As a teenager, Roger became a local baseball star by accident. He was asked by a friend to fill in on a team that was low on players. The pitcher of the team was struggling that night. Roger had never pitched before but the coach put him in. Roger's natural talent as a top notch pitcher was discovered. He played on several local teams and won numerous all star awards for his performance.

While playing on the Lone Elm Kansas team, he garnered many fans and his games were always packed full with enthusiastic fans. He was scouted by the White Sox and invited to try out for them but was unable to due to being needed to help run the family farm.

Roger met Evelynnn (Joyce) Robinson when he was 16 and she was 15. Joyce was the love of his life. They married on October 18, 1953. Their's was a true love story that spanned over 70 years. They spent most of their married life on their farm south of Wymore. Here, they lived, farmed and raised their children Debra, Julie, Mark, Lisa and Roger Alan.

Roger was a devoted husband, father and grandfather. He enjoyed attending his children and grandchildren's events especially their sporting events. He took time most summers to spend time boating and camping at Big Indian Lake with his family and friends.

Roger was a dedicated farmer. He especially took pride in raising Champion Shorthorn cattle. He worked long hours and never retired. He was still working along side his son and grandsons up until the time of his passing.

Roger was a member of Immanuel State Line Lutheran Church for his entire life. He was confirmed there in 1948 by Reverend Janssen. He was extremely active in the church. His favorite activity was putting up flags in honor of congregational members who were servicemen and had passed on. He started this tradition and helped with it every memorial day since then.

Roger enjoyed coyote hunting, cheering for Nebraska football and baseball and Royals baseball. In 2015, he was featured in the Nebraska NETV special "For the Love of the Game." This was a story of small town baseball players like Roger. The segment won a Nebraska Emmy award. The treasure of our soul

Ever since my childhood, I vividly remember reciting the Creed at St. Joseph Church in Beatrice every Sunday. The Creed is a Christian's profession of faith. The word creed is derived from the Latin word "credo", which means I believe. To me, the Creed is beautiful. Christians have died rather than renounce the Creed. St. Ambrose in the 4th century said, "This Creed is the spiritual seal, our hearts' meditation and an ever-present guardian; it is, unquestionably, the treasure of our soul."

There are two major creeds: the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. The word "Nicene" refers to the location where the creed was developed systematically. The Apostles' Creed is held to be a faithful summary of the apostles' faith. Just think, what the apostles heard Jesus preach and teach is summarized in the Creed.

Sometimes the Nicene Creed is referred to as the profession of faith. It is this profession of faith that is a necessary part of being baptized into Christ's Body. In our tradition, children are brought to be baptized soon after they are born. At the baptismal font, the parents and godparents profess their faith on behalf of the little child, the faith which they and the entire congregation will seek to pass on to the child.

The Apostles' Creed is divided into three parts. The first part speaks of the Father and of the wonderful work of creation he undertook "in the beginning." The second part is about the second Person of the Trinity, Jesus, and about the redemption he won for us. The third part speaks of the Holy Spirit, who is the origin and source of our sanctification, i.e. holiness.

On the day of our baptism, we or those who stood for us embraced the faith which goes back to the apostles. Our faith is life-giving; as we live our faith, so ought we to embrace the Creed which symbolizes that faith.

We enter into communion with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit when we prayerfully recite the creed. We also unite with Christians around the world who share our same faith. To be united with all Christians is a unity we have received, and of which we are responsible for handing on to the generations which follow us. To pass on the faith, as I do as a priest and as you do by your witness to Jesus, is a great privilege we are given in the midst of "a crooked and perverse generation, among whom you shine like lights in the world (Philippians 2:15)."

Truly, the Creed is the treasure of our souls.

Way Back When

The Weekly Sentinel (Blue Springs), November 1898 - Halloween was very appropriately observed in this city on Monday night by the younger generation, and outbuildings and everything moveable witnessed the fact Tuesday morning. The officers had during the day posted notices over the Mayor's signature to the effect that all persons found molesting or destroying property would be arrested and punished to the full extent of the law. This however was not sufficient to hold them in check and the young people even carted off property belonging to the city officials. The best one this time however was on the editor and as some people get wrathful when a joke is told on them in the paper, we are going to tell this one on ourselves. The boys not being satisfied with overturning outbuildings and committing other acts of devilry, secured an empty beer keg and making a sign with red paint in large bold letters of CASE BEER tacked this onto the keg and carried it onto the roof over the office where it could be seen and read at a long distance. The boys did not treat us right however for they drank its contents which has left us the job of filling it and as we are the keg ahead we propose to appropriately do this. Years ago it was a custom in all printing offices to have a box into which all worn-out type, refuse leads, slugs and advertising cuts were cast in confusion and was very appropriately termed by the devil of the office, the hell box. So out goes its head, and a hell box it will make; and if of sorts our devil gets short, through the hell box he can rake.

The Blue Springs Bee, November 1927 - The Presbyterian ladies closed a deal last Wednesday, for the E. W. Kirchner property on Main street. The ladies circle have been saving for some time to buy a home for their pastor and with the bequest left them by O. E. Bishop, this has been made possible. A few improvements will be made before it is occupied. **** M. D. Griffin went squirrel hunting the first of the week and brought home several nice squirrels. He divided with F. F. Roderick and they all enjoyed a fine squirrel dinner, the first of the season. **** J. H. McPherson of near Blue Springs, one of Gage county's leading farmers and livestock breeders and Dr. W. T. Walsh, Wymore veterinarian, have returned from the famous Wisconsin dairy cattle belt, where they purchased a consignment of purebreds. Mr. McPherson, whose big stock farm is the home of a fine herd of Shorthorn cattle, bought one cow which carries the bloodlines of the leading strain of milking type Shorthorns. Dr. Walsh bought a mixed carload of Holsteins and Guernseys. They represent the pick of several fine herds of both breeds.

The Weekly Wymorean, November 1925 - Many boys in Gage county are now making some Christmas money by trapping gophers, on which there is a bounty of 10 cents. Two Wymore boys recently turned in \$101.50 worth of scalps. **** The Wymore football team journeyed to Fairbury last Sunday afternoon to take the little end of a 59-6 score. They have a pretty good team over at Fairbury and they are in good training. The Wymore boys have plenty of good material but they were but recently organized and are untrained and tender. A large crowd of fans drove from Wymore to witness the game. **** Coming to Wymore-Doctor Caldwell, specialist in internal medicine demonstrating a system of treating diseases and deformities without surgical operating will give free treatment at the Vendome Hotel Friday, December 11, one day only.

The Wymore Arbor State, November 1950 - The 1950 Wymore Zephyr football squad broke a three year losing streak at Table Rock last Friday when the game ended in a 6 - 6 tie. While the Zephyrs turned in a fine game and greatly outplayed their opponents, they were unable to get into the win column. **** The new 1951 Ford goes on display Friday and the local dealer, the Windle Motor Co., has again arranged a special showing. During the first two days, Friday and Saturday, everyone visiting the show room will have an opportunity to register for the two free \$25.00 Savings Bonds which will be given away Saturday night.

The Wymore Arbor State, November, 1975 - Wymore's vacant city council chair was filled by Bruce Campbell of Ward Two and Councilman Leonard Wilhelm was elected president of the council during the meeting. The council approved 3-0 Mayor Merle Hale's appointment of Campbell, following a motion from Councilman Rolly Salts. Campbell replaces Melvin James in the Ward Two slot, following James' resignation. James also had been council president, a position filled by Wilhelm after another unanimous vote. **** Southern High student Ed McClure was in a sticky situation Saturday night after trying his talent at the pie eating contest, sponsored by the Spanish Club at the Southern High carnival.

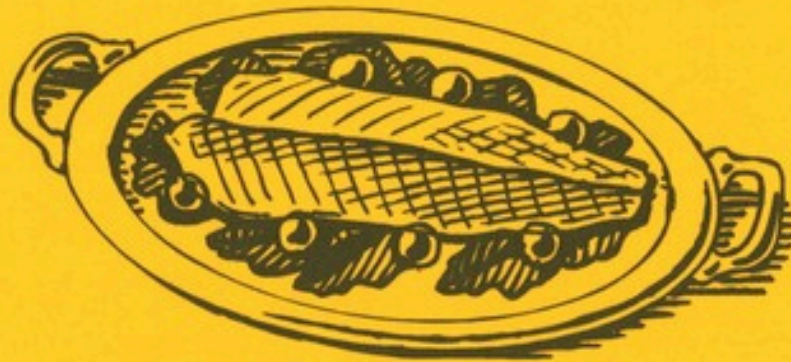
Bible Study
