Shirley Johnson Obituary

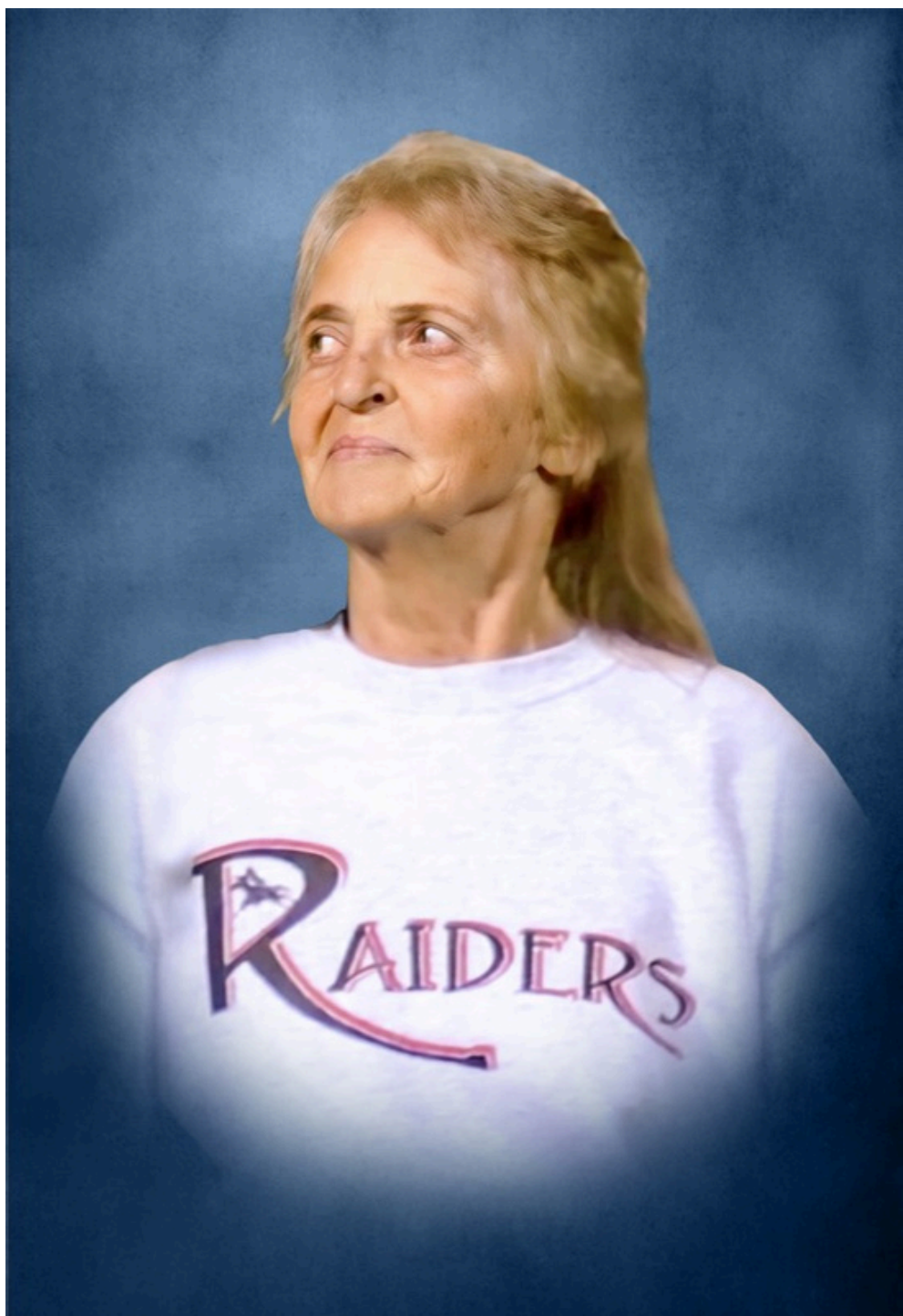

Wymore Reporter, 1886 - J. W. Haas makes the finest display of any grocery man in Wymore.****There is most excellent singing by the choir at the Blue Ribbon meetings at the Congregational church every Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock.****Lang Bros. of Beatrice had over thirty cars of sheep come in from Wyoming over the B & M. They ship them to Filley and will drive them to Holmesville, where they will feed them. Query: Why does Filley get better rates than Wymore, Beatrice, or Putnam?

The Weekly Wymorean, 1888 - The street commissioner is doing good work on Niagara Avenue (now 7th Street).****J. A. Groom, one of the jolliest railroad boys in Wymore, left last Monday morning for Omaha.****The pay wagon passed through here Thursday. It stopped long enough to make the boys feel happy.****Work on the engine house at the rail is processing finely. The large smoke stack was raised Wednesday. It is expected the engine will arrive this week.

Wymore Reporter, 1895 - Miss Anna Jones, daughter of Mrs. C. F. Jones is very sick with typhoid fever. There are grave doubts of her recovery.****The settlers on the eastern part of the reservation have received notice that payment must be made on their land within ten days.****Woodruff & Gray of Blue Springs have moved their stock of merchandise to this city and occupy the room just north of Laflin & Tout's drug store.****George Berlin is fitting up his barber shop in fine shape. He is having city water put in and will soon have two bath rooms for the accommodation of his patrons.

Blue Springs Weekly Sentinel, 1903 - A neighboring editor is commenting on the habit of ladies carrying their skirts very high, while on the streets, says it's all right, so far as he can see.--And who else but a lady paragrapher would have caught that pun.****Advertisement: Insurance Exchange-I represent the leading insurance companies of Nebraska. If you need any insurance call and see me. Jas. H. Casebeer, Agent**** Mr. Charles Harden proprietor of the Riverside farm just north of the city on the east side, proposes to quit active farm work and will therefore offer for sale at public auction his surplus stock and farm implements.

The Odell Weekly Wave, 1906 - The Blue Springs ball team came over on Monday and didn't do a thing to our boys. The visitors succeeded in running in two score the first inning and our balloon immediately went up remaining in mid air until the ninth inning when, after two men were down and nothing but a cruel shut out was in sight, the lads pulled themselves together and batted out two runs. The visitors for once had a batting streak and the locals were just right on errors and enough is said. Score - 14 to 2 in favor of Blue Springs.****Our streets were decorated with an ornamental drunk Tuesday evening.****Col. Scott and son, Guy, who were here Saturday with a bunch of native horses met with poor luck in trying to dispose with them on account of their being too small for practical purposes.

The Weekly Wymorean, 1928 - Last Sunday, the team from Oketo, crossed bats on the local diamond with the Wymore Bottling Works team and were defeated by a score of 3 to 2. Wymore tied the score in the 8th and won in the 9th, when Kirchner came across the plate. Alves, who was on the mound for Oketo, pitched good ball, even if he did have a sore arm.****The new branch plant of the Dole Floral Company at Wymore will be completed and ready to serve the south Gage city according to present plans. The plant when completed will represent an outlay of \$15,000 and will embody all of the latest departives of design and appointment. Miss Helen Fauver of Blue Springs will be the local manager. The branch is centrally located in Wymore and is one of several new businesses going into that city within the year. It is located not far from the new Nebraska Telephone and Telegraph company building.

Wymore Arbor State, 1932 - George Hockett, who has been serving a sentence of from one to five years in the state penitentiary for arson, was pardoned by the state board. The board's chief attention was given to the Hockett case, according to the Lincoln Star, when he strongly declared his innocence after J. A. McGuire, his counsel, has presented an imposing array of recommendations for clemency. Mr. McGuire startled the board by calling its attention to the fact that the last time he had appeared before the board in behalf of a man claiming to be innocent was when he represented "Doc" Lytle who was pardoned after another man confessed robbing the Minden bank for which Lytle had been convicted. Appearing before the board in Hockett's behalf were his wife and mother, and C. A. Lasher, Wymore fire chief. Chas. Hinds, Odell Banker, also appeared before the board for pardon, and was given a parole.
