Moses' Mediation

The bush was burning, though it was not consumed. And then a voice came from the bush: "Moses, Moses!" To which Moses replied, "Here am I." Moses was asked to take off his shoes, for he was standing on holy ground. This is what happened to Moses as he was tending the flock of his father-in-law, Jethro. The burning bush episode from Exodus chapter 3 records this calling by God of Moses. God called him to liberate the Israelites out of their slavery to the Egyptians.

But before he could lead, Moses had questions. "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh and bring the sons of Israel out of Egypt?" God replied that he would be with Moses and lead him back to the mountain where they were. Moses asked God to reveal his name. "I AM WHO I AM," came the reply. When Moses protested that no one will believe him, God gave miraculous powers to the rod he was carrying as he tended the flock.

Moses also questioned God because he was slow of speech. Biblical scholars believe that this means Moses had a speech impediment or a fear of public speaking. It could also mean that he was no longer fluent in the Egyptian language of his childhood. God promised that his brother, Aaron, would go with him to be his spokesman.

After this bumpy beginning between Moses and God, things smoothed out. In Exodus 33, it says that "thus the Lord used to speak to Moses face to face, as a man speaks to his friend."

Moses became the great mediator between God and his people. It was Moses who climbed Mount Sinai to converse with God at length, for as long as 40 days. Moses would then come back down the mountain to give God's message to the Israelites.

Through his frequent conversing with God in prayer, Moses became a great mediator. In this, the mediation of Jesus between God and man was foreseen.

We can each be great mediators in prayer for others. I think each one of us has people in our lives who we consider to be close to God. It is to these people that we often go with the simple request, "Please pray for me." We can also ask the Virgin Mary and the saints in heaven to pray for us.

When the Israelites apostatized by worshiping the golden calf, God's anger was provoked. But Moses stood in the breach before God and saved the people by his prayer. Ultimately, God is the faithful and righteous one who cannot contradict himself. Moses' prayer stirred God's mercy.

May our prayer, too, stir God's mercy as we pray for others.

Way Back When

Weekly Wymorean, March 1899 – There are a number of business men in Wymore who should order in telephones at once. Their neighbors would like to do business with them in a modern way.****Editorial Paragraphs – The saloons on Niagara Avenue (now 7th Street) will probably be found in favor of the new post office location. >Since Tony Hirmon's voice has failed him, the telephone exchange has been reduced to a business basis. >The business transacted in Wymore will permit a large number of improvements being made here this summer.> If Wymore continues its expansion, it will only be a few years until the question of annexing Blue Springs will have to be voted upon.> That open door policy lost many supporters during the period when the thermometer registered 30 degrees below zero and the coal was becoming scarce.> Blue Springs will try to elect another high license council this spring. Even if successful they will have a hard time to find anyone who is willing to pay \$800 for the privilege of running a saloon a week.****Wymore seems to be a favorite spot for the hobo element, for hardly a day passes but what ten to twelve are seen on the streets. Since Saturday twenty of them have been given lodging in the city jail, where they got a good warm bed without working for it. However, the city doesn't furnish breakfast, and they are compelled to hustle for something to eat when turned loose.

Wymore Reporter (established 1878), 1893 – There are those in town at present as in the past who think they can get out and work for a saloon and it will not hurt them but let an anti license man speak his sentiments and you would think he would not have any trade hereafter. It's a poor rule that won't work both ways.

Wymore Reporter, 1896 – Another chapter has been started in the Rawlings-Gordon-Rehmer horse trade. Gordon had Rawlings arrested Saturday, but the suit was continued for one month. It is expected that some serious charges will be developed against Rawlings before he is out of the scrape.****We met L. H. Bromwell of Lincoln, a former resident of Wymore, one day last week and had an interesting chat with him about the way things in general, and some things that were not intended to be public, were carried on in Wymore in the days when times were good and money was plenty.

Odell Weekly Wave, 1901 – Russell & Rowe the proprietors of the feather renovator have moved their families here and took up their abode in the west part of town.****No one has stated very clearly that they wanted a saloon in Odell besides there is no place for one. Do you want one next door to your business?****Phillip Webb, Henry Ferguson, Jack Sand and Fred Cerveny started Tuesday for California where they go in search of pleasure and employment.

Wymore Arbor State, March 1965 – The first two candidates have been announced for the third annual Miss Wymore Area Pageant sponsored by the Wymore Area Junior Chamber of Commerce. The two candidates are Connie Dee Garrels, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Garrels of Diller and Gloria Jean Henderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilber Henderson of Wymore.****March ushered itself on the scene like a lion as Gage countians awoke Monday morning to scenes comparable to the blizzard of '88.

Wymore Arbor State, 1975 – Peru Business Day-Nineteen students from Southern High competed at Peru State College. The students selected by their business teachers, Miss Cathy Luebe and Mr. Gary Langford, took tests over the business courses they are now taking in school. Wymore Arbor State, 1985 – Wymore Police officers investigated a disturbance Thursday, March 7, in the downtown area, where subjects were reportedly arguing on Seventh Street between F and G, Police Chief Larry Craig reports. On Friday night, heavy traffic in the downtown area also was investigated by the police department. Other police action during the past week included recovery of a traffic sign, which was reported missing on J Street between Sixth and Seventh and was found on G Street between 15th and 16th Street.****The raiders have 21 checked out for track with seven returning lettermen, including: Alan Hughes, Mike Burchett, Roger Pollman, Dave Barnhill, Randy Robertson, Steve Epperson and Loras Grell.

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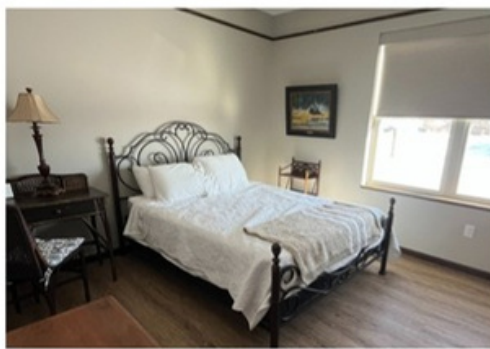
