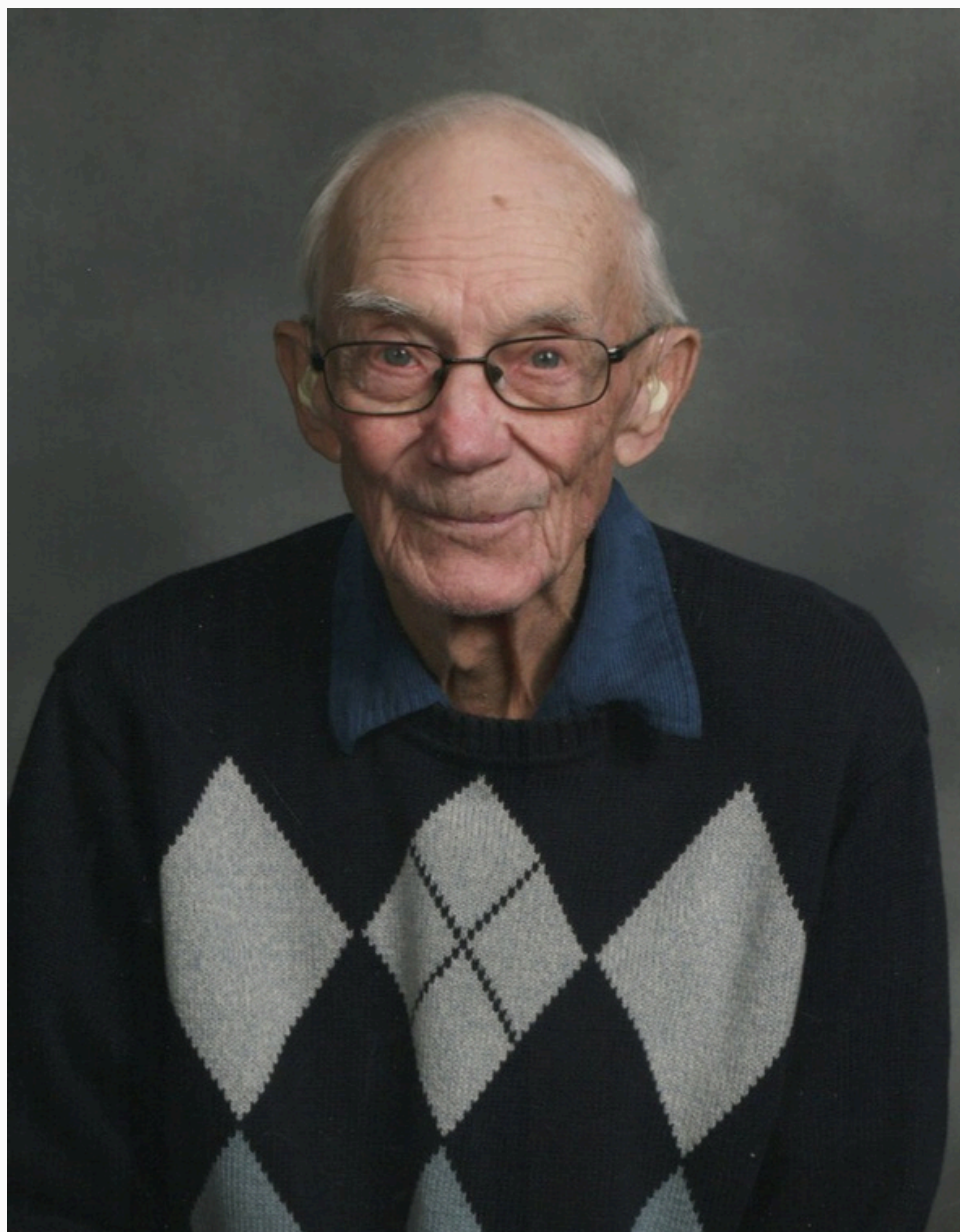

Abraham's Call to Faithful Prayer

Each of us used to not exist, but now we do. God has pulled us from nothingness into existence. Jeremiah speaks of how we were formed in our mother's womb. We were uncreated; we were "no-thing". Now, since we have been created, our souls will live forever into eternity.

Man is in search of God our Creator. In the Psalms, we acknowledge "how majestic is the name of the Lord in all the earth." We have a desire for the one who called us from nothingness into existence. All world religions show that man is in search of God.

We believe that God calls man first. When we pray, we do so only because God first steps toward us. Our step back toward him in prayer is our first response. We may forget our Creator or hide from him. We may chase after idols rather than serve the living God. We may say that God has abandoned us. In spite of these human shortcomings, we always have the opportunity to turn from our ways and respond in prayer.

God is always seeking our prayerful response to his presence. By sacrificing created things, we show our response to God in prayer. Abel, Adam and Eve's son, responded in prayer to God by offering the best of his flock to the Almighty One.

Probably the most memorable response in prayer in the Old Testament was when God called Abraham to sacrifice his son, Isaac. This passage indeed is a most mysterious one. It shows how Abraham believed that God was able to "raise men even from the dead (Hebrews 11:19)." Abraham tells Isaac that God himself will provide for the sacrifice. The image of father Abraham offering his son foreshadows God the Father offering his Son, Jesus, upon the cross.

I love thinking about Abraham's response when God called to him. The first calling is described in Genesis 12:4. He was then named Abram, and his call was to go forth from his land, his relatives, and his father to a land that God would show him. God made several promises to Abram if he obeyed. The Bible says simply that "Abram went as the Lord directed him."

He constructed an altar as a sign of his response to God. Abraham's first spoken prayer is a veiled complaint when God did not seem to be fulfilling his promises. Abraham's fidelity to God was tested, and he passed the test.

When God tests our faith, may our prayerful fidelity be like Abraham's. May we all respond in faithful prayer to God as father Abraham did!

The Barneston Star - February 1906 - The members of the Barneston Mutual Telephone Company were here in full force yesterday, looking for a "Moses" to lead them out of the present wilderness. Some came with blood in their eye and others came on foot but they were all here for the same purpose, to see someone get a "cussen" and all wanted some other fellow to do the "cussen." The directors held a meeting first and then the directors and subscribers held a meeting and forgot their own little trouble in listening to the way the representatives of the Bell Telephone Co. lambasted the Home Telephone Co. and then the Home man lambasted the Bell Co. and the Barneston fellows forgot their own little grievances in admiring the able arguments put up by Messers. Tracey and McNeal for their respective companies. There is no doubt but what either company is anxious to do business with the Barneston Company and the only thing for the local company to do is to bet the best proposition possible and if neither offer is accepted, the Barneston Co. can find a suitable operator and place their switchboard in a satisfactory location by getting in a building of their own. In the meantime, the subscribers and patrons of the line may have to put up with what service they can get.

Liberty Journal - February 1912 - W. G. Martin was the editor of the Journal and the subscription rate was \$1.00 per year, in advance. **** State Bank of Liberty had capital of \$25,000. F. M. Mowey was President, Joseph Barr, Vice President; C. S. Chandler, Cashier; and F. R. Belville, Asst. Cashier. **** The band has started regular weekly rehearsals again, the west church building having been rented for that purpose. The present indications are that Liberty will have a good band this year.

Odell Oracle-February 1924 - Vyarick Brothers advertised their Odell Cash Meat Market. This is the season to buy beef quarters and half hogs. We always have a supply of fresh butchered stock at right prices. If you do your own butchering, let us supply you with sausage casings, etc. We pay cash for hides. **** Odell High Seniors - Irene Shanek was absent a part of last week. The bad roads seem to take their toll of the Seniors. Hazel Novotny took charge of the grammar room Friday afternoon in the absence of Mr. Fiala. We have selected our class flower and motto. Our present worry is our class play. It seems difficult to find one that will satisfy us all. Mr. Green states that he hopes we will live up to our motto, "Paddle your own Canoe."

The Weekly Wymorean-February 1925 - Dancers and music lovers of Wymore and surrounding towns, will be treated to the best in music, next Tuesday, February 24, at Greenwood Hall in Wymore. Smith's Dreamland orchestra, a six piece orchestra, at present playing at the Dreamland ballroom in Lincoln, Nebraska, will play for this dance. This orchestra plays all the latest hits, both jazz and classical. When you hear this orchestra your feet just won't behave. This orchestra also has two cabaret singers, who sing the latest hits and are bound to please you. This orchestra comes here under the local management who have not spared money nor time in bringing the best in music to the dancers and music lovers of Wymore and the surrounding vicinity and they are sure that these musicians will meet everybody's approval. **** The cornerstone for the new high school building in Wymore, will be laid Saturday afternoon, of this week. Plans are being made for an interesting program. Governor Adam McMullen will be in attendance.

Wymore Arbor State-February 1936 - The free demonstration of appliances put on by the Gamble store here Saturday proved to be a big success. Their sales of radios and washing machines were far beyond their expectation. Coffee and doughnuts were served during the day. **** Saturday evening the Wymore Cardinals journeyed to Liberty to complete their scheduled 1935-1936 basketball when they met the Liberty quintet and lost 42 to 28.

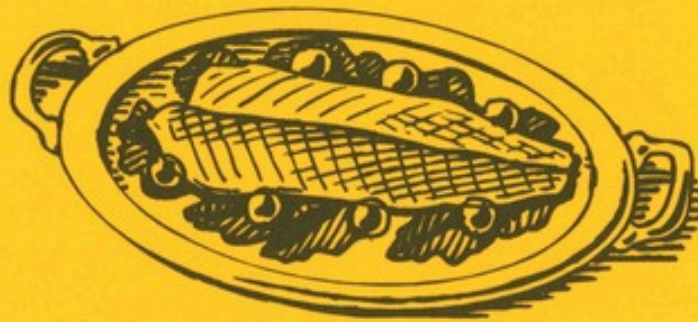

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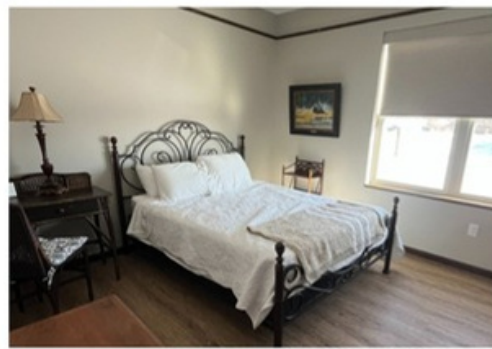
