## LIBRARY MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of Kilgore Memorial Library is to provide resources, educational workshops, and community events to ensure that citizens can recall yesterday, inform today, and inspire tomorrow.

### Specifically, we will provide:

- Friendly knowledgeable staff capable of assisting patrons to meet their information needs.
- Environments, physical and digital, where patrons can access and locate available resources.
- Collections in formats that meet the information needs of our patrons.
- Workshops that deliver continuous learning for citizens of all ages.
- Events that offer opportunities to recall, inform, and inspire those who attend.

## **COMMUNITY PROFILE**

### The City of York -- as defined on the official city website

York, a city of nearly 8,000 citizens, offers all of the character of a small town with the advantages of a more populated city. Strategically located at the intersection of Highway 81, a major north-south 4-lane expressway that stretches from South America to Canada, and Interstate 80 that traverses the Atlantic to the Pacific. York is the heart of the nation.

York provides numerous amenities found only in larger more metropolitan cities, such as cutting-edge health care technologies and facilities, a vibrant hospitality industry ready to serve the needs of visitors and residents alike, progressive educational institutions including a four-year college and a full range of support services for families and businesses.

York's transportation arterials and location allow easy access to Lincoln, the home of state government, the University of Nebraska, and the Lied Center for Performing Arts. Connected can also be used to describe the telecommunications infrastructure York citizens enjoy. You can do business with anyone, anywhere, from York, Nebraska.

An excellent workforce, quality of life, and low cost of living combine to make York one of the most attractive locations to live or work in the United States.

### York County -- as defined by York County Development Corporation (YCDC)

With a population 13,700, York County includes the communities of Benedict, Bradshaw, Gresham, Henderson, Lushton, McCool Junction, Thayer, Waco, and York. The county is in the heart of agricultural country and a transportation corridor which includes east/west by I-80 and U.S. Hwy. 34, and north/south by U.S. 81, a major north-south 4-lane expressway that stretches from the Gulf of Mexico to Canada (Pan-America Highway). Burlington Northern Santa Fe's main line travels through the York County communities of Waco, York, and Bradshaw. There is also a line extending to Benedict giving many opportunities for rail service companies. Private air service is available in York. Other competitive advantages offered here are fertile soil, plentiful underground water supply, community minded 4-year college, a robust and loyal workforce, and some of the lowest electric rates in the nation due to Nebraska being a 100-percent all public power state. Businesses in York County have been able to recruit workforce from an hour drive time, which includes the metro areas of Lincoln and Grand Island, significantly expanding the labor pool. This competitive location has attracted transportation logistics, warehousing, advanced manufacturing, and agriculture companies.

### A History of Library Service in York

Kilgore Memorial Library is currently the only accredited public library in York County. The majority of funding for the library is through the City of York. The York County commissioners periodically include a contribution to the library in their annual budget. The library also enjoys an active Friends group and Foundation that support the library with fundraising and volunteers. During the budget planning process in 2018, a grassroots advocacy group formed to voice support and appreciation for what Kilgore Memorial Library provides the community. This group is still active today with their public statements of support for the library and gratitude for the staff in everything we do.

Early in 2016, we were poised to explore the need for additional spaces necessary to provide 21<sup>st</sup>-century library services. The findings of our study proved that doubling the size of the building would be necessary. This addition would allow us to include needed youth and teen areas, with plenty of space for young people to gather and experience their library, while older patrons are using the library for their needs. Expanded event spaces are also on the wish list for this expansion. As exciting as the prospect of the architect's suggestions for our current facility are, with the political and financial turmoil York has experienced since the 2016 fall election, we realize they are not feasible in the current economic status of our city government.

The survey conducted as preparation for our reaccreditation application indicates that, with the exception of Sunday hours our patrons are satisfied with our current hours of service. The entire community recognizes that our funding has been drastically cut and, thankfully, that was reflected in our survey results also. A copy of the survey document we created can be found in the Appendix Section of this document.

Through a forced reduction in force by the city administration, the library staff has been reduced from five full-time to four, and six part-time staff to five. This reduction has created hardship on the remaining staff but we have managed to maintain our hours of operation to the community and we work hard to provide collections and programs that meet the needs of those we serve. Our new workloads and schedules have forced us to table a scheduled overhaul of our policy manual. The policies have been reviewed, and while we would like to update them, we also believe that what we currently have can serve our needs for another year or two. Our technology plan was last updated before our IT support staff member left in spring of 2019. This plan can be reviewed at end of this document in the Appendix Section.

## AN ASSESSMENT OF COMMUNITY NEEDS

Several agencies in York County publish annual reports including results from survey's conducted in the previous year. The most recent study was generated after the York County Economic Development Corporation (YCDC) hosted an embedded community experience in March of this year, with consultant, Deb Brown, from SaveYour.Town. Over three days, Deb met with representatives of nonprofits, government, entrepreneurs, business owners, students and citizens. This document was sent to community leaders for input in the goals setting process for the library's triennial accreditation application. ## **SWOT ANALYSIS – TAKING STOCK**

To accomplish the process for this segment of our Community Response Plan, an analysis of our strengths, weakness, opportunities, and threats was executed. Library staff, library board members, and the planning community team members outside of the staff and board were asked to complete the document found in Appendix Section of this document. A blank form was distributed to each library

staff member to complete independently; the library board filled in a form at a regular board meeting early in 2019.

A completed document with a compilation of the information from the staff and board was created for review by the full planning committee. A few community members offered additional comments and insights for this document.

As with many areas of this study, we find that technology topics are seen as both strengths and weaknesses at our library. Strengths include the fact that the library has enjoyed a certified IT specialist on staff working to improve and maintain all aspects of information technology services necessary in today's public library. However, weaknesses now includes the fact that this staff member left the library and we were not able to replace him with another IT specialist. Additional threats identified include lack of space for a classroom computer lab, under-utilized website, shortage of digital literacy skills training opportunities, and knowing which new technologies are important for library services and programs.

Highlights of the SWOT exercise include the recognition of the strengths and weaknesses of our staff, opposing thoughts on current library programs, lack of space for improved programming, and acknowledgment of the different perspectives of lifelong residents and new citizens to our community.

Working through this process proved to be an enlightening exercise for the library staff. It was great to celebrate strengths, especially those recognized by the other groups. It was also eye-opening to realize how differently citizen's view the library.

Another measure of a library's strengths and weaknesses is peer comparison. During the municipal budget planning process for the 2018 – 2019 fiscal year, a document was created by library staff using data from the annual Public Library Survey data collected by the Nebraska Library Commission and made available from their web site. The document was created to answer questions about perceived high expenses at the library. York, the community, is the twentieth largest First Class municipality in the state. Because Kilgore Memorial Library serves all of York County, this document uses the county's population to compare the costs at the local level. This data shows that York was right on par with First Class Cities in Nebraska whether we are compared as the tenth or twentieth in population. With our current funding levels, post budget cuts, York drops to twenty-third in overall operating revenue and twenty-second in staffing level. The financial struggles of our community have impacted all municipal departments and it is hard on everyone who wants the best for our community. We simply cannot provide everything needed to keep up with neighboring communities right now. If our situation does not improve soon, we will fall behind and the struggle to grow will increase. The document created during the budget discussion is included in Appendix Section of this document.

### WHAT THIS MEANS FOR YORK AND ITS LIBRARY

After the task of gathering data for this report was completed the review team has concluded that there really isn't anything new or different in the results from our study three years ago. From the perspective of the library staff, the information gathered and reviewed for this process indicates that residents of York are concerned about very similar issues. As reported earlier, the broad themes for these needs are health care, community infrastructure, youth and family support and workforce development. The feedback we have from community leaders today is very similar to what we heard three years ago. Happily, we find a very similar tone of optimism in our community that was gratifying to hear again.

Through this process, we have been reminded that the potential for Kilgore Memorial Library and its staff to make a difference in this community continues to be unlimited. When we review the SWOT analysis of our services, it does not take long to realize that there is an opportunity for us to work to improve identified threats and weaknesses of our services.

One concern that this study has brought to light for the library staff is that while we believe the library currently provides resources and services for many of the community needs identified, the feedback from community leaders clearly shows they are not aware of what the library offers. To address this lack of communication it has been determined that we need to take two steps. Step one, ask direct questions to learn what resources and services are needed by the community. Step two, determine improved methods to communicate and market the services and resources provided for the community by their library.

There is also continued interest in evidenced-based programming and services that were expressed in many discussions we were engaged in during this process. Evidence-based programs have been developed for libraries by several professional organizations. Several sections of the American Library Association, as well as the National Library of Medicine, provide access to research on the topics of concern in our community. To be viewed as a viable resource for the community, librarians at Kilgore Memorial Library will need to be more strategic in offering services that are based on research.

The staff of Kilgore Memorial Library believes there are several areas we can focus on for the next three years as we work to meet our mission of recalling, informing, and inspiring the information needs of those we serve.

## **GOALS**

The library director will be responsible for determining the timeline for each of the following goals and will assign tasks to staff or volunteers until the goal is met.

### **Community Need #1**

Help people access information about resources available in the community and/or refer people to those offering the resources. When we or our partners offer health classes, have a health message, support group, or offer a service, we have trouble getting the information out to the community. We could use help posting actual flyers, social media posts, etc. (Note: this is a direct quote from one of our respondents.)

#### Goal

Promote use of One County, One Calendar service available for use on desktop and mobile devices. Grow awareness of this service by 10% each calendar year.

### **Objective**

To increase awareness of the service to share public events with the community, promote adding events to our shared community calendar to agencies and organizations in York County.

### **Objective**

Increase public awareness of the One County, Once Calendar service and the associated TeamUp app.

### **Strategies**

- Share information about this service at all meetings hosted at the library.
- Share information about this service at meetings attended by library staff.
- Provide print and electronic resources promoting the community calendar.

#### Goal

Redesign library web site to include links to information resources in identified areas of health literacy for our community. This enhanced web site will be available to the public on or before January 1, 2021.

### **Objective**

Gather list of resources to include on the library health literacy resource page from local health providers and agencies.

### **Objective**

Promote new library resource site for health literacy to public.

### **Strategies**

- Reach out to all health providers in York County for input on resources.
- Use National Library of Medicine online resources.
- Create print and online announcements of the new site to the public.

### **Community Need #2**

Ensure Early Childhood Development needs in York County are met to prepare all 0 – 5 year-olds for Kindergarten.

#### Goal

Develop evidence-based library programs to assist with Early Childhood Development skills growth for 0-5 year-olds and their caregivers. Add one new program each year starting in 2020.

### **Objective**

Offer 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program from Kilgore Library.

### **Objective**

Provide *Babies Need Words Every Day* posters from the Association of Library Services to Children web site at the Library and other venues in York County.

### **Strategies**

- Reach out to area businesses and agencies to post Babies Need Words Every Day
  posters where they will be seen by patrons.
- Provide print and electronic resources promoting these programs.

### Goal

Increase Early Childhood Development objectives in Library Learning Time activities. Incorporate one new objective or skill each learning time season.

### **Objective**

Utilize recognized Early Childhood Development teaching methods in the library programs geared for 0-5 year-old patrons and their caregivers.

### **Objective**

Offer handouts to caregivers outlining the skill being introduced to help them understand the importance of reinforcing the concept at home.

### **Strategies**

- Offer CE to staff providing programming to the 0 5 year-olds to stay current on Early Childhood Development tools and skills.
- Include simple games, activities and reading lists in the caregiver resources provided at library events for 0 5 year-olds.

### **Community Need #3**

Provide entertainment venues related to reading enjoyment for single adults and families.

#### Goal

Explore adding events with regular meetings or special events geared to adult patrons over the age of 18. Add one new event each year beginning in 2020.

### **Objective**

Develop a Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> Club to introduce Sci-Fi and/or Horror genres to participants in an entertaining environment or activity.

### Objective

Explore adding traveling trivia nights to each community in York County.

### **Strategies**

- Locate Sci-Fi/Horror enthusiasts to join and promote a Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> Club.
- Locate public spaces in each York County Community to identify venues to hold a library event.

### Goal

Explore adding events with regular meetings or special events geared to families. Add one new event each year beginning in 2020.

### **Objective**

Develop an Altered Book Club using discarded and donated books that no longer have value as a book.

### **Objective**

Explore hosting family board game nights at the library after hours.

### **Strategies**

- Identify local artists and crafters to lead a workshop using their skill with books or parts of books as the medium for the art.
- Offer each participant the opportunity to create two items at each workshop. One item for the participant to keep and the second one to donate to the Friends of the Library to sell giving unwanted books new value.
- Look for a partnership with an agency looking for family focused events to help market family game nights at the library.

### PLAN FOR EVALUATION OF ACCOMPLISHMENT

The library staff will take primary responsibility in accomplishing the goals identified in this document. The library director will include accomplishments toward each goal in her quarterly director's report to the board. The entire plan will be reviewed with the library board annually during the regularly scheduled meeting in October when necessary adjustments on completion dates and goal objectives will be approved. During the October 2021 meeting of the board, the process for preparing an updated community response plan and the membership of the next planning committee will be introduced and approved.

### What library services that they need are available to them?

York College offers full use of Levitt Library to their students and faculty. Currently, this library is being transformed to a Learning Commons for the campus. During this transformation more college students than have in the past may seek space for group work or individual study at the public library.

Southeast Community College offers the use of their main campus library to their students, which includes a selection of online subscriptions for students to use for their classwork.

The Extension Office employees have access to the resources of UNL. The students that use extension services would rely on information provided by the extension employees or the public library.

Many distance learners require access to computers and Internet access to their online class environments, productivity applications like Microsoft Office, and testing services. Many of these students look to the public library to provide these services for their educational needs.
