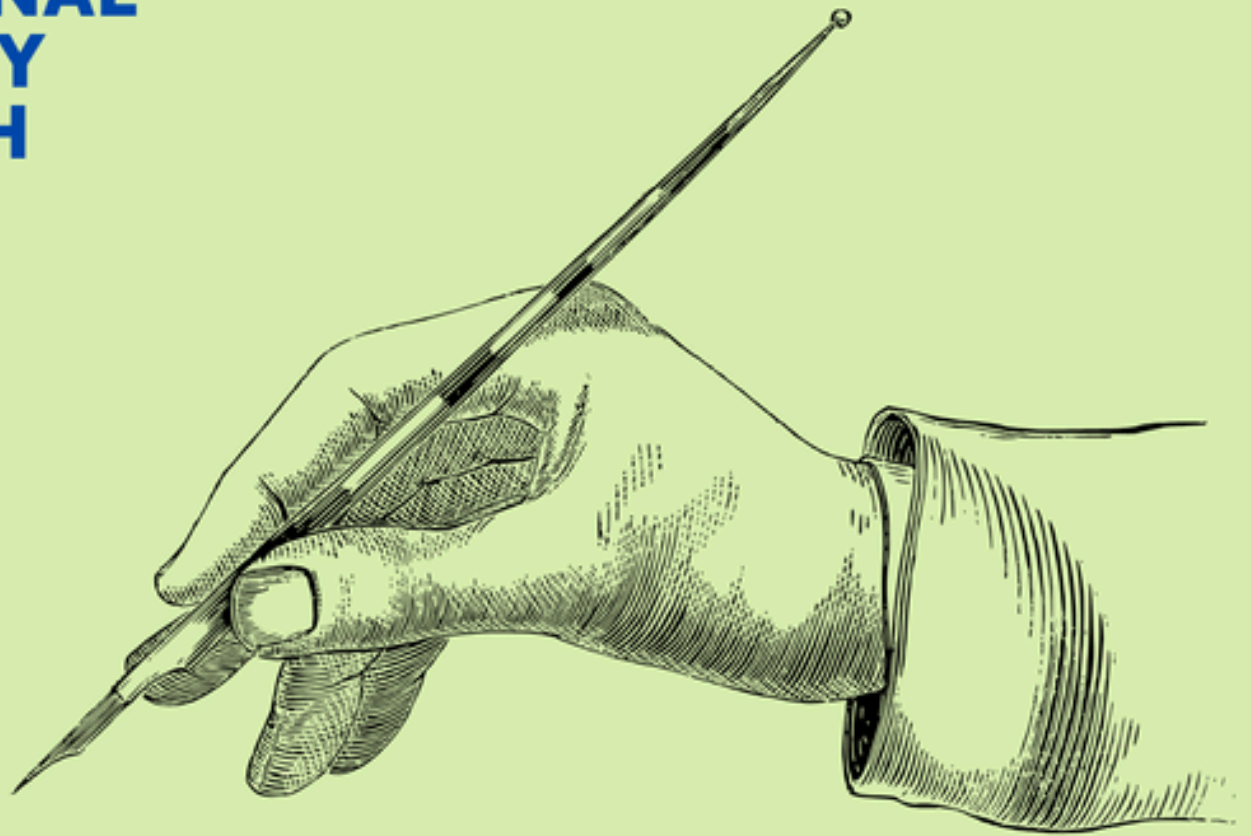

The Steering Committee of the Friends of the Wymore Library met on August 8, 1979. FOWL was organized on November 5, 1979. The Wymore Public Library is vested in the Wymore City Council and the Board of Library Trustees. FOWL helps to maintain an association of persons interested in books and libraries; to focus public attention on library services, facilities, and needs and to stimulate gifts of books, magazines, desirable collections, endowments, and bequests. FOWL is a separate supporting entity from the city of Wymore. All funds raised by the organization are spent directly on materials needed for the operation of the library. In the past, the group has bought security cameras, carpets, storm windows, a microfilm reader, 44 reels of microfilm newspapers, paid the monthly telephone bill for the elevator phone, helped with Spooktacular, Sam Wymore Days, Summer Reading Program, book sales, and bake sales. FOWL is researching the purchase of a newer or new film reader/scanner as the present film reader is rather out-dated and not compatible to most of the library computers. FOWL is a non-profit organization and meets the second Tuesday of January, April, July, and October.

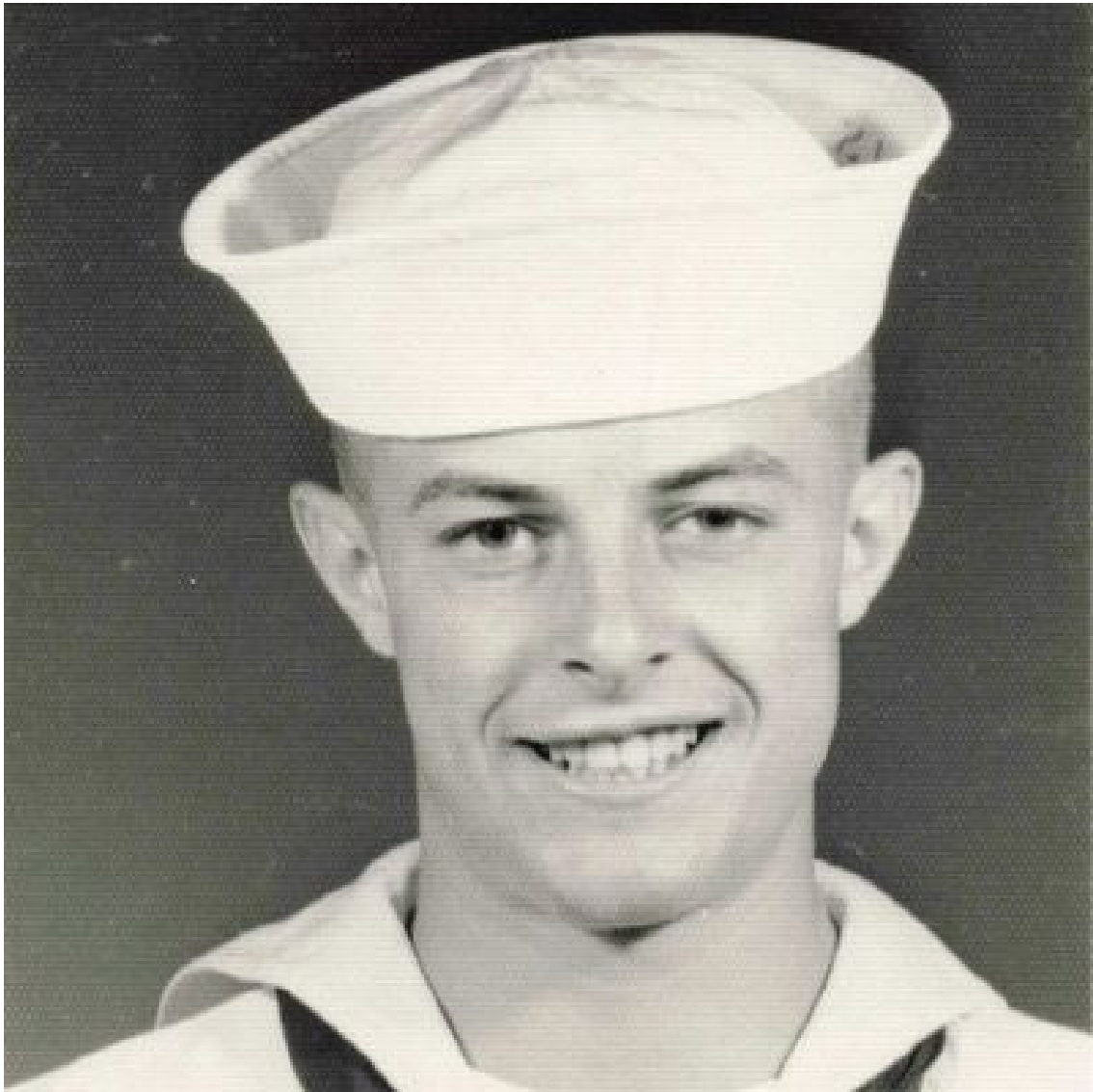

Ways to Pray—No. 2

I have already considered with you, dear reader, prayer as blessing and adoration, and as petition and intercession. Let's look at the prayers of thanksgiving and praise.

A great saint named Father Solanus Casey used to say that he thanked God in advance. In other words, he prayed in thanks ahead of time for what God would give him. He was confident in God. God always gives us the ability to accept his will, and thus we can be thankful ahead of time for whatever he chooses to bless us with.

Thanksgiving is spoken of often in the Bible. The letters of St. Paul often begin and end with thanksgiving. He says in First Thessalonians 5:18: "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Elsewhere, he exhorts his audience in Colossians to "continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving."

When I call parishioners together for a meeting, I try to thank them for interrupting whatever they could instead be doing in order to answer my call to meet with me.

In Nebraska volleyball, the children who are ball shaggers at the matches give the ball to the player before she serves. I saw a video of a former player, Mikaela Foecke, who always said "thank you" to the child who passed her the ball.

When Catholics celebrate the Mass, we see it as Jesus allowing the congregation to share in his thanksgiving to the Father. Our Lord is so good to include us in his thanksgiving of God in a way that we would be incapable of otherwise.

Turning to the prayer of praise, it is especially present in the psalms. The last psalm in the psalter, number 150, says: "Praise God in his holy sanctuary, give praise in the mighty dome of heaven. Give praise for his mighty deeds, praise him for his great majesty."

Praise lauds God for his own sake, not exclusively for what he does, but for who he is. For those who are pure of heart, love of God in faith comes before we see him in glory. Praise embraces all the forms of prayer and carries them toward the one who is its source and goal, namely God.

I hope that in all things you can truly praise and thank the Lord. Praise and thanksgiving are ways to pray that should be like tools in our prayer toolbox.

Way Back When

The Weekly Wymorean, 1884 - Several cases of horse stealing have come under our notice within the past week, and it looks very much as though an organized band were again on the travel through the country. Last Saturday night a gentleman named Gideon Glick, living on Mission Creek had a bay mare stolen from him. The horse was in the stable at 12 o'clock, and in the morning was gone. No trace of the missing animal could be found, and from the fact that the halter was not broken, there was no doubt as to her having been appropriated. The horse is described as being a bay mare, with white hind feet. The letter "O" is branded on the inside of hoof on each front foot. Also a slight swelling on knee joint of one hind leg. The horse can be very easily identified. The owner of the horse was in the city last evening, searching for the thief and horse, and it will not be well for anyone to be caught in possession of the horse without being able to give a satisfactory reason. On Saturday night a team of mules hitched to a spring wagon was taken from near Holmesville. The team had been driven to church where they were left tied to a post during service. When services were over, the absence of mules and wagon was discovered. They were no doubt stolen, the distance from church to the stable where they belonged was short, and they would have gone there had they been turned or broken loose.

The Weekly Wymorean, 1888 - That dressed sheep and hog that was so nicely decorated and labeled and hung in front of Mordhorst's meat market last Tuesday, caused considerable comment and made lots of fun for the crowd that gathered around. **** The assessed valuation of Wymore township for the present municipal year is \$278,239. **** One lone drunk was up before his honor Tuesday morning and received the usual fine and trimmings, amounting to \$5.80. **** To give our readers an idea of the magnitude of the railroad business at this place, we would state that on Wednesday, there were twenty-one trains run out of Wymore, and there are now forty-five engines making headquarters here.

[The preeminent anti-addiction specialist of the late nineteenth century was Dr. Leslie Keely, who promised to cure addicts {alcoholics} with injections of "gold bichloride." They offered treatment to alcoholics from 1879 to 1965.] **** Nebraska National Guard, Headquarters Battery A, Wymore, Neb.-All officers, noncommissioned officers and members of Battery A.N.N.G, are hereby ordered to meet at the armory in Wymore, on Saturday, April 29th, 1893, at 8 o'clock a.m., and appear in full uniform for one day's mounted drill and instruction. No one will be excused except in case of sickness or extreme necessity. C. M. Murdock, Capt. Comdg. Battery

The Odell Oracle, 1926 - A. M. Lueker became the sole owner of the Lueker and Duensing grocery, purchasing the interest of his partner, R. H. Duensing, this week. Mr. Duensing will engage in farming, having rented a part of the John Wassermann farm south of Odell. **** A little more than a month ago, the Lutheran church began conducting English services in the Methodist church Sunday afternoons at 2:30 p.m. Since the Mission congregation is so far in its infancy, it could not secure its own pastor and the board has asked Rev. F. W. Korbitz, resident pastor of Fairbury, to hold services every two weeks for this new Mission congregation at Odell. **** Advertisements- Undertaking, Embalming, Motor Hearse, Goeller & Tatro Furniture Co., Phone 14, Odell, Neb. -- C. Wymore Arbor State, 1936 - Saturday evening the Wymore Cardinals journeyed to Liberty to complete their scheduled 1936-1936 basketball when they met the Liberty quintet and lost 42-28. **** There has been considerable dynamiting in the Blue River at Blue Springs and Barneston, the past few days. The recent thaw has caused the ice to jam. The river is pretty well cleared of ice above the dam but below the dam it is a mass of ice. In many places bridges are either weakened or taken out by the ice gorges. Many trees along the river bottom have been torn out by the roots. East of town the river is quite high and large pieces of ice are deposited along the banks and in the fields. Near the Barneston dam they have the worst ice jams since the dam was built. Many spectators have lined the banks to see this spectacular sight. **** In district court Judge Messmore fined Earl (Whitey) Fulton one hundred dollars and costs for unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. Fulton paid and was released. The judge's action followed a change in the county attorney's charge of second offense and merely charging unlawful possession. **** Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Kohlmeyer entertained the pinochle club in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Max Beach who are leaving this city to operate a dairy in Seward. Tony Wixson and Mrs. Don Harpster had high score and Mrs. Max Beach and Mrs. James Boettcher had low. The honored guests were presented with fifty baby chicks by the club. At a late hour a delicious luncheon was served.

Blue Springs Bee, 1946 - 1,010 pounds of clothing were contributed by the Blue Springs citizens in the recent clothing drive. The drive was under the auspices of the Blue Springs PTA and they wish to thank the many who gave so generously to make the drive a success. According to information received, this clothing will be included in a shipment which will go directly overseas to France and Holland. **** The R. E. Wilson Market, one of Blue Springs trade centers for twenty-three years has been closed due to the fact that Mr. Wilson has been appointed postmaster, and will devote his entire efforts to this new position. Mr. and Mrs. Wilson have made many friends here and we are glad they will continue to be residents and boosters of the town.

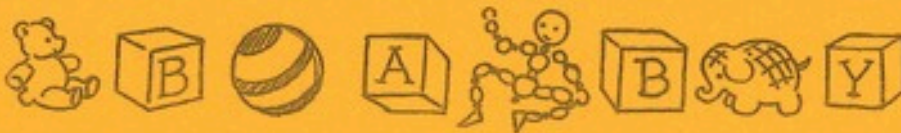
