# Darlena "Dolly" (Workman) Sullivan Obituary

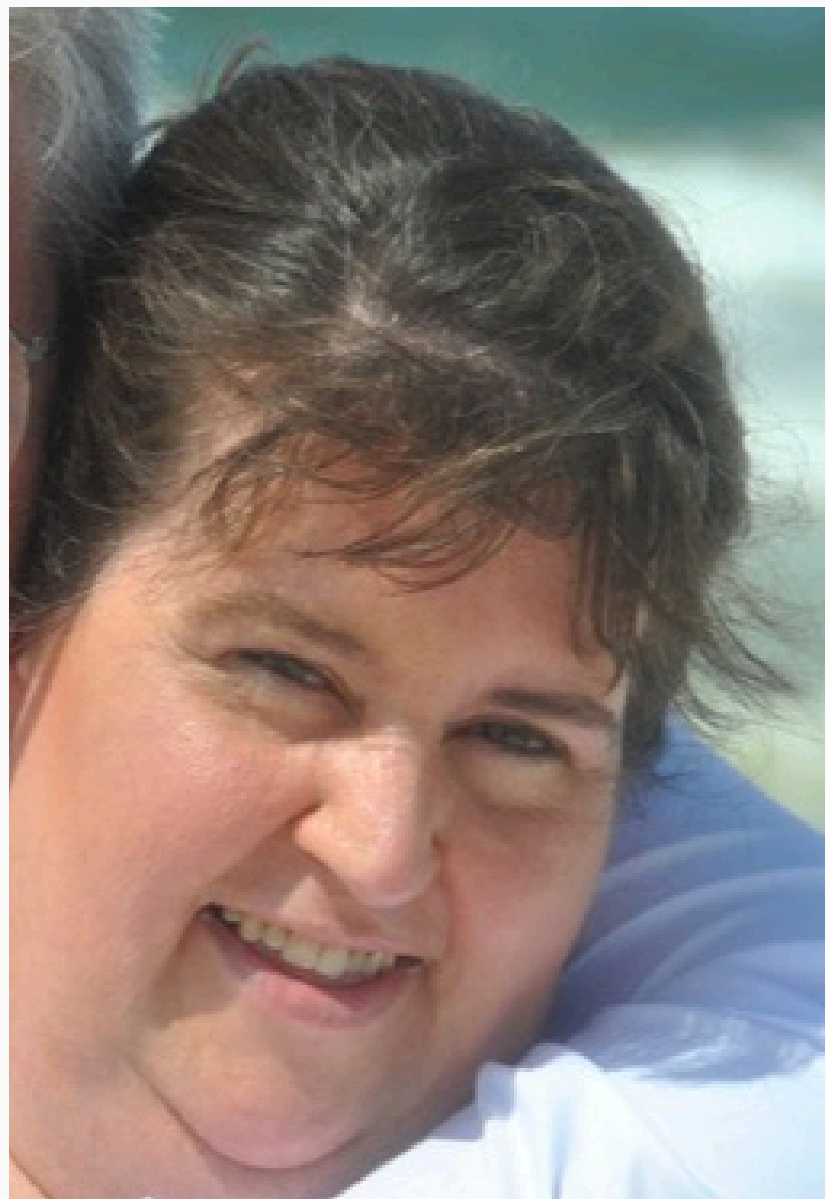

## The Seven Last Words

As we anticipate with great joy the celebration of Easter, we must first experience the Cross of Good Friday, this year observed on April 18. One way to commemorate Good Friday is to prayerfully read the Seven Last Words of Christ. These words are phrases that Our Lord uttered from the Cross, as found in the four Gospels.

The first word is "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34). Our Lord Jesus lives his own teaching from the Lord's Prayer. You and I ask the Father in this prayer to be forgiven of our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. To be a Christian is to be a forgiving person.

"Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise." (Luke 23:43) Jesus spoke these words to the thief who repented. In the midst of his own suffering, Our Lord offered salvation to the man beside him on the cross who asked for forgiveness.

The third word is "Woman, behold, your son. . . Behold, your mother." (John 19:26-27). The apostles all fled upon Jesus' arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane. John the beloved disciple returned to be with Mary the mother of Jesus at the Cross. By Jesus giving Mary to John, he has given Mary to all of us as our spiritual mother.

The fourth recorded word is "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matt. 27:46; Mark 15:34) These are the first words of Psalm 22, which begins in desolation but is resolved in triumph and hope, just as Jesus' ultimate triumph is upon the Cross.

"I thirst." (John 19:28) By Jesus acknowledging his physical thirst, his deeper message is that he thirsts for our souls. He wants us to be in heaven with him forever, and by our lives of good works and example to bring as many souls with us as we can.

The sixth word: "It is finished." (John 19:30) In Latin, this is rendered *consummatum est*. Everything of God's plan has now has been consummated, from the conception of Jesus by the Holy Spirit in Mary's womb to the completion of his salvific mission.

The final word is "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit." (Luke 23:46) After Jesus said this, he breathed his last. The Roman centurion standing there said, "This man was innocent beyond doubt." Jesus' innocence atones for the guilt of our sins.

When we die, what will our last words be? If we live our lives speaking daily in prayer to Jesus, telling him the words "I love you," we can be sure of a happy death.

The Liberty Journal-April 1896 - The report of Special Indian Agent Dickson, who was detailed to present the proposition of the secretary of the interior for the settlement of the differences between the Otoe and Missouri Indians and the purchasers of their lands in Nebraska and Kansas, was received by the commissioner of Indian affairs today. The report says that upon his arrival at the reservation of the Indians, a council of the tribe was called and the proposition presented to them. After some discussion an adjournment was taken until April 22. At that time another council was called, at which forty four of seventy-four Indians enrolled were present. The chief of the tribe stated that it had been agreed to reject the proposition and requested authority from the secretary to authorize the expenditure of enough money from the trivial funds for a trip of seven of the Indians to Washington to the secretary face to face. An endeavor was made to secure a vote, but the Indians refused to commit themselves in any way. Mr. Dickson said that the Indians appeared to be willing to agree to the proposition, but through the influence of two citizens of Barneston, Neb., one of whom was named Warren, it was rejected at the second conference. The report will be sent to secretary Smith who will decide whether to authorize the delegation to visit Washington.

The Odell Wave-April 1897 - James Colgrove went to Kansas City with a car of Cattle the first of the week.\*\*\*\*David Jones, the aged farmer near Wymore, who was brutally assaulted and burned last week died from his injuries Sunday. If the guilty parties are found there will doubtless be a lynching as the citizens are terribly aroused over the affair.\*\*\*\*The Diller Record requests its subscribers to quit loaning their copy of the paper. If the Wave subscribers would pursue the same course, several of the business men of the town would either subscribe or suffer terrible anxiety to know if anything was in the paper about them.\*\*\*\*It is an old saying that if it rains on Easter it will rain seven Sundays thereafter. If the reverse is also true we are booked for seven pleasant Sundays, that will afford no excuse for staying away from church.

The Blue Springs Weekly Sentinel-April, 1899 - Messrs. Wood o& Nelson opened the doors of the Commercial hotel Monday to the travelling public and to which they extend a cordial invitation to share with them their patronage. The house has undergone a thorough overhauling and renovating while needed repairs have also been made. Mr. Nelson is an old experienced landlord and has managed houses in Beatrice, Liberty and Virginia in this county and knows the needs of the hungry public.\*\*\*\*The wolf hunt that came off in this neighborhood the other day was a complete success for the wolves. Several wolves were chased but succeeded in getting away from the hands. The wolves are very numerous in this section but they will probably live till they die of old age because it seems impossible to poison, trap or even run them down.

The Wymore Recorder-April 1901 - The mayor and council has decided to have some prospect holes sunk on the city property in the east part of town, near the pumping station, with a view of finding a plentiful supply of water for the city.\*\*\*\*The folly of leaving horses standing on the streets untied was demonstrated Tuesday morning. Dr. Sloss' horse was left standing in front of his store, hitched to a buggy. She started to run and came down the street at a lively clip. In turning the corner at Blue River avenue the buggy was thrown against a hitching post in front of Wachtel's store and made a total wreck. The mare kept on running west and passed a team belonging to Mr. Sprague, which had been left standing in the street, and they also ran away.

The Weekly Wymorean-April 1925 - A force of men commenced the work of cementing the west walls of the Vendome hotel, Monday morning. This is done to protect the brick and mortar from the weather, which has damaged the walls to a small extent. Mr. Mosher, the owner, plans to remove the verandas on the east and south second stories, which will make the building look much more modern. The entire outside of the building will be painted.\*\*\*\*The annual dance given at Greenwood's hall, Monday evening, by the Catholic ladies, was a very successful affair, and largely attended. Music was furnished by the Jess Williams orchestra of Lincoln.\*\*\*\*Alvin M. Fink has just completed one of the largest dance halls in southern Nebraska, at his park two miles southwest of Wymore. It is 60 x 120 with a 12 foot balcony running entirely around the building, in which to seat spectators. Besides the usual lighting on the inside, there will be a row of red, white, and blue lights around the outside of the building 18 inches apart. The hall will be opened for this season, on the night of May 1st, with the Polyanna orchestra of Lincoln. The park will be formally opened on Sunday, May 24.

The Wymore Arbor State-April 1975 - With the old Narrow Gage Coffee Shop building gone, an architect recently visited that site, now Wymore National Bank property, to begin plans for a bank addition, according to Dennis Osmera, bank executive vice-president. The proposed addition will double the amount of square footage space for banking use, Osmera said, adding that the new area will build at ground level, with no basement. But before any construction work can begin, the architect's plans must be okayed; bids taken and approved. Construction work probably will not begin until fall, Osmera said.
