

#### I know whom I have believed (2 Tim 1:52)

When I was in college, I remember being on a retreat where the speaker said that faith is a gift. I have never forgotten that. Since faith is a gift, it can be lost, so it is always important to strive to grow our faith. Here are a few characteristics of faith.

Faith is a grace, a gift given to us by God. Only by faith could the apostle Peter have acknowledged that Jesus was the Son of God. Our Lord praised him that his faith in Jesus came from his Father in heaven. This episode proves that God is the first mover when it comes to the gift of faith.

Yet, believing by faith is also a human act. Man is created with an intellect and will by which we know God and choose whether to love him. But God has created us with freedom so that by our choice, faith can die in our hearts, as it did for Adam and Eve at the Fall.

Christians believe that faith and understanding go hand-in-hand. We believe by faith because of the authority of God, who can neither deceive nor be deceived. God gives external proofs of faith, like the miracles of Christ and the people of God growing in holiness, fruitfulness, and stability. Faith is not a blind impulse of the mind.

Faith is certain, more certain than human knowledge. This is because faith is founded on the word of God, who cannot lie. Divine light gives us a certainty that is greater than the light given through human reason. Cardinal John Henry Newman famously said that "ten thousand difficulties (of faith) do not equal up to one doubt."

Some skeptics say that faith and reason are mutually opposed. However, research in the study of the physical world cannot contradict faith, if the research is carried out in a moral way. The things we study in the world and what we know by faith both come from the same God. The one who researches the natural world is being led by the hand of God, though he or she may not know this.

The Gospels state that believing in Jesus Christ and the One who sent him is necessary for salvation (see Mark 16:16; John 3:36 and 6:40). Once faith has been received, we must persevere in it until the end. St. Paul wrote to Timothy that "by rejecting conscience, certain persons have made shipwreck of their faith."

All of these teachings on faith points to it as the beginning of eternal life. The Letter to the Hebrews states, "Let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith (Heb. 12:1-2)."

## Way Back When SUBMITTED BY LOIS MILBURN

The Barneston Star, October, 1897 -- Joe Husa who lives east of town shelled and delivered corn Saturday. \*\*\* Barneston is booming. Another new building is going up on south side. We understand it will be occupied by Mr. S. Hinton. \*\*\* Ed Roberts, proprietor of the Barneston Livery Stable advertised "Good Rigs, Fast Teams. Calls answered day or night. Draying promptly done".

The Liberty Journal, May 1892 -- A. R. McDonald, breeder of Silver Laced Wyandottes and Black Langshans from choicest strains, advertised "Eggs for Sale." \*\*\* Just received from the east a few elegant pattern hats, come see them at Lena Aspinwalls. \*\*\* The Journal is glad to note the fact that among pensions granted last week our old friend, Thad Trimmer, has been allowed a pension of \$6 a month since 1890.

The Odell Weekly Wave, 1896 -- The Weekly Wave was published every Friday at Odell. Editor was L. W. Shadle. Subscription rates were \$1.00, in advance, for one year or 50 cents for six months. \*\*\* Yager & Hill, Tonsorial artists, advertised; "If you want a first-class shave, haircut or shampoo, give us a call. Two doors north of J. F. Raney's. Odell, Nebr." \*\*\* Jas. Colgrove reports that as F. J. Truxaw was returning from a prospecting tour for gold on Ash Creek that he accidently discovered chunks of the precious metal in the rock quarry east of town and at once staked out a claim and will soon begin working it. Fortunately the claim is near the railroad and cars can be backed up to the mine thus affording excellent shipping facilities.

Blue Springs Weekly Sentinel, 1916 -- The city council met in regular session with all councilmen present and Mayor Roderick presiding. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved. A general discussion was had on the speeding of autos and motorcycles on our city streets and E. E. Morrow was sworn in by the mayor as special speed officer. He is to serve without pay.

Blue Springs Bee, 1927 -- W. H. Buchanan, the Chevrolet agent, has just had completed a concrete paving extension about ten feet from the curb into the street, and the width of the entire lot in front of the big garage. This is Blue Springs first paving district, and we'll bet it didn't add any bonded indebtedness to the city either. It's a great improvement. \*\*\* Dr. Sloss is equipping his fourteen room house for a private sanitarium. The latest Electro Therapeutic instruments will be used and many other late Therapeutic methods. The Dr. assures the community of good care and the best skill known.

The Weekly Wymorean, 1928 -- By a deal just closed, Will L. Jones, Wymore business man, assumes ownership of a quarter section of farm land, just south of the Fink Amusement park, about three miles southwest of Wymore, known as the Geo. Cook farm trading in the two story brick building on Main street occupied by the Wymore Arbor State Printing office and the Weuster barber shop, and a residence in north Wymore, occupied by Superintendent of schools, A. E. Fisher. \*\*\* The Agricultural boys corn judging team of Oketo, won first place as a team at the recent Wymore corn show. Individually the boys took the following places: Deloss Stromer, third; Reynold Zimmerman, fourth; Arnold Svoboda, sixth. Altogether they won prizes amounting to \$23.00.

Wymore Arbor State, 1933 -- The fire department was called to the Neumann block last Thursday afternoon where fire had been discovered on the roof of the building occupied by the Russell Shoe Repair and Mavis Feed store. The blaze was extinguished by the use of chemicals in short order. \*\*\* The Chevrolet sedan belonging to Mel Rawlings was stolen from in front of the Lindell Hotel in Lincoln last Friday night. The license number of the car is 3-2273. \*\*\* Lon Turner has rented the Rosa Holmes building, formerly occupied by the White Front Variety Store, and in the near future will open up a grocery store. Mr. Turner is no newcomer to the business interests of the city having been in the grocery business here in the past.

Pictured were Kent Mann with his twine cutter; Biff Paap with broom stick birdhouse; Mike Doyle with electric motor; Sue Reedy, proxy for Alvin Svoboda's wall decorations made from beer cans; Cindy Rutan with geometric design board made with small colored stones; Mike Trump with electric canon and Dennis Doyle with motor made from generator cut out.

#### Shriners Screening Clinic to be held at BCH

The Beatrice Community Hospital Women's & Children's Clinic is partnering with the local Blue Valley Shrine Club and the Shriners Hospitals for Children to offer free screenings for children with bone, muscle or joint problems.

Women's & Children's Clinic providers will perform the screenings to determine if a child would benefit from seeing a pediatric orthopedic specialist at Shriners Children's Twin Cities in Woodbury, Minnesota, with transportation provided at no cost.

The free screening will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 12, at the Women's & Children's Clinic. The clinic is located inside Beatrice Community Hospital; use Entrance A. The hospital is located on U.S. Highway 77 North (4800 Hospital Parkway).

Parents are encouraged to look for these signs to decide if their child might benefit from a screening:

- In-toeing, toe walking, flat feet
- Bowed legs or knocked knees
- Sore, painful or stiff joints
- Limb deficiency
- Limb length discrepancy
- Curved spine indicating possible scoliosis
- Club feet

To make an appointment, call 402-228-3352. Walk-ins are welcome.

Shriners Children's Twin Cities is part of the network of Shriners Hospitals for Children which provides comprehensive medical, surgical and rehabilitative care for children under the age of 18 with orthopedic conditions. Care is provided regardless of the family's ability to pay or insurance coverage. 
