in his wake.

Weekly Wymorean (E. M. Burnham, Editor) September, 1910 -- Wymore Opera House Opening - The Wymore opera house will open next Saturday, under the management of F. E. Crawford, with the big musical production, "The Other Girl." This house is on the Crawford circuit and many excellent plays have been booked. Among them is "The Wolf," which will be given Sept. 18th. A number of the larger musical comedies successes will appear here. **** Robbers Take Cash - Unknown parties entered the store of the Wymore Drug Co., last night or early this morning and robbed the safe and cash register of about \$50.00. Entrance was gained by unhooking the screen door after cutting a hole in the screen, and then by taking out a pice of glass in the door, and turning the key which was in the lock. The safe was opened by the robbers finding the combination. The cash drawer of the safe was not locked. All the cash in the safe and some small change in the cash register was taken. The marauders left absolutely no clue to work on. The work was evidently done by old timers at the business or by someone quite familiar with the store and the safe combination.

The Odell Oracle (D. E. Shafer, Publisher) September, 1950 -- The Juniors of 1950 elected their class officers last week as follows: President, Bob Dailey; Vice-President, Dale Kadlec; Secretary, Bill Dierking; Treasurer, Irv Lisec; News reporter, Keith Beasley; Sponsor, Mrs. Hoyt. The Juniors selected their class rings from Star Jewelry Co., Houston, Texas. They should arrive within the next three or four weeks. **** Buller's Store advertised sugar (10 lbs.) for 98 cents, Hamburger (1 lb.) for 49 cents, candy bars 6 for 5 cents. Their produce department stated that they were paying 60 cents for cream, 30 cents for eggs, and 20 cents for hens. **** Annual Meeting of Library Board - At the Annual Meeting of the Odell Community Library Association on October 2nd, an amendment to the Constitution will be presented: that officers be elected by the members of the Association at the annual meeting from nominees recommended by the retiring board and nominations from the floor.


